On a pleasant September evening, a cool breeze is blowing the leaves of my front yard tree and my neighborhood is buzzing with activity. I sit on the front step of my home enjoying the weather and reading the day's headlines, and I wave to the dog walkers or shout a cheerful "Hello!" to moms chaperoning their children to the nearby park. If not for my attempt to exchange even the slightest pleasantry to my neighbors, no one would have glanced in my direction.

Nobody even thinks of saying hello.

I have lived in Beltsville for almost 30 years. My husband and I raised two wonderful sons in this area. We have coached countless children in Calverton Recreation

baseball for more than twenty years. Our family history in Beltsville includes four different homes in diverse neighborhoods. After moving to a nice subdivision off of Roby Avenue two years ago, the neighborly atmosphere we were accustomed to has disappeared.

It is no exaggeration to say that in the two-plus years that we have lived in this neighborhood no one has attempted to make eye contact with me as I am watering my Japanese Maple less than ten feet from the sidewalk. I pondered the reason why no one acknowledges my presence. Is my house an eyesore? No...it is one of the nicest on the block, if I do say so. Do we offend anyone with loud parties or too many cars coming and going? No...we live a quiet life. I don't know why all of my neighbors are reluctant to pass the time of day

with me. It seems that when I say "Hello!" they are taken aback as if they have no expectation that a kind greeting could be offered by a stranger.

Perhaps as a society we have become so cautious and withdrawn, so immune to the fact that there is still kindness around us, that we have erected an invisible wall that is meant to grant immunity in the event that someone may ask for help to join a Crime Watch program or initiate a block party.

This situation is discouraging and embarrassing to me as I constantly extend greetings to all and barely get a nod. Sometimes, it makes me want to join the quiet parade of those ignoring each other.

Beltsville, 1987: I cowered behind my dad's leg, hiding from the ghoulish masks dancing through our little neighborhood on Halloween night.

Beltsville, 2007: Perched on my front stoop, head to toe in black garb, I sat perfectly still, waiting to put a charge into any trick-or-treater brave - or foolish enough to march to my front door for candy.

Like anyone, I guess, my role on October 31 has changed from childhood to adulthood - but more than the usual transition from candy collector to candy distributor. I've gone from the skittish little boy terrified and horrified by monstrous masks to the guy who can't wait to scare groups of candy-craving kids.

It's much more fun being on the other side of the mask. For the last few Halloweens, I've covered every inch of skin with black clothing, and capped it off with a black mask that conceals my head and neck, making it tough for Halloween revelers to tell if there's a breathing, smiling, talking human being underneath.

It's made for some great scares in the hours before October fades into November. Here's a typical scene: A group of middle schoolers, maybe four or five, wander down the sidewalk toward my humble Beltsville abode. Trans-



fixed by the creepy music and flashing lights adorning the front yard, they walk cautiously toward the door. They see a figure dressed in black sitting limply in a chair, and their brisk walking pace is

"What is that?" a boy asks as he backs away into the driveway. "I'm staying right here."

After a little cajoling from his macho buddies, the boy joins the group and approaches the door. A girl leans within inches of the motionless dark figure and says, "I think he's real. I think there's a person in there."

Her friend rings the doorbell and tells her it's nothing but a dressed-up mannequin.

"Hello?" the girl says as she waves her hand across the black mask, leaning her face away from the unidentified form in the way horror movie watchers brace themselves for a loud, jarring shock of

The timing is perfect. Before the girl can back away, the blackclad thing rises from its chair, and without a sound raises its arms toward the suddenly petrified teenagers. The mysterious person, of course, makes sure it doesn't make contact with trickor-treaters. The figure, after all, isn't immune to lawsuits.

The kids scamper into the front yard, some sprinting down the street, filling the Halloween night sky with screams and laughs. "I told you!" the girl shouts as she backpedals on the sidewalk. "I knew he was real. I knew it."

#### **Obituaries**

#### Morris, Jay, F.

Jay F. Morris, who was active in Maryland and national Republican political circles, died September 2 in Tampa, Florida of complications following hip replacement surgery. Born in 1941 to Major General Luke Morris and Joslin Fleron Morris, he was a 1963 graduate of the University of Maryland in Economics and then studied for his PhD at Johns Hopkins University, earning a Master's degree at the School for Advanced International Studies. He took an early interest in politics, joining the Maryland Young Republican Federation. In 1969 he worked with Donald Sundquist, who would later become Governor of Tennessee, to return the Young Republican National Federation to prominence. Morris was simultaneously elected auditor of the Federation and President of the Prince George's County Young Republicans, where he successfully managed the election of William Gullett as County Executive. He then served as a senior administrator in the Gullett administration, and was later elected President of the Maryland Young Republican Fed-

A government relations consultant from 1974 to 1980 with the law firm of Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease, he was also manager of Federal transportation programs for Motorola, Inc. from 1975 to 1976, later serving as the Executive Director of the President's Commission on Personnel Interchange from 1976 to 1978. On

the day that Ronald Reagan was elected President, Morris was one of the first members of the Presidential Transition team, serving as Director of Administration in the office of the President-elect; following the inauguration of President Reagan he was assigned to the Office of Presidential Personnel.

