Our new Speaker of the House of Delegates, District 21's Joseline Peña-Melnyk

Joseline Peña-Melnyk Makes History as Maryland House Speaker

History was made on Tuesday, December 16, 2025, as Delegate Joseline Peña-Melnyk became the first Afro-Latina and first immigrant to be named Speaker of the Maryland House of Delegates. She is the 109th Speaker and only the second woman of color to hold the position.

Peña-Melnyk has represented District 21, including Beltsville, for a decade, earning a reputation as a tireless advocate for her community. She was a constant presence at meetings during the fight against Tiffany Green over the local fire department, proving her commitment to constituents.

Born in the Dominican Republic, she immigrated to the U.S. as a child and grew up in New York with her single mother and sister. Her website notes, "Her mom worked in New York's garment industry, often struggled to make ends meet, and there was a time when the family was on welfare because Joseline's father did not pay child support. But despite tough circumstances, Joseline succeeded in school and learned English."

Delegate Ben Barnes praised her as "somebody who will be there for you in a time of need, someone who will pick you up when you need it." Her reputation

Happy New Year!

While helping local families at Thanksgiving, I learned about a wonderful year-round food assistance program called **SHARE Food Network**. Operated by Catholic Charities, SHARE allows anyone to purchase wholesome, nutritious groceries at a greatly reduced cost—no application or eligibility requirements needed.

For just **\$30 per month**, participants can purchase a **Value Package** that includes up to **\$50 worth of food**. The December package, for example, included a whole chicken, one pound of marinated chicken strips, one pound of tilapia fillets, one pound of ground sausage, and **8-12 pounds of fresh produce**. Packages typically contain **four to six pounds of frozen protein** along with fresh fruits and vegetables, and seasonal items or desserts are often available.

Artist Natalie Fleming Takes First Place

Natalie Fleming's "Croton in Bloom" received the coveted first place award at the Patuxent Art League's 9th Annual Open Juried Art Exhibit. A plant growing on her Montpelier Arts Center studio windowsill inspired the free-flowing watercolor of the tropical croton.

One hundred and ten artists submitted their artwork to be displayed at this Montpelier Cultural Arts Center exhibition and 60 were selected. Award winning pieces had good workmanship, composition and color. According to founder Rose Lomangino, the

Patuxent Art League was founded to provide opportunities for greater exposure for area artists.

Fleming has degrees in art and has taught art in the Montgomery County school system. Her paintings have been widely exhibited in galleries in Annapolis, Alexandria, Baltimore and Laurel. She has also exhibited at the Smithsonian and was an exchange artist to Kazakhstan. Her medium is most often watercolor and photography featuring the beauty of nature, but she has worked with acrylics, oil and printmaking. Her works of art are done in one of her three studios in Calverton, at the Montpelier Arts Center in Laurel, or at the Berkeley Springs area of West Virginia.

Ask the Expert

As temperatures begin to drop and forecasts hint at the season's first frost, preparing your home for a cold winter becomes essential for comfort, safety, and energy efficiency. Winterizing doesn't have to be overwhelming; with a strategic plan and a few practical steps, you can shield your home from harsh conditions while reducing heating costs. Here are key areas to focus on as you get ready for the colder months.

1. Inspect and Strengthen Your Home's Insulation

Proper insulation is one of the most effective ways to keep warm air inside and cold air out. Start by checking your attic, basement, and crawl spaces, as these areas often lose heat quickly. Ensure that insulation is thick, dry, and evenly distributed. If you feel drafts around windows or doors, consider adding weatherstripping or caulking to seal gaps. If your home has older single-pane windows, consider upgrading to double- or triple-pane designs for long-term energy savings and improved comfort.

5. Maintain Your Roof and Gutters

Heavy snow and ice can strain your roof, so inspect shingles for cracks, curling, or missing sections. Replace damaged areas

before winter storms arrive. Clean gutters and downspouts to ensure that melting snow can drain properly, reducing the risk of ice dams, which can cause leaks and structural damage.

6. Prepare for Winter Emergencies

Unexpected storms or power outages are common in winter. Stock up on essentials like bottled water, nonperishable food, flashlights, batteries, and warm blankets. A backup generator can be invaluable in maintaining heat during extended outages. Also ensure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are functioning, as heating systems are used more heavily during winter months.

7. Winterize Outdoor Areas

Store garden hoses, shut off exterior faucets, and cover outdoor furniture to prevent weather damage. If you have walkways or driveways, keep salt, sand, or de-icing products on hand to ensure safe footing during icy conditions.

Preparing your home for winter not only protects your property but also provides peace of mind as cold weather approaches. With thoughtful planning and a few proactive measures, you can enjoy a warm, safe, and energy-efficient home all season long.

