## **Free Healthcare for** the Uninsured



## Condominium Fire in Beltsville

On Monday morning, December 17, 2007, residents of two three-story condominium buildings on Cherry Hill Road in Beltsville, were sent fleeing from their apartments to escape a fire that was quickly overtaking the buildings. It became a three-alarm fire that required over 100 firefighters to put it out. One of those buildings was totally destroyed and the other suffered moderate damage. Each building contained 15

apartments. Two firefighters were reportedly injured, but no one else was hurt and no lives were lost in the fire.

The property manger reported on December 20 that 12 of 15 units in one of the buildings were totally repaired and the residents had moved back. The other building must be rebuilt.

The American Red Cross of the National Capital Area responded to the scene of the fire and set up a

temporary shelter at the neighboring Maryland Farms community center. Volunteers and staff provided assistance to 25 families for food, clothing and shelter. The Red Cross stated it would continue to work closely with property management and emergency personnel to meet the immediate disaster needs of the displaced residents.



Although the weather was cold, the warmth of human kindness made it bearable. This was the second year that John & Felicia Anna, owners of Adirondack, have provided this community service activity.





Barbara Rose Wood passed peacefully at home, and in the arms of her family, after an 8-year battle with Cancer.

Born March 8th, 1933, Barbara grew-up in Beltsville, MD, and as a teenager worked the counter at the old "Doc's Drug Store" on Route 1. Spending most of her adult life in Beltsville, Barbara worked for the Bureau of Mines, at The University of Maryland, and retired from the Department of Agriculture after 25 years. While at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center, Barbara was assigned to

the Poultry Division, and finally at Dairy Heard Improvement, where she was a Computer Analyst. Barbara also served as a member of the Board of Directors at the BARC Federal Credit Union. She later served several terms at President of the BARC Federal Credit Union.

Working professionally through the 1960's and 1970's in an industry and age where few women were, Barbara's on-the-job abilities and 'can-do' personality traits exceeded the expectations of her peers and managers. Barbara was requested to join The Federal Women's Program. It was here Barbara championed for the equal rights of other professional women in the Federal Government. This capacity took Barbara across the nation to investigate in and report on many agencies within the United States Government where women's workplace rights were either in question, or were being violated. Her vigorous investigative work caught the attention of Fellow Government Manager and future Maryland Delegate Mr. Obie Patterson {District 26}, where his recommendation led to the escalation of Barbara's title and position to that of Manager of the Federal Women's

Since her retirement in 1985, Barbara had enjoyed her home life with her husband Charles, in their Chesapeake Bay town of North Beach, MD. Husband, Charles, retired from the Prince George's County Fire Department, where he was one of the original paid firemen from that same county, as well as a current life-member of Beltsville Volunteer Fire Department. He was born near the Agricultural Farm and raised on Beaver Dam Road with his parents and siblings.

Her beloved husband Charles and two sons, Dennis K. Wood of Beltsville, MD and William M. 'Bill' Wood of Huntingtown, MD survive Barbara. Son Charles E. 'Eddie' Wood Jr. (surviving wife Deborah Hinch Wood) died on July 13, 2006.

The accreditation is a tribute to our dedicated staff and Board members who work tirelessly to maintain a camp that is second to none."

To earn the ACA accreditation, a camp must pass a rigorous inspection of its entire operation. Certified ACA inspectors reviewed eight key policy and procedure areas during their visit to LCM in July 2007: Site and Food Service, Transportation, Health and

Wellness, Operational Management, Human Resources, Program Design and Activities, Program Aquatics, and Program Adventure Challenge. After passing these Standards, LCM was awarded an accreditation through 2009.

LCM has been accredited for several years; however, following the retirement of Robert Rainey, the former camp administrator and the employment of new staff, the ACA required an interim examination to ensure the organization was compliant and maintained the Standards. After Heather Magoon was hired, she attended an ACA Standards and camp administrator's course to become familiar with ACA requirements and her new duties and responsibilities. The training she received helped prepare her for the Standards inspection as well as managing the camp program.

"ACA Accreditation is an excellent management tool that reminds us of our duties and responsibilities to the parents of the children who attend our camp," stated Gregory Floberg, development/ executive director. "It provides us with a procedures check-list that helps us meet the expectations that each parent has and we're honored to have earned the ACA's recognition."

