Letter to the Editor

Beware of Unorthodox Towing Practices in Beltsville

On the afternoon of Saturday July 19, a disabled friend and I drove into the parking lot of the small shopping center at Dorsett Avenue and Baltimore Boulevard in Beltsville where the 7/11 is located. My friend entered the 7/11, and as I waited in the parked vehicle it was suddenly struck from behind. I jumped out and encountered a tow truck driver who admitted hitting the vehicle. He said I was illegally parked in a space reserved for the handicapped. I told him the driver was disabled. He asked for documentation for parking in a handicap space, but didn't wait for it and proceeded to attach the vehicle to his tow truck. I told him he

couldn't lawfully remove the vehicle from this space, but he said he was going to tow it anyway.

I called the police. While waiting for them to arrive, various merchants in the center approached me and said this man had been harassing their customers by towing their vehicles. When the Prince George's County Police arrived the officer talked first to the tow truck driver, then approached me. I presented documentation for parking in a handicap spot, and the officer told the tow truck driver to release my vehicle from the tow truck. He very reluctantly removed the vehicle from his truck. It took some convincing from the officer for him to do this. After the tow

truck driver left I asked the officer if I did anything wrong, and he said no.

The tow truck driver used intimidation. If I hadn't called the police, my disabled friend and I would have been stranded in 95-degree heat facing a \$150.00 towing cost.

The towing company has signs posted on the property stating that they will tow unauthorized vehicles from the property, but we were customers. How many customers have had their cars towed from these premises?

I am a 45 year resident of Beltsville and I have never faced anything like this in our community.



Eagle Scout Receives OA Triple Crown Award

Gregory Bauchan, an Eagle Scout from Troop 1033, received the Order of the Arrow Triple Crown Award in scouting by participating in the Order of the Arrow crews at the three high adventure camps of the Boy Scouts of America. Gregory had attended the high adventure backpacking camp at Philmont, New Mexico in 2006 and the high adventure canoeing camp in Ely, Minnesota in 2007, and completed his triple crown by attending the high adventure scuba diving camp at Sea Base near Islamorada, Florida this past June. The Order of the Arrow is the National Honor Society of the Boy Scouts of America. The Order of the Arrow Crews provides cheerful service at the base camps to improve the camping experience of future campers. Gregory spent a total of 13 days at Sea Base. The first week he completed his PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors) diving certification to become an open water scuba diver. The second week he went scuba diving twice a day providing fish survey information for the National Marine Sanctuary and the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). He saw nurse sharks, green Moray eels, lobsters, squirrel fish, queen angle fish, and barracuda just to name a few. His most memorial dive was a night drive one evening. The waters were as black as ink but with the aid of some

bright diving lights his crew was able to see nurse sharks swimming about as well as sea turtles and several colorful reef fish. He thoroughly enjoyed his two weeks at the Boy Scout Sea Base in the Florida Keys with swaying palm trees, crystal clear ocean water, warm weather and scuba diving twice a day. What is there not to enjoy? Congratulations to Gregory for providing service to future campers and completing this lofty award. Morris, Lois Michael

Lois Michael Morris, 81, a resident of Beltsville since 1957, former Lay-Chaplain, United Campus Ministry at the University of Maryland-College Park, died on June 18, 2008 at Washington Adventist Hospital, Takoma Park, MD of septic shock after a long illness. She was born in Oxford, Doddridge County, West Virginia, on March 21, 1927, the daughter of the late John G. and Audrey Delle Moore Michael

She was preceded in death,

in addition to her parents, by her husband of 41 years, Lindsay F. Morris, Jr., a USDA employee and WWII submarine veteran of the US Navy whom she married on December 4, 1944 and who died on August 6, 1986. She is survived by her sons, Kelly J. Morris, of Beltsville, Maryland, and Patrick L. Morris and his wife Sharon of Arnold, Maryland; by three granddaughters, Manuella L. Morris, Sandra M. Morris, and Nancy M. Morris, and one grandson, Diego K. Morris; by a great grandson, Perzie H. Teague, Jr., and a great granddaughter, Shayla A. Morris; and by many nephews and nieces.

Mrs. Morris graduated from Doddridge County High School in West Union, WV, in 1943 at the age of sixteen. She attended Salem College, now Salem International University, in Salem, WV. While at the University of Maryland, she completed numerous professional development courses in counseling, interpersonal growth group leadership, human sexuality, adult education, and training.

After World War II, she was active in the Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Doddridge County, WV. She served as its president and, to this day, is the youngest person ever to hold that office.

She moved to the Maryland suburbs of Washington, D.C., in 1949 and has lived here all but three years since then. She lived in her home on Emack Road in Beltsville since 1957.

From 1951 through 1953, she was Branch Chief, Reports Branch, of the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Washington, D.C. before staying home for nine years to spend time with her children. She was active in PTA and scouting. She and her husband were founding members of the former Beltsville United Presbyterian Church where she volunteered.

