We are coming in the home stretch with construction. They are working on storm water management/drainage issues, utility (gas and WSSC) issues, and sidewalks between Garrett and Rhode Island Avenue. These tasks are running behind schedule due to weather issues in November. The target completion of this construction phase is realistically the middle of January. The milling and repaving for this stretch is likely to be moved to the spring of 2023. Paving cannot be done once temperatures drop below 50 degrees. As we go to press the nighttime temperatures are going to be in the 30's or below at night. The last phases are all very sensitive to weather conditions.

On 08/10/2022 I called them again about the same issue around 12:04 noon, and they wrote my complaint and sent me an email with a ticket number. The same day I got an email saying the ticket was closed, "Evidence of issue not found."

I called 311 again the same day, another person took my complaint and gave me a new ticked ID. I explained that they closed the ticket and probably they did not bother to reach out to me if they


needed more information. I saw when the truck picked up both containers on several houses on my street.

When I called the last time, I explained that this has been happening way too often and I can see it with my own eyes when this happens. The vendor needs to be held accountable. Otherwise, what is the point of keeping two separate containers if when they pick it up it all goes to the same truck?

If someone else sees this happening, please call 311 and report it. This should not be happening. Abandoned House Cats, A Disturbing Trend

Beltsville Community Cats (BCC) is sad to report on an unfortunate and disturbing trend. People all over Prince George's County are abandoning their pet cats, releasing them outside to fend for themselves for food, water and shelter. Many of these cats are unaltered. Some are pregnant. Some are sick. Many, if not most, of these cats will not survive through the winter. Unfortunately, some will suffer long, drawn-out deaths, some will be hit by cars, and some will be killed by wild animals.

The reasons for the increased frequency of abandoned cats are many. First, the cost of everything has increased significantly, placing an economic burden on many households. In addition, stores are often out of reasonably priced cat food. Second, it is getting more and more difficult to secure vet appointments in a timely manner to get cats sterilized, vaccinated, and treated for illnesses and injuries. For example, low-cost options for spay/neuter surgeries are often booked out for 2 to 3



months.

Third, many people living in this area are transient residents (college students, contract workers, military personnel, etc.). When moving, some people simply release their cats outside. Those that actively try to rehome their cats often wait until the last minute to ask for help. It is important for pet owners to be aware that almost every cat group in PG County reports that their options for fostering kitties are very limited. Local shelters also have limited space and require you to set up a "surrender appointment" which is often booked out a month or

Route 1 Land Redevelopment Study


The Prince George's County Planning Department recently awarded a consultant contract for the Route 1 Land Development Study in Beltsville to Smart Growth America and the Neighborhood Design Center. This study looks at the Subregion 1 Plan area along the Route 1 Corridor boundary from Quimby Avenue to Sunnyside Avenue, adjacent to the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center and the immediate surrounding neighborhoods, to develop a strategy that brings in various partners to formulate and

consider how to develop sustaining relationships that realize the vision set forth in the Subregion I Plan for this area, with the focus of bringing about coordination among the commercial and industrial uses with the surrounding neighborhoods. This coordinated effort ultimately focuses on improving the visual appearance of the area and ensuring a pedestrian-friendly environment that is a safe and enjoyable place to





The Browser Part 2

This month we will continue our "Using our Tools" series and the discussion on the browser. In part 1 we covered some web browser choices including Chrome, Edge, Firefox, and Safari which covers the majority of the browsers commonly found on the Internet. We also discussed the Tab Bar and the Tool Bar. This month we will cover important browser settings, private browsing, bookmarking, and history.

Browser Settings

These instructions are for a Chrome or Firefox browser running under windows. On the farright hand side of the browsers toolbar you should find a menu represented by either three lines or three dots stacked one on top of another. The three lines are often called a hamburger menu. Selecting the menu should pull-down a menu and near the bottom should be a choice of settings. Selecting settings will open a new browser tab with a menu on the left side where you will find "Privacy & Security". Selecting this will allow configuration of the privacy options supported by the browser.

There are a lot of setting here, but we will look at just a few. Cookies are used to track information between your browser and each web site you visit. Cookies are sometimes sent from external or "third party" web sites so you can be tracked between sites across the web. In general, this is a violation of your privacy. Whenever you see the Facebook F in a blue circle icon for example Facebook is tracking you and collecting information about which websites you have visited to share with other companies. This tracking occurs even if you do not have a Facebook account.

