

USDA Distinguished Researcher Dr. T.C. Tso Dies

Life-long careerist and former laboratory director at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Dr. Tien C. Tso, better known as "T.C," died at home on April 9, 2013 of natural causes. He was 95.

A long time resident of Beltsville, Md., he began forging a distinguished USDA career in 1950 at the Tobacco Research Laboratory in Beltsville. He started as a research scientist and ultimately became laboratory director. Tso conducted basic and applied tobacco



research. As chief tobacco scientist representing the USDA, he collaborated with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare (now U.S. Department of Health and Human Services), universities, research institutes, and industry in the U.S. and internationally to develop smoking and health programs. .

His major research achievements include advancing the understanding of the biosyn-

Beltsville Resident John Newman Authors Thriller

Local resident John Newman began writing, "SEARISE - The Chaos Begins" back in 1998 and has just now placed it as an ebook with AMAZON.com. It walks the reader through almost an hour-byhour disaster, a sudden increase in sea levels worldwide and the response to it by individuals at locations all around the Pacific Rim and elsewhere. It makes slow and insidious global warming and pollution and localized natural disasters seem puny by comparison and ends with a cliffhanger for a sequel still in draft.

An undersea earthquake in the far South Pacific triggers alarm bells in Tsunami Warning System (TSR) centers and sends tsunamis around the Pacific Rim. First landfall is the Navy's McMurdo Logistics Support Base in Antarctica. The 200 people there narrowly escape certain death but find themselves isolated in the unforgiving sub-zero temperatures. It's late May and continually dark. New Zealand is initially hit with a surprisingly low tsunami but is then hit unexpectedly with a higher one from a different direction hours later after people, thinking it was safe to do so, had returned to inspect the damage. The death toll is high. Destruction also strikes Chile, South Sea Islands, Hawaii, and other Pacific Rim countries including Mexico and the US. The wave seems unusually high in the more northern landfalls and no one knows why.

Pentagon officials devise a desperate rescue mission to retrieve those stranded in Antarctica. They dispatch an aircraft carrier from Hawaii and other specialized aircraft and personnel from elsewhere. One is an especially equipped HC-130 aircraft to drop supplies and survival specialists. Two aerial refueling aircraft are needed to support it during the mission. The use of several Marine Corps V-22 Osprey aircraft is required. Their unique high capacity, long range and vertical take-off and landing capability is unmatched by any other aircraft. First however, they have to be ferried from the East Coast to California, outfitted with additional special equipment, and then island hop across the Pacific to catch the carrier before it gets beyond New

Others blissfully go on with their daily lives not knowing what has happened and what is about to happen which will change their lives. Among them is a graduate student at UC Sacramento special-

izing in earthquake detection who is just finishing the semester and arriving home in Salinas, California.

Two days later a far larger seaquake occurs in the same area of the far South Pacific, sending even more destructive and deadly tsunamis worldwide. The tip of South America and the seafloor of The Drake passage are especially elevated, altering the flow of the circumpolar current around Antarctica. Every Chilean volcano below the 45th parallel erupts. The weather pattern in the far southern hemisphere begins to change

While accompanying his younger sister on a beach trip later that day with her friends and classmates, the grad student observes firsthand the second tsunami as it strikes the California Coast and is greatly troubled. For reasons unknown America's East Coast is also struck by second late arriving and unexpected Tsunamis and there are many victims, most of them children. Sea levels have been suddenly elevated 20 inches worldwide by the two back-toback seaquakes.

Political officials are appalled and search for a scapegoat. The



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

Young Organ Transplant Recipient Creates Scholarship Program

In late 2012, Zipcar announced its public service "Get Out & Give" initiative awarding advocates grants for their commitment to giving back to their communities. The winner of Get Out and Give is Washington, D.C. native Ola Ojewumi. She will use this \$5,000 award and a Zipcar for a day to make a difference with Project ASCEND. Ojewumi will utilize these funds to award five local high school students college scholarships.