In 1962, she became Office Manager and Secretary to Chaplain Jesse Myers of the United Campus Ministry (UCM) at the University of Maryland-College Park. UCM was the campus ministry of the Church of the Brethren, the Disciples of Christ, the United Church of Christ, the United Methodist Church, and the United Presbyterian Church, USA. Dr. Myers and his successor, the Rev. Dr. David Loomis, encouraged her to develop her skills as a counselor and group facilitator. She was very popular with students as a counselas their mentor. As a group leader, there was intense competition for seats in the interpersonal growth groups that she led. She was a supporter of the Course Guide and of international students. She was the prime mover behind the Black Ministries initiative. She was an active program resource person, financial manager, an advisor to the UCM Board of Directors, and a member of the Chapel Staff. She spoke about campus ministry before congregations of all five denominations and occasionally assisted at worship services at the University Chapel. In 1971 she was elevated to Staff Team member, and in 1974 she became Lay-Chaplain.

Lutheran chaplain, the Rev. Beth Platz, was the first female ordained chaplain and Mrs. Morris was the first Lay-Chaplain in a counselor and group leader role. Together, they broke the gender barrier in campus ministry at the University of Maryland and created precedents for other universities and colleges.

During anti-war demonstrations in the 1970s, Mrs. Morris organized and supervised food and temporary lodging for demonstrators who took refuge from tear gas and police action on campus and in the streets. During one such incident, a tear gas canister was thrown into the sanctuary of the chapel.

She retired in 1976 for health reasons and devoted herself to her family and her passion for genealogy.

At her request, her remains were cremated and there will be no funeral services. Those who wish to express their sympathies can do so by making a contribution to the charity of their choice in her name. At a later date, her family will inter her ashes next to those of her late husband and her parents at the Michael Cemetery in Oxford, Doddridge County, WV.

Summer is finally here with its heat and humidity, and once again it's been a busy July in Upper Marlboro. At the end of every July, the County Council is very hectic as it wraps up outstanding legislation before August recess. We addressed a couple of things of note.

First, you may remember that LAST YEAR, the County Executive proposed increasing the telephone tax from 8% to 11%. The County Council approved that increase, subject to voter referendum. Well, the referendum will be on this year's ballot in November. We approved the official placement of the provision on the ballot, and it will be Question F (behind the bond bills for public facilities). I expect that there will be more discussion around this as

Second, the County Council just adopted an Energy Conservation Real Property Tax Credit. So, if you want to invest some money in energy efficiency that will pay dividends for you long-term, this tax credit will help reduce the cost to you. CB-11-2008 provides that if you add a "solar energy" or a "geothermal energy" device to your residence, you can apply for a tax credit on the "eligible costs" (those within 12 months of the application for the equipment and reasonable costs of installation). The tax credit will be the lesser of 50% of eligible costs, OR \$5,000 for a heating system or \$1,500 for a hot water supply system. And, this credit can be combined with State and Federal energy efficiency credits, which will really reduce your cost of investment. If you

are interested and have questions, please call me at 301.952.3887. There is only \$250,000 allocated to this credit per year, so you will want to apply before this year's credit is used up.

I'm looking forward to National Night Out this week because it should be a major event. With the sad loss of Sgt. Richard Findley, the tribute will be very meaningful. I am hopeful that we will see a large turnout for this tribute. In addition, I have worked with Camden Properties (the retail and restaurant addition to the IKEA shopping center) and with the new Buffalo Wild Wings to get them to support Beltsville activities. Camden has been very supportive in the past, having contributed approximately \$125,000 to Beltsville community needs such as High Point High School, Beltsville Elementary School, Martin Luther King Middle School, Frances Fuchs Early Learning Center, the Women's Club and the District VI Police station (the radar guns

and speed trailer).


This year Buffalo Wild Wings will make a presentation to the District VI station and to the Boy Scouts, and combined with funds from Camden and a grant from my office, it should add a nice note to the evening. Beltsville's Boy Scout Troop 1033 requested a grant to send 26 Beltsville area scouts to summer camp, and I was very pleased to be able to provide \$1,000 in funds to assist the Scouts in having a successful outing.

I want to commend Hope Christian Church on Ammendale Road for making gang violence a priority issue. Bishop Harry Jackson and his congregation are trying to work with the police and our youth to lessen violence and promote other more productive pursuits. On June 28th, Hope Christian partnered with the police and with me to host a 3-on-3 Basketball tournament. It was a great success and it is a great start to getting a handle on youth violence.

We are fast approaching the opening of the new Vansville Elementary School and I had a great conversation with the new Principal, Tom Smith. I know that Vansville will get off to a great start (just as soon as they finish it). Also, I dropped in at High Point High School and met Michael Brooks, the new Principal. It looks like he is getting his feet on the ground and will be ready to continue High Point's tradition of achievement when school opens in a few weeks.

I hope to see you at National Night Out. Stop over and say hello.