Each year, over 3,500 youth visit LCM because it's a popular destination for camping, canoeing, swimming, archery, challenge ropes course, hiking, bird watching and more. In addition to the youth with special needs, the camp is a popular venue for the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H, school and church groups and others who benefit from having a facility that is close by, reasonably priced and offers so many activities to choose from.





## Maryland National Leader in Life Sciences

Declaring that Maryland's future economic success must be tied to the life sciences industry, Comptroller Peter Franchot joined with leading members of Maryland's research, business, academic, investor and scientific communities at the Maryland Life Science Summit.

The Summit, held in Columbia, Maryland and sponsored by the Comptroller's Office, also featured the release of the Maryland Life Science Economic Impact Study which showed beyond a reasonable doubt that Maryland is a national leader in the life sciences and the highlighted the tremendous economic benefits the industry brings to the state. The study also recommended several strategies the state could use to foster further growth in this vital sector.

"It is clear that Maryland is already one of the world's leading centers for the life sciences, and I am determined keep us at the forefront of this dynamic and life-changing industry." said Comptroller Franchot. "However, if Maryland is to maintain its economic prosperity and competitive edge, we must redouble our efforts to support the life sciences industry. That's what this entire summit was about, and I am delighted that we had such a broad, cross section of Marylanders in attendance."

Summit attendees represented almost all Maryland economic sectors, including: health care, legal, financial, investment banking, construction, manufacturing, tourism, education, telecommunications, real estate, engineering, government contracting, information technology, biotechnology, nanotechnology and aerospace.

In addition, the state's federal and military institutions were represented along with local and state elected officials. While in the past meetings of this sort have been limited by geography and industry sector, the goal here was to bring together a diverse group from all over the state and convene a summit that would have input from all interested stakeholders.

"This Life Science Summit can serve as a powerful catalyst as we search for comprehensive strategies to take Maryland's life sciences industry to new heights in the international arena, said State Delegate Brain Feldman. "I commend Comptroller Franchot for taking the lead in organizing this critically important event."

The Summit featured presentations that provided analysis and forecasts for the state's life science investment climate and the state's life science real estate market. There were several presentations highlighting the economic development opportunities surrounding the extensive network of federal institutions in the state.

The state's research efforts and educational strategy were presented by speakers such as Johns Hopkins University President William Brody, University System of Maryland Chancellor William "Brit" Kirwan and National Cancer Institute Director John E. Niederhuber. In addition, Mr. James Pitts, Corporate Vice President and President of Northrop Grumman Electronic Systems spoke of the need for the private sector to actively get involved in the state's secondary education system to help foster the well educated workforce needed for all technology sectors.

"Engineers and scientists, including those required in the life sciences industry, are so vitally critical to ensuring the future quality of life for all of us, including the security of our nation," said Jim Pitts, corporate vice president and president Northrop Grumman Electronic Systems.

"We stand on the threshold of exciting new discoveries that promise to revolutionize how we treat illness and prevent disease," said JHU President William Brody. "Maryland is where some of the most exciting roads to discovery in medicine are going to originate, and working here are the women and men who will be charting the way."

Other speakers included former National Science Foundation Director Dr. Rita Colwell, Dr. John Dyer, Deputy Commissioner and COO, U.S. Food and Drug Administration; Mr. Darryl Rekemeyer, Director, Fort Detrick Business Development Office; Matt Zuga, Managing Director, Red Abbey Venture Partners; Robert Scheer, President, Scheer Partners; Mr. Drew Greenblatt, President, Marlin Steel Wire Products, www.marlinwire.com; and Jonathan Genn, Executive Vice President of Percontee Inc.

"Thanks to Maryland's colleges, universities and research centers, our state is well positioned for dominance in the life sciences," said Chancellor Kirwan. "The University System of Maryland alone attracted nearly \$1 billion in external research funding last year, some of which contributed to Maryland's position as the top state

in attracting R&D funding in the life sciences. Our challenge now is to further enhance the partner-ship between government leaders, university officials and business leaders to make the decisions and investments needed for the state to realize its full potential as a life sciences leader."