Morris was nominated, and confirmed by the Senate, as Assistant Administrator for External Relations at the Agency for International Development (USAID) in 1981. In 1982 he was confirmed as Deputy Administrator of the agency, in which position he served until 1988; the last nine months of his tenure at the agency he was its acting Administrator.

His career at USAID was marked by energy and unconventional solutions to difficult problems. In the 1980s, for example, the government of Ethiopia stalled the movement through its ports of donated food intended for people starving in the north of the country. On an inspection trip to Ethiopia, Morris unobtrusively took pictures of the spoiling food and brought the pictures back to the U.S., showing them to the ambassadors of the donor countries and suggesting the pictures might find their way to the press. Shortly thereafter, there was an international press conference demanding action, which forced the Ethiopian government to release the food to the people in need. Another notable achievement during his tenure at USAID was the support he provided to Congressman Charles

Wilson in his efforts to assist the Afghan resistance fighting against the Soviet occupation.

Throughout his career, Morris was admired for his nurturing of the careers of those who worked for and with him. Known for his outstanding public speaking skills and his sense of humor, Morris was also a keen observer of human nature and invariably sought to challenge junior staff members by promoting them to positions of responsibility. Today, the Presidents of at least four companies were mentored by him in their early years. A strong supporter of equal treatment for women in the workplace, he was recognized for his efforts by the Association of Foreign Service Women with their annual award in 1986.

Following his career in the U.S. Government, Morris worked as an assistant to the President of Michigan State University, finally retiring in 1990 to Ocean City, Maryland and moving to Florida in 2001

Two sons, Jeffrey of Pasadena, Maryland and Luke of Tampa, Florida, survive Morris. His marriages to Angela Evans and Beverly Morris ended in divorce. His family was at his side when he died. Morris is buried next to his great-great grandfather, Robert Morris, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, in Maryland.



#### **Hoyer Praises House Approval of** 3.9% FY09 Pay Adjustment for Federal **Civilian and Military Employees**

U.S. Congressman Steny Hoyer (D-MD) hailed action taken by the House of Representatives today (Sept. 24) to approve a 3.9 percent pay adjustment for federal civilian employees and military personnel for FY09. The adjustment for civilian employees was included in the Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act (H.R. 2638) funding government through March 2009. The 3.9 percent increase matches what the House authorized for members of the military in the 2009 Defense Authorization bill (S. 3001), which also passed today.

As he has done in previous years, Rep. Hoyer, who represents 55,000 federal workers, led the 2008 effort by the Washingtonarea delegation in advocating on behalf of federal employee pay parity - the principle of providing the same average annual salary adjustments for uniformed personnel and federal civilian employ-

"One of the most effective ways to recognize the important service of our federal employees - and also increase the attractiveness of a career in public service - is through pay that reflects the value of the work and services federal employees provide this nation and its citizens," stated Rep. Hoyer.


# Twelve-Year-Old Wins Crab **Derby Cooking Contest**

# Tax Cut for Maryland Seniors?

The National Active & Retired Federal Employees association has for many years tried to get the state of Maryland to increase the personal income tax exemption for seniors and blind people from the current \$1,000 to \$3200. Last year our phone calls to the Governor were instrumental in getting him to include in his budget an increase in this exemption to \$2,000, but guess what? The House of Delegates voted against this proposal even though the Senate approved it.

This year we are trying again. We just sent the Governor a petition with 1300 signatures asking him to increase the personal income tax exemption for seniors over 65 and blind persons from the current \$1,000 to \$3,200. The signatures were collected at NAR-FE meetings. More signatures are now being collected from nonmember seniors.

NARFE is also asking those members who signed the petition to call the Governor at **1.800.811.8336** to reinforce their request. If the petition has not been available for you to sign, please, please call the Governor's office and tell him you know about our petition, and want to add your voice to our urgent request for him to grant this increase. In October NARFE plans on a postcard

request to the Governor, so we are making an all out effort for this

To prevent last year's fiasco in the House of Delegates it is imperative that you let your representatives in the House of Delegates and state Senator know that you want this increase in your personal income tax exemption.

This increase in the personal income tax exemption to \$3200 will save Prince George's County residents \$176 on their Maryland tax, or on a joint return \$352. Is this worth a few phone calls to you? Don't delay, Call Now! You won't get the Governor, but someone will take your message

# Calverton Elementary News



#### "Green" Vansville Elementary School Opens

August 25 was a milestone for Prince George's County — Vansville Elementary School, the County's very first "green school" opened its doors to over 700 schoolchildren. Only 14 other K-12 schools in the country have LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Gold level certification. The school used recycled building materials, has an energy-efficient geothermal heating/cooling system, and 80% of the building's waste will be recycled.

