—Every creature in the forest is mine, the wild animals on all the mountains. I know every mountain bird by name; the scampering field mice are my friends.



Over 36 million American adults have some degree of hearing loss

The statistics are shocking and even more so knowing that over half of those 36 million Americans are under the age of 65. An audiologist is a licensed and clinically experienced health-care professional who specializes in evaluating, diagnosing, and treating people with hearing loss and balance disorders. The first step in treatment of a hearing problem is to get your hearing evaluated by an audiologist. A hearing evaluation will determine the degree of hearing loss you have and what can be done. Although most hearing loss is permanent, an audiologist can determine the best treatment, which may include hearing aids, assistive listening devices, and hearing rehabilitation. 

But the current Washington baseball club has brought her joy in retirement, and the fan club will attend the team's final regular season game on September 28th versus the Miami Marlins.





That said, who is this man Jacob Yongseok Young? What are some key events and circumstances that shaped his life and personal identity? We know that Jacob Young was born in Seoul, South Korea, in 1968. And that the lovely Korean-born lady we know as Grace became his wife in 1994. We know that they studied at the Korean Methodist Theological Seminary in Seoul before coming to America.

They came to American in 1995 for more study. Jacob studied at the Wesley Theological Seminary, taking his masters of divinity from there. After finishing at Wesley, he moved on to the Drew University Theological Seminary, in Madison, New Jersey, where he completed a doctor of philosophy degree in the psychology of religion (pastoral counseling). Grace Young studied at Drew also, completing her masters of divinity

degree in 2001.

Jacob and Grace once dreamed of becoming pastors in nearby churches. They hoped to commute from a single residence to separate churches. Their dream almost worked out. But then Grace was offered a church in New Jersey while Jacob was pastoring at a Baltimore church. The family immediately faced the unattractive prospect of dividing the family residence between two states. The prospect was simply too much for the family-oriented Grace and Jacob and their sons Eric and Patrick to bear. Something had to give.

What gave was Grace's career. She would give up the quest to become a minister to study accounting. She would become an accountant. And she did just that. The silver lining behind this story is that Grace enjoys accounting, is good at the profession. Pastor Jacob smiles now as he tells the story of how he came to be married to an accountant.

Before coming to America, Jacob had always been a Christian. His first religious home was with the church of the Salvation Army. The outlook was quite liberal. At age 15, Jacob experienced a religious epiphany at a Pentecostal revival meeting in Seoul. There, among the charismatic outpourings of a Pentecostal revival service, Jacob Young came face-toface with his God. He accepted the power. He was inalterably moved. From that moment forward, Jacob Young would dedicate his heart and soul to religious meaning and service.

Jacob began his theological education in 1986 at the Korean Methodist Theological Seminary in Seoul. He interrupted his studies for three years (1988-91) of required Korean military service. Following military service, Jacob finished his studies at the Korean seminary, and what he at first thought would his complete formal education. He would become a practicing pastor in Korea, he

Yet, with the passage of time and the accumulation of experience in Korea Jacob realized he wanted even more theological education. He became torn between dueling ambitions to continue as a practicing pastor or pursuing his dream to become an academic theologian. As I sat chatting with Pastor Jacob, I sensed that both ambitions still live, are still there. I thought that though Pastor Jacob enjoys pastoring at Emmanuel, as he has at other churches, he feels the occasional tug to return to

He is so well prepared and so successful pastoring and in academia. I haven't yet mentioned that Pastor Jacob holds a Doctor of Philosophy degree from the Drew University Theological Seminary,

in Madison, New Jersey. At Drew, Jacob concentrated on bridging the study of psychological analysis and theology, or as he said it to me, the meaning of God.

His studies at Drew led to the book that I mentioned at the outset. Main title: Korean, Asian, or American? Subtitle: the Identity, Ethnicity, and Autobiography of Second Generation Korean American Christians. Pastor Jacob dedicated his book to his parents and to his American-born sons, Eric 18, and Patrick 13. As one would expect from its title, the book chronicles his academic study of the religious experiences of firstand second-generation Korean immigrants coming to America.

I won't attempt a book review. I will say that for anyone who wants to know Pastor Jacob on a deeper level, to understand this good and scholarly man better, this book is for you. The book will make you think about the cultural shock and struggles of the immigrant experience as well. If you should want a copy, see Pastor Jacob or contact him through the church, tel. 301-937-7114. Be prepared for the challenges of academic-style

their liberties and freedom, and to ensure those inalienable rights to every American.