In Firefox use Enhanced Tracking Protection set to Strict to reduce the number of tacking tools that can be used to follow vou across the web. You can also have all cookies deleted whenever you close the browser. A separate "History" tool allows all of your Internet history to be erase to a previous point in time.

Chrome also provides sev-

eral similar tools, but these are grouped separately. For example, disabling third-party trackers is enabled separately for normal mode and "incognito" mode. Chrome is written by Google and Google make their money by selling targeted ads. So, Google tends to be less friendly to technology that makes it harder to target you as an individual. Currently offers

a tool called "Privacy sandbox"

that allows Google to run experiments on new ways of tracking customers without revealing specific identifying information about the user. I normally leave this disabled because they do not have a history of success.

Incognito Mode and Private Windows

All of the browsers seem to offer a Private Mode which take steps to reduce the amount of information that can be used to track your browser as you crawl the web. This good when you want to research your cousin's rare disease without getting followed by a million ads about potential cures. In this case the browser doesn't save your cookies, history, site data, or data entered into forms. This makes it harder for the sites to track you across other

site and across multiple sessions but be aware it does not totally protect you. Firefox has all of this which is further enhance by Advanced Tracking Protection, but the warning still applies.

If you need more privacy than Privacy or Incognito modes can give, I recommend using a good Virtual Private Network (VPN). Firefox offers the Mozilla VPN solution for a \$4.99 per month.

Bookmarks and History

So, I have been browsing the web for several hours researching let's say "Mantle Lanterns" and I have found several interesting sites that I want to come back to later and read in detail. The URLs are 80 characters long so I don't want to write then down, and my search result list is several pages long and I will never remember

how I found them. What do I do? I use a bookmark. The bookmark icon looks like a star (for favorites) found on the right side of the address bar in both Firefox and Chrome. Selecting the icon asks if you want to bookmark the page. Once a page has been bookmarked it can be found by looking it up in the bookmarks collection.

But what if I found something and I forgot to bookmark it? The browser tracks the history of where you have been on the web. This is sort of like Google Maps tracking where you have been on the map. The browser keeps a record of each page you have visited in chronological order and grouped by the domain (top level web site). If you remember the time, you last visited the website it can be pretty easy to look it up using the history. History is not kept if you are using a private window so is not useful in that case.

Next Time

Again, I have run out of time and space (where is a Tardis when I need one?). Next visit to "Using our Tools" I should be able to wrap up our discussion of the browser when I cover search engines, Home Pages, add-ons, and extensions.


Preventing Scams and Fraud this Holiday Season

(Statepoint) Scams and fraud are more deceiving these days, reaching you in more ways than ever before. The FTC reported 2.8 million fraud reports from consumers in 2021 alone, with reported fraud losses increasing 70% from 2020 and more than \$5.8 million.

Scammers begin their traditional uptick at the start of the holiday season, and identity theft protection expert Carrie Kerskie says being aware of what new cyber and phone fraud trends to look out for is your biggest defense against unwanted fraud.

"The more that we can get this information out there the better," Kerskie recently told T-Mobile Stories, "Unfortunately when it comes to technology, privacy and identity theft, the same old advice that was given 10, 15 years ago is still the gospel of what you're supposed to do. And that is outdated. None of it works. It's not true, it's not relevant anymore."

Scammers have expanded from targeting consumers with only traditional email and phone calls. The most recent trending scams are occurring using person-to-

person payment platforms or P2P, remote access software and even public Wi-Fi.

Kerskie says the most desirable accounts to criminals include bank accounts, mobile phone accounts, credit card accounts and Amazon accounts. Now, with P2P payment coffee shops or libraries using platforms, criminals can get access to your bank account and use it to transfer money within moments.

The latest tactic that concerns Kerskie is using remote access software to gain access to everything on your computer without having to directly ask you for things like your social security number, bank account or credit

card number. While many workers use remote access software safely from their companies' IT departments, criminals are also using this software in their scams.

Criminals also try to access your information in settings like public Wi-Fi. A laptop or smartphone using public Wi-Fi can easily fall victim to scams. An easy fix is to use your smartphone's wireless data and hotspot to help keep your personal information secure.