I was very pleased to ensure that this school be LEED certified. One of my goals has been to promote green building in the County, and this is a very important step on our way to being a more environmentally responsible County. Not only is it better for the environment, but it will also save money on energy usage and pro-

vide a healthier indoor air quality for students and staff. Since 2004, the County Council has been taking the lead to see that County buildings and many new developments are forward thinking in this regard.

Also of great significance is that this elementary school has long been a goal of the Vansville community, and I was very pleased to help bring this goal to fruition. The school's gymnasium will be named in honor of James Briscoe and his service to the community. Mr. Briscoe is the long-serving President of Vansville Heights Citizens Association, and a well-respected community leader

A great way to get a closer look at the school and its environmental features is to come to the County's Greenfest which will take place at the school on October 11 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. There will be children's activities, tours of

the school, and green vendors and products so you can learn how to save money and the environment.

#### Environmental highlights of Vansville Elementary School:

- 20% of materials are recycled, including the use of mirrors in the flooring
- 20% of construction materials came from within 500 miles of the site, meaning less energy and fuel was used to transport building materials
- 80% of waste will be recycled
   The underground geothermal heating/cooling system means the
- building will use 35% less energy.

  Toilets and urinals are designed to use 40% less water.
- Natural lighting from sloped ceilings and skylights mean reduced use of electricity
- Some furniture is made from recycled trees from the site

# Maryland Schools Celebrate U.S. Constitution Day

Students at many Maryland public schools this week spent classroom time learning about the U.S. Constitution on September 17th. Constitution Day (once called Citizenship Day) is an American federal holiday that recognizes the ratification of the United States Constitution, and also recognizes all who have become citizens due to either coming of age or naturalization. It is observed on September 17, the day the U.S. Constitutional Convention signed the Constitution in

The law establishing the holiday was created in 2004 with the passage of an amendment by Senator Robert Byrd to the Omnibus spending bill of 2004. Before this law was enacted, the holiday was known as "Citizenship Day." In addition to renaming the holiday "Constitution Day and Citizenship Day," the act - known as Public Law 108-477 - requires all schools that receive federal

funds of any kind hold educational programming on the history of the American Constitution for their students on September 17 of every year. In May 2005, the United States Department of Education announced the enactment of this law.

"The U.S. Constitution provided a large part of our nation's foundation," noted State Superintendent of Schools Dr. Nancy S. Grasmick. "Constitution Day provides the opportunity for all students throughout the nation, on one specific day, to give pause and focus to the Constitution and how it enriches all of our lives."

Maryland's Voluntary State Curriculum provides opportunities to include political science concepts and skills related to the Constitution as early as pre-kindergarten. More meaningful study of the Constitution begins in the fourth grade and continues throughout high school

#### Maryland and Virginia Hold World Markets Conference

Maryland and Virginia, along with Washington, D.C., sponsored the third annual EXPAND conference this past Monday, a day-long event designed to help regional companies tap into a growing number of international procurement opportunities. The conference was presented by the U.S. Trade Development Agency (USTDA) and the Export-Import Bank of the United States (Ex-Im Bank), and held at the World Bank's Eugene Black Auditorium, 1914 G Street NW in Washington, D.C.

"This conference represents the tremendous value in partnering with our neighboring jurisdictions to create opportunities and prosperity for all businesses in the region," said Maryland Governor Martin O'Malley. "Clearly, there is a strong demand for Maryland's goods and services worldwide, as evidenced by our exports topping nearly \$9 billion in 2007 and up 36 percent this year from January to June. This conference will help Maryland companies, as well as all companies in the region, continue that positive momentum."

"This conference has established a track record of proven value to both Virginia and regional exporters in just two short years," noted Virginia Governor Tim Kaine. "The climate for international trade could not be better. Virginia's exports are at an all-time high, rising 63 percent over the

last five years. USTDA and Ex-IM Bank programs that attendees will learn about fit well with our emphasis in the Commonwealth on building the export capacity of our businesses."

The conference featured a number of presentations, including overviews by the USTDA and the Ex-Im Bank and focused on four key areas: transportation infrastructure, information communications technology, energy and power and environment. In addition, representatives from Mexico, the Philippines, Liberia, Romania and Morocco participated in an Embassies Panel and presented overviews of opportunities in their countries' markets. The conference included presentations by USTDA, the World Bank and Millennium Challenge Corporation on grants and opportunities offered by major international organizations.

Since its inception in 1981, the USTDA has been associated with nearly \$30 billion in U.S. exports, or about \$39 in exports for every dollar invested in USTDA activities. In FY 2007, USTDA obligated nearly \$46 million in support of the development goals of project sponsors in 65 host countries. Of this, USTDA funded 63 technical assistance activities, 43 feasibility studies, 31 orientation visits and three conferences.