The tradition of celebrating the Constitution was started many years ago by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). In 1955, the Daughters petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was later adopted by the U.S. Congress and signed into Public Law #915 on August 2, 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis for America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

The United States of America functions as a Republic under the Constitution, which is the oldest document still in active use that outlines the self-government of a people. This landmark idea that men had the inalienable right as individuals to be free and live their lives under their own governance was the impetus of the American Revolution. Today, the Constitution stands as an icon of freedom for people around the world.

"Constitution Week is the perfect opportunity to read and study this great document which is the safeguard of our American liberties," states DAR President General, Lynn Forney Young. "We encourage all citizens across the country to take time this week to reflect on our heritage of freedom and come together to Celebrate America!"

Churches, schools, courthouses, fire houses, veterans' homes, city governments, and individuals (such as that dinner bell in the front yard) were encouraged to ring bells on September 17. Ringing the bells at 4:00 p.m. EST in all time zones is encouraged so that they are heard simultaneously from coast to coast as we kick off Constitution Week celebrations.

The celebration of Constitution Week also includes displays around the countries commemorating the signing of the U.S. Constitution. Every year in September the Colonel Tench Tilghman Chapter of DAR has a display commemorating this historic event. This year's display included proclamations from Maryland Governor Martin O'Malley and Prince George's County Executive Rushern Baker III.

DAR has served America for 124 years as its foremost cheerleader. In 1928, the Daughters began work on a building as a memorial to the Constitution. John Russell Pope, architect of the Jefferson Memorial, was commissioned to design the performing arts center, known as DAR Constitution Hall. Today, DAR Constitution Hall is one of the only structures erected in tribute to the Constitution of the United States of America.

Known as the largest women's patriotic organization in the world. DAR has over 175,000 members with approximately 3,000 chapters in all 50 states and 13 foreign countries. The DAR has long promoted patriotism through commemorative celebrations, memorials, scholarships and activities for children, and programs for new immigrants. 

Then slowly add 1 1/2 cup milk (any real milk will work) Place the pie shell into a 400 degree oven and ladle in the filling as much as you can. Close the oven and go away for one hour. you may have filling left. Pour into greased cup cake molds and bake beside the pie. You can not over bake a pumpkin pie, brown spots etc are ok. 

There's more! In a medium size bowl place 1 cup warm real milk, stir in 4 cups flour (any), 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons of dry yeast. Add 4 tablespoons butter or shortening and finally 3 tablespoons of sugar or honey. Mix with spoon as long as you can then dump on to a clean spot with a bit of flour and knead, just like you learned in class, until smooth and plyable. Cover it with the bowl

and let it rise. When risen make into sweet bread or dinner rolls.

Special notes:. Do not put that jar of yeast in the fridge or freezer. Close tightly and store it in the pantry. It will keep cool and dry for a year. Both items freeze well.



powerful agents for change when they report incidents."

Support for Cartoon Network's award-winning prosocial effort has come from such diverse organizations as Facebook, Boys & Girls Clubs of America, LG Mobile, and CNN. President Obama even invited Cartoon Network to the first Bullying Prevention Summit at the White House, and later introduced the initiative's first documentary, "Speak Up."

This year, Cartoon Network's Speak Up Week (Sept. 29 - Oct. 3) kicks off National Bullying Prevention Month in October and is a great time to review ways that adults and kids can stand up to bullying:

- Cyberbullying: Don't contribute to the problem by sharing, saving, forwarding or reposting information. If you're on the receiving end, resist the urge to get back at the person or fix the issue online - both can make the problem worse. Get offline and deal with it in real life. Parents can help prevent cyberbullying by monitoring kids' use of computers, mobile phones and tablets.
- Don't stand by: Research has found that when bullying occurs and a bystander intervenes by speaking up, more than half of bullying situations stop within just 10 seconds.
- Share your voice: Cartoon Network is recruiting 1MM students, parents, teachers, legislators and anyone concerned about bullying prevention to submit user-generated videos that feature individuals declaring the phrase, "I Speak Up!" You can use a smartphone or go online to upload your own video to the www.StopBullyingSpeakUp. com website.

Participants are also encouraged to use the hashtag, #ISpeak-Up to share videos via their own social media platforms to help spread the word and enlist friends to take part in the 1MM challenge. Select videos will appear on-air as part of new campaign spots for Cartoon Network, its digital platforms and Boomerang.

■ Listen: Parents should check in with kids periodically to make sure they're safe and happy at school, on the playground and online. If you're an adult and a child tells you about a bullying situation, listen. Either let the school know about the issue or talk to the other children's parents about putting a stop to the behavior.

Whether you're a victim, a bystander or a concerned adult, don't sweep bullying under the rug. By speaking out against cruelty, you can help end bullying.