Ojewumi has received this prestigious honor due to her public service work as the Founder and Director of two nonprofits, Sacred Hearts Children's Transplant Foundation (SCHTF) and Project ASCEND. SCHTF has collected hundreds of teddy bears and books for children living with illness across the United States, in addition to raising awareness about organ donation registry. Her grant program, Project ASCEND, has also given local charity, Lovely Ladies of Laurel Mentoring, the opportunity to create summer camp for teen girls, reaching over 100 girls in the Washington, D.C. metro area. Project ASCEND's initiatives will give a greater voice to a generation of women. Project ASCEND has been able to successfully raise over \$13,000 in grants from MTV, Glamour Magazine and Zipcar.

At age 11, Ojewumi began the fight of her life, eventually receiving heart and kidney transplants. During her freshman year of college, she was diagnosed with cancer called post-transplant lymph-proliferate disorder. She started Sacred Hearts and Project ASCEND to solidify her legacy.

An internal panel of Zipcar judges considered the Get Out and Give entries. Fifty semi-finalists were chosen and asked to submit photos and a 1,500 character written response based on the initial entry. From the semi-finalists, the panel of judges chose three finalists who were put up to vote on Facebook. Get Out & Give runners-up will also have a big impact within their communities. Daniel R. scored \$3,000 for Operation Access and Leeni will have \$2,000 to help organize a benefit show for suicide prevention.



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Classical Conversations helps them do it with confidence

"Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, and Monroe..." sings a group of 6 and 7 year olds in a church sanctuary full of parents, other family members, tutors, and fellow students.

"Adams, Jackson, Van Buren, Harrison..." they continue to recite all 44 Presidents through song. Tonight is the closing ceremony for the home-school community where they have met once a week for 24 weeks this school year.

So often, when someone unfamiliar with home schooling meets a home educator they bubble over with questions. Why did you decide to home-school? Do you use a curriculum? How many hours a day do you spend on schoolwork? Do they get to spend time with other kids? What about art and recess? And the big question, well not really a question, but an exclamation: I could never do that!

The answer to the first question – the "why" – lies within individual families. Maybe the home educator has a large family and the thought of chauffeuring each child to and from their perspective neighborhood school is too much to bear. Perhaps they prefer a specialized education model and the cost of private school is prohibitive. Or, maybe they seek to mould their children with a value system they feel is best offered at home. The list goes on.

However, for 22 families in Beltsville, the answer to the remaining questions can be summed up in two words, *Classical Conversations*

"Classical Conversations is a tutorial program designed to equip parents with the tools they need to home-school their children using the Classical Model. We believe every parent has the ability to teach their child," said Christine Phillips,

director of Classical Conversations of Beltsville.

This tutoring program occurs regularly, Sept. through April, on Fridays for five and one-half hours (two and one-half hours in the morning, with an hour break for lunch and recess, then another two hours for 4th, 5th, and 6th graders) So, on Friday, April 19th at 7 p.m. all of the students from K4 to 6th grade got to demonstrate their accomplishments.

"Tonight is really a celebration of families – of the parents who have taught their children well and the children who have learned well," explained Phillips.

The 4 and 5 year olds recited the 10 commandments from memory. Five and six year olds flawlessly flowed through 23 helping verbs, and stepped aside to listen as the seven to nine year olds displayed an amazing knowledge of history, science, math, geography, Latin, and English grammar facts.

Also, the older students (ages 10 to 12) presented a selection from the 24 world history sentences

they memorized this year. Oh, and don't forget the Memory Masters. These are students and parents who have memorized all 400+ pieces of information taught this year.

Ten students and one parent received the Memory Master honor. So, is the goal of Classical Conversations to have super smart kids?

Phillips thinks that is a nice byproduct, but explains that the true mission of Classical Conversations is, "to know God and to make Him known. In every subject, God has hidden His truth and beauty. It is our pleasure to discover Him as we learn," she says.

"The book of Proverbs tells us that there are three stages of learning: knowledge, understanding, and wisdom," says Phillips. "The Classical Christian model is based on that truth and refers to it as a Trivium, a three-stage learning process. Within the Trivium, knowledge is referred to as grammar (memorizing facts), understanding as dialectic (discovering how facts relate), and wisdom as rhetoric (applying facts)," she explains.

In addition to the memory work in the six subjects of timeline/ history, geography, math, science, Latin, and English grammar, students also participate in a fine arts project or lesson, a science project, and practice an oral presentation skill each week.