The Summit also featured the release of the Maryland Life Sciences Economic Impact Report. The study was conducted by Sage Policy Research Group whose analysis measured the economic and fiscal contributions of both private bioscience enterprises and institutional employees directly engaged in research and development activities.

Based on this analysis, the study team concludes that Maryland's bioscience sector is among the nation's largest, if not the largest, generating \$29 billion in economic output, supporting 120,000 total jobs, \$11 billion in income and nearly \$600 million in State government taxes annually. Jobs supported directly by the state's life sciences industry pay \$108,000/ annum on average. Almost onefifth of bioscience workers hold doctorates and over half have graduates degrees. In other words, the sector supports nearly 5 percent of Maryland's total employment, more than 8 percent of its wage/ salary income, and over 11 percent of gross state product.

Over the next decade, Maryland's biotech sector is poised to become even more globally preeminent. The development of two biotechnology parks in Baltimore City in conjunction with the massive and expanding life sciences cluster in Maryland's D.C. Suburbs may be enough to push Maryland past Massachusetts and California assuming that Maryland isn't already number one.

The Comptroller and the report offered several strategies to ensure this growth including: allocating a higher percentage of State pension fund dollars toward investment in technology industries; increasing funding for its seed funding programs such as TEDCO, DBED's Maryland Venture Fund and UMCP's MIPS program; adding tax incentive programs to encourage private sector investment in the state and proactively identifying Marylanders who could benefit from those programs.

The biotechnology leadership will especially benefit Montgomery County with its more than 200 biotech companys. In addition the InterCounty Connector (ICC) connecting I-95 at Laurel will greatly benefit Montgomery County, create over 10,000 new jobs and require thousands of new homes in what can be called the second wave of the region's booming housing market.

life worthwhile, that costs the least and does the most, is just a pleasant smile.





shortening, ½ tsp salt, 1 tsp soda, 1 heaping tbsp ginger.




top. It needs to be solid, not shaky or wet; if so, keep baking until it is. Let it cool, sprinkle with powdered sugar, or eat plain.

The community also stepped in to help. One student living in a burned out condominium is a student at Beltsville Elementary School. The family relocated to a family member's home in Beltsville. Meanwhile, the faculty at Beltsville Elementary contributed clothing, food, and money for the family, and that effort continues.

Five students at Calverton Elementary also lived in the fire-damaged condominiums. The faculty at Calverton Elementary, along with lots of help from parents, contributed clothing, food, and money for the displaced families. The day of the fire, Calverton Elementary School initiated an effort to help the families of students at the school that were affected by the fire. A list of families with the number of people and sizes of clothing needed was disseminated to faculty and others. Plans to distribute the donated items were scheduled for Friday, December 21st, the last day before the school closed for the winter break. Mrs. Luz Santiazo, parent coordinator, and Mrs. Pamela Roberts, the professional school counselor, coordinated the drive. One may contact Mrs. Roberts by phone at 301.572.0640. According to school nurse, Elizabeth Hairston, "There has been overwhelming support from the staff of Calverton Elementary School."

The Beltsville Volunteer Fire/ EMS Station is accepting gift card donations on behalf of the children of the displaced residents of the Cherry Glen Condominium Complex. Beltsville Volunteer Fire Chief Al Schwartz stated, "We have fielded numerous requests from citizens and residents that want to help these families in some way. Our Fire/EMS Station will serve as a collection point and conduit between those wanting to donate and the displaced residents." The station is located at 4911 Prince George's Avenue in Beltsville.

Kathy Mellott and Ann Rowland, members of the Homeless Committee at Emmanuel United Methodist Church in Beltsville, felt the need to help these families in their time of immediate need. They organized a drive to collect clothing and made a delivery to Cherry Glen on December 20. The property manager stated later that day that there was no more room available to store donated items, and suggested that people instead donate gift cards to the Beltsville Fire Department so that people may purchase what they need

The property manager at Cherry Glen Condominiums, Inc. said that everyone involved in the aftermath of this crisis has been superb. She praised the firefighters, the personnel from ATF, fire investigators, and everyone involved from the Prince George's County government, including County Executive Jack Johnson.