Kerskie says there are ways to






Jason's Jive By Jason Inanga

Let me start off with a recent situation that I just encountered on November 14 in Dallas. I had literally finished my day on road, picking up freight for the company I work for, and decided to go to Kentucky Fried Chicken to grab what would be my dinner for the evening. I went inside, placed my order, and paid by debit card. A patron had entered after me, and so he placed his order totaling \$11.90. HE gave the young male cashier \$20. Apparently, the cashier made a mistake and forgot to enter the cash amount tendered, so the register did not display how much change he should give back. I realized what had happened and was going to tell the cashier how much the change should be but decided to keep my mouth shut. He fumbled around for a bit, looked behind him but his coworkers were busy preparing orders, so he got his phone from his pocket and struggled with the calculator on his phone to get the amount of change he would have to present. Male customer looked on at him the whole time and said nothing. It then dawned on me that they both may have had difficulty with what should have been a very simple math situation.

I posted this experience on my social media account, and it has generated a lot of buzz. Other people commented on how sometimes, the cashiers would not get the amount of change right and would give too much change. The register tells them how much change is due but does not show the breakdown of the amount, so there is a need for mental math to see how many of the bills and

coins bring up the total due. Many people have said that there were instances where too much change was given, and they had to be honest and kind enough to return the excess.


This is the manifestation of a problem coming out of the schools and the attitude of young people toward math. I believe there needs to be a module of math that teaches them the use of a cash register and how to go about adding and subtracting or multiplying, in different scenarios. I believe an approach like this would make them a lot more receptive to some aspects of math.

When I taught the English Language at a Senior High School, in the Caribbean (St. Kitts) although it was not on the curriculum, I spent a two-week segment, teaching the children public speaking skills. I told them that at some point in life, they would have to stand up in front of an audience to speak, and at least they will have an idea of how to go about it. We did impromptu speeches and prepared speeches, and they loved it. Fast forward many years later, and some of these same students I taught are now politicians. Some are Ministers of Government or have been, and some have held appointments where they have to make presentations to global audiences. For example, The St. Kitts-Nevis Ambassador to the UN is a former student --- I remember mentoring her and a few others when they were 15 years old. I used to coordinate a monthly teen publication, Teen Times, which was a news and fashion publication for teenagers. The entire editorial staff comprised teenagers and they learned how to conduct interviews and write brief as well as lengthy articles based on the interviews. They had to negotiate to get advertisements, as well as talk to the sports shops about modeling the latest sportswear - I functioned as their photographer for them. Teen Times was very popular back then in the mid-1990s and we used to dread the end of the month when the publication came out as the school children would mob me to get a copy. Some would stand guard around my car in the parking lot, just to get a copy.

My childhood friend, classmate and neighbor, Branwen Okpako has just released a film, Return to Chibok. It is a sequel to a documentary that was done on the situation in Nigeria where 276 schoolgirls were kidnapped by Boko Haram. Branwen is working with me to get an article done, so look forward to it once we complete the article. The film was featured at an international film festival in London, earlier this month. The film is in Hausa, but with English subtitles.

Hope you had a nice Thanks-giving. Remember we have a lot to be thankful for. If you have the resources, please bring some cheer to a child around the world for Christmas. Many of the schools in Beltsville have the annual shoebox donations going on, where one puts a little gift package together, that fits into a shoe box. Contact local schools for this. I know Beltsville SDA School used to do this. Make a difference to somebody else.

keep scammers and fraud at bay ahead of the holiday shopping season.

Prioritize Privacy: Kerskie says, if it's easy for you, it's easy for a criminal. Privacy means having strong and unique passwords with a minimum of 12 characters, and for pins using random numbers and taking advantage of extra security. Enabling multi-factor authentication on your various apps and accounts will also protect yourself from potential threats.

Use Available Resources: Take advantage of the free anti-fraud safeguards offered by your mobile carrier. In the case of T-Mobile's Scam Shield, services include enhanced caller ID, scam ID and blocking, which flags suspicious calls and gives customers the option of blocking those numbers. Additionally, customers can get a free second number to keep their personal number personal, or even change their primary number completely.

Validate or Eliminate: Whatever potential threat you come across via email, text message, letter or even a phone call, try to validate the information. If you cannot confirm the information is true or confirm the senders' validity, throw it away, block the phone number or email address and report it as spam or junk mail.

Understanding how potential cyber threats and fraud work will help protect you this holiday season and beyond.