Phillips further explains that Classical Conversations helps students and parents navigate the Trivium through well-developed coursework. Weekly tutor-led classes add support and accountability.

So, to answer the bubbling questions of the unfamiliar... Curriculum? Yes. Time with other kids? Yes. Fine arts and free play. Yes. Time spent? Once a week, plus learning time at home. Every parent can teach their child.

The Beltsville Classical Con-

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Rosapepe's Report to Beltsville

State budget balanced

The 2013 legislative session ended last month with the state budget balanced and much important legislation passed. With too many of our neighbors struggling in the current economy, Delegates Frush, Peña-Melnyk, Barnes, and I focused on job creation and protecting public services that working and retired families rely on.

Key budget priorities included:

- State aid to Prince George's and Anne Arundel to keep teachers, police, and firefighters on the job.
- Creating construction jobs in repairing and building schools and increasing investments in roads, bridges, and transit.
- Investing \$337 million in the University of Maryland and other public colleges.

More state aid for Beltsville schools

The 2013 budget boosts funds for Prince George's schools by \$34 million. In addition, it protects the 3 percent cap on college tuition hikes, as well as expanding health insurance for working people and continuing investment in cleaning up the Chesapeake Bay.

To protect our neighborhoods and schools, we passed strong gun safety laws banning assault

weapons and 20 bullet clips, as well as strengthening background requirements on gun buyers to get guns out of the hands of dangerous people.

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

Fresh Air for Brain Health

Here are several ways gardening boosts your health and wellbeing:

Low Impact Exercise

Gardeners love to get outdoors and work with their hands. Because of that, gardening keeps you exercising even when a gym may not work for you. Gardening is certainly not the same as pumping iron or running a marathon. But when you are digging, planting, and doing other tasks you have opportunities for low impact exercise. Gardeners who do more physical work like hauling wheelbarrows of rocks or dirt get quite a workout.

No matter what level of exercise you do, gardening will help keep you limber.

Stress Reduction

When you walk among beautiful flowers and watch vegetables spring up, it's easy to see why gardening enriches the mind. But have you thought about gardening as a tonic for reducing stress? If not, you should. A recent study in the Netherlands suggests that gardening can fight stress even better than other relaxing leisure activities. Participants in the study either read indoors or gardened for 30 minutes. Afterward, the group that gardened reported being in a better mood than the reading group, and they also had lower levels of the stress hormone cortisol. Most of us push ourselves to the max, but gardening really does make you slow down and literally smell the roses.

Tracking Your Accomplishments

Gardeners love to keep records. It would be difficult to remember from year to year what plants did well and those that didn't thrive in specific locations, under what conditions, and especially if you have a large vegetable, fruit and flower garden. That's why gardeners love to keep photos of what they planted, before and after

shots, and notes about their garden's progress. Since it would be difficult to remember every detail of last year's garden when you get ready to plant again this year, a photo journal along with written records can make you a more effective and efficient gardener.

Those journals are handy reviews of what to plant again and what to forego. Notes written by hand or typed on your computer will also give you another benefit. When you keep track of your gardening accomplishments, you're apt to better remember the details.

And what's more, you'll be boosting your brain health by sharpening your memory and recall skills.

Mood Booster

Gardening has proven to be a good way to change your mood for the better.

A Norwegian study followed participants with mood disorders who spent six hours a week growing flowers and vegetables. After three months, half of the participants had experienced a measurable improvement in their depression symptoms. Even after they stopped gardening, their good moods continued three months after the gardening experiment was over

thesis and metabolism of alkaloids and other chemical compounds present in tobacco plants and processed leaf tobacco. Tso developed new tobacco-growth regulators and a homogenized leaf curing process. He also promoted the use of tobacco protein for food and medicinal applications.

After the Surgeon General's report deemed cigarettes a health hazard, Tso directed his energies toward developing a "safer" tobacco. His work resulted in over 230 scientific publications in professional journals. He authored nine books and held numerous patents. After retiring from the Department of Agriculture in 1984, Tso continued to write and became a consultant for US and foreign governments and the tobacco industry.

His awards and honors include the USDA Superior Service and Distinguished Service Awards. He was a Charter Member of the U.S. Senior Executive Service and was recognized by President Ronald Reagan for Meritorious Executive Service. In 1993, China awarded Tso the first Friendship Award for International Cooperation. In 2005, he was inducted into the Agriculture Research Service Hall of Fame.

He earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Nanking, China; and received his PhD from Penn State.

Tso was a member of Berwyn Baptist Church. Among his favorite Bible verses were passages from Isaiah 40: "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God," and "Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low: and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain." Tso is survived by his wife Margaret Yu-Yi Lu of Riderwood Village in Silver Spring, Md. where they moved nine years ago; a daughter Dr. Betty Tso of Crownsville, Md., son Dr. Paul Tso, daughter-in-law Denise, and grandchildren Emily and Andrew of Atlanta, Ga.

For Mrs. Paulette Goodman, a lifelong journey as a social justice advocate began as a child in horrifying circumstances. Born in pre-World War II Paris, France, Mrs. Goodman is a survivor of the Holocaust, a tragic time in which she lost family members and close friends.

Mrs. Goodman is the Founding Mother of the organization, serving as its first president from 1983-88. She then earned the presidency of the national organization for four years, completing the term in 1992.

During an anniversary event on March 17th, she was present-

ed a proclamation from Montgomery County by County Executive Isiah "Ike" Leggett as well as a citation from the State of Maryland presented by Lieutenant Governor Anthony Brown.

In addition to her volunteer work with the Metro DC Chapter of PFLAG, she is the co-founder of a PFLAG support group at Riderwood.

Sixty-four years ago, she moved to the United States with family members. "The quest

for social justice has taken me all over the country. It has been a motivator throughout my life," noted Mrs. Goodman. "Nothing is more important than family, and that's why my work with an organization as dedicated to social justice as PFLAG is a blessing."

Second Annual Talk for Lions Vision Nets \$5,000

The second annual "Talk for the Lions Vision Research Foundation" was held at Emmanuel United Methodist Church in Beltsville on the morning of Saturday, 13 April. I seldom start off with advice, but after two near misses I feel I must. When you are driving and have the right of way, by all means take it. Stop thinking you are being nice by letting someone in when they do not expect it. All you do is cause confusion and set up an accident. The driver coming the other way does not know you are being nice as you watch the tangled mess you caused. You'll know you were doing right. If you do not understand what I mean by right of way, ask someone.

I am not one who calls himself a computer person, but I do ok. My daughter Wendy is an expert in that field and she keeps me up to date and gets me out of trouble. When I first saw a computer in movies it took up a whole room. Now you can carry that room full of data in the palm of your hand. You notice I said you, not me.

Now, if you purchase something on line all you need to do is tell them your date of birth and at the speed of light they will have your name and address. Think how this might cause harm if your birthday is listed anywhere.

Along the same line, Bing from Microsoft sent me requests to use their service and Yahoo would like me to use them as well, but I use Google almost everyday. If you want an answer to any question, ask Google.

This month I am writing about a most popular cake, and that is carrot cake. Next is a list of what you will need from the store. Write them down if you do not have them: Whole-wheat flour, carrots (you'll only need two), and 2 boxes of powdered sugar for frosting. You will also need raisins, nuts, and a small block of cream cheese.

Ok lets get started. Set the oven to 360 degrees and in a medium size bowl place 1&1/2 cup wheat flour, 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoon baking powder, 1 tsp soda, 2 tablespoons all spice 1/2 tsp salt, add 3 eggs and 1/2 cup milk, start slowly then cream at high speed for about 5 minutes. Now stir in 1/2-cup oil with 1/2-cup milk, stir 'til smooth. Now add 1/4-cup raisins, 1-cup carrots (shaved or chopped). If you use a hand mixer it will take 5

minutes of creaming; use a kitchen aid and it will take 3 minutes to cream; use a food processor and it will take 30 seconds, but stir in the last oil and milk by hand. Now divide into 2 greased 8" pans and bake approx. 35 minutes until no wet spots.

Frosting: mix 1 small block cream cheese, 1 box powdered sugar, 3 tablespoons shortening, a couple of drops of water. Cream till fluffy. Now add carrots and raisins & nuts to taste. Some add cocoanut to the frosting.

Special note I asked you to buy 2 boxes of powdered sugar even though you'll only need one because almost everyone puts too much water in at first, so you'll need to open the second box.



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