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Rosapepe's Report to Beltsville

Richard Findley — American hero

In recent weeks, all of us have been thinking of Prince George's Police Sergeant, Richard Findley — and praying for his family. He grew up in Calverton and risked and lost his life to protect his neighbors.

No words can say more about Beltsville's pride in him and thanks to him than the outpouring of thousands who attended his wake and funeral — colleagues in the Volunteer Fire Department and the Police Department, neighbors he grew up with, and people who had never met him.

If you can, please join the community in honoring Sergeant Findley at Beltsville's National Night Out against crime at the police station on Sellman Road at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 5.

Expanding Kenilworth Avenue

Upgrading Kenilworth Avenue (Route 201) to reduce traffic on Route 1 is critical to Beltsville. Karen Coakley asked at the Beltsville Civic Association's April 15 meeting, why the State Highway Administration (SHA) is now recommending limiting the upgrade to four lanes instead of six lanes as originally proposed. Delegates Barbara Frush, Ben Barnes, Joseline Peña-Melnyk and I contacted the highway administration to let them know about concern about this. Here's the response from Raja Veeramachaneni, head of Planning and Preliminary Engineering at SHA:

"The project is being developed in accordance with the federal environmental process. The US 201 widening will impact many protected natural environmental

and cultural resources. We will have to demonstrate very strong need before we will be allowed any impacts to those resources. Our traffic projections are based on the approved and cooperative land use forecast from the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG), and using their transportation model. Prince George's County and other local governments are part of the land use forecasting process for the MWCOG. The traffic forecasts do not justify six lanes on US 201, and therefore cannot propose it due to the environmental impacts. We have been discussing this issue with the County, and will be meeting with them soon to see if there is a gap in the forecast that MWCOG and SHA are not aware of. After this, we will be happy to discuss the issue with you."

We will be following up on this and keep you posted. If you have other questions about proposed road projects, please let us know.

ICC and the Cross Creek Golf Course

The Inter County Connector (ICC) road to link Rockville to Beltsville is under construction. Lawsuits to stop it have so far been unsuccessful. One part of it runs right next to the Cross Creek community in Beltsville. Recently we learned that in fact part of the 14th hole of the golf course was built in the ICC right of way. Amazingly neither the golf course management nor the SHA had told the homeowners about this mistake.

Together with Senator Rona Kramer who represents the Montgomery side of Cross Creek, I walked the right of way with community leaders and SHA staff. Councilman Tom Dernoga has joined us in our appeals to the SHA to fix this problem. We expect to hear SHA's suggested solutions soon.

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

continued from page 2 China in a Washington, DC Area Musical Salute to the 2008 Beijing Olympics entitled "Perform in Harmony–With Olympic Spirit."

The first stop for the Eleanor Roosevelt group was Hong Kong for a change of planes. Once the group arrived in Beijing and passed through customs with their luggage and instruments, they arrived at the Friendship Hotel at 8pm on Sunday night (there is a 12-hour time difference between Washington, DC and China). The next morning was spent sightseeing at the Temple

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of Heaven, where Emperors went to fast and pray. The afternoon was spent in rehearsal with the other bands invited to participate in the "Salute": an Oxon Hill High School Band, bands from Virginia and California, and the University of Maryland Community Band, directed by Mr. John Wakefield.

Tuesday morning was spent seeing the Olympic Village as it was being prepared for the upcoming Olympics, and then on to Tian Anmen Square and the Jade Factory. The first concert of the series was performed at a school for the arts in Beijing. The Oxon Hill band performed first. Then, the Roosevelt band performed, following by the Community Band. Then, all three bands performed together. This was followed by a performance by a traditional Chinese orchestra. Gifts of friendship were exchanged between the band directors. Each American director was given a porcelain egg to symbolize his or her friendship through the arts.

The next day, after touring the Forbidden City, the ancient palace of Emperors, the massed band performed at the Forbidden City Concert Hall. All five American bands performed in addition to a children's Chinese orchestra and a children's Chinese band.

Thursday's itinerary included climbing the Great Wall of China and performing there. The rainy weather prohibited playing the concert, but everyone got great exercise climbing the Wall. That night was spent at the Peking Opera where the group was entertained by traditional Chinese music and dance.

The next day, the group flew to Xi'an for two days, where they toured the Big Wild Goose Pagoda, the wall around the city of Xi'an and the Terra-Cotta Warriors museum. Xi'an is a city that dates back thousands of years when the first Emperor claimed it as the capital city of China. A highlight of the visit to Xi'an was an 18-course dumpling feast at the legendary De Fa Chang Restaurant.

On to Shanghai, the group met up with the other bands to play a concert at the Shanghai Oriental Arts Center. The final days in China were spent touring and shopping in Shanghai. The sights included the Bund, where old meets new along the Huangpu River waterfront, the Silk Factory and the Yu Gardens and Market.


Beltsville Young at Heart



Of course there was much excitement for the eighth grade students towards the end of the year as they anxiously awaited high school acceptance letters and