Advocacy for the Eastern Ecological Science Center at Patuxent Research Refuge, Now More than Ever

Dear Friends of Patuxent Research Refuge,

During the last several months you have followed with us the very real threat that has been proposed by this Administration to essentially wipe out the budget, positions, and personnel at the Eastern Ecological Science Center of USGS that operates at Patuxent Research Center.

By way of brief background, the USGS operates 17 science centers across the country which are designated under the Ecosystems Mission Area, one of 7 mission areas of USGS. At the recommendations of the Department of Government Service (DOGE), the President's budget for FY26 called for wiping out virtually the entire Ecosystems Mission Area, presumably because the Administration feels that the work they accomplish is no longer in line with their priorities. However, since that budget proposal was released earlier this year, the Friends of Patuxent and more than 75 national and international organizations have embarked on a campaign to inform the President and his Administration how vital the work of EESC is for our nation.

Under the Administration's budget proposal, the staff and work units at Patuxent would be eliminated. These include but are not limited to the Bird Banding Lab, the repository of all bird banding records in the US and from around the world

that are vital to not just scientists and researchers, but to waterfowl hunters across the country because of their importance in determining flyway populations and distribution of waterfowl species; the Breeding Bird Survey, an annual citizen science-aided collection of data that identifies breeding bird species throughout North America; and the Bee Lab, a research program that identifies, catalogues, and studies native bee populations which are seriously declining across America. All this, and more, would be eliminated if current budget recommendations are approved.

There is hope, however, that Congress will not allow such draconian cuts to be enacted. The House and Senate approved preliminary topline budget appropriations that would cut programs and spending in the EMA, but not at amounts contemplated by the Administration. It is vital that advocates like us speak out and encourage members of Congress on both sides of the aisle to reject the devastating cuts to USGS in the Ecosystems Mission Area, to save the Eastern Ecological Science Center at Patuxent and the other fish and wildlife science programs in the Eastern US, and to restore funding to the levels that the House and Senate Interior Appropriations Committees have already approved.

Won't you take just a few minutes to compose an email or make a phone call to your Members of Congress?

Addressees: All members of the Maryland Congressional delegation matter, with special emphasis on those whose districts touch or encompass parts of the Patuxent Research Refuge, namely both Maryland's Senators, Sen Chris Van Hollen and Angela Alsobrooks, and Representatives Elfreth, Ivey, and Hoyer, whose districts 3, 4, and 5 include a portion of the Patuxent Research Refuge.

NOTE: Any messages to Maryland's US Members of Congress whose districts don't cover Patuxent Research Refuge should appeal to the importance of this facility to Maryland and the nation. Members with a direct connection to Patuxent identified below are starred (*).

Handwritten letters or postcards are very effective, but they take a long time to process through Congressional mail handling. It is fine if you write a traditional letter and mail it, but please follow up with an email or phone call.

Very importantly, if you live in US Congressional district 3, 4, or 5, be sure to include "As your constituent..." in every call or message you write. This is extremely helpful and







Technology New Year 2026

This month is a potpourri of miscellaneous technology information covering a wide variety of unrelated items.

RAM Shortage Effects Home Users

Random Access Memory (RAM) is now in short supply. The impact affects new computers, graphics cards, Solid State Drives (SSD), and every other device using RAM memory. Industry blames high RAM demand from the AI industry for the RAM pricing increases. Many are expecting it to take 2 to 3 years until memory prices return to normal levels. Manufacturers of computers, laptops, game machines, and other consumer electronics will increase by 10% to 25% in the first half of 2026 and may go up as far as 40% before the end of the year.

Raspberry Pi Prices Creep Up

If you read my column, you know I am a fan of the Raspberry Pi collection of small inexpensive single board computers. The prices of some of the Pi 4 and Pi 5 units have started to creep up. The cause, creeping prices for RAM memory. The Pi 4 cost for 4 GB is \$5 more than the previous \$55, and the 8 GB version is now \$10 more. The Pi 5 has added back the 1 GB version for \$45, while the 2GB, 4GB, 8GB, and 16 GB, increased by \$5, \$10, \$15, and \$25 each. The Raspberry Pi organization has said they expect their prices will come back down when RAM prices return to normal.



AI Doesn't Keep Secrets

AI chatting has become popular in recent months. If you share a secret with a friend, you expect them to keep the secret and not share it with others. Sadly, many AI systems store their conversations to "improve" their AI. This information is recoverable by others and exposing your shared secrets. AI friends are not trustworthy.

iRobot Bankrupts

My aunt once told me that the greatest invention I could create would be an automatic vacuum robot to clean her carpet. I passed on that project, but iRobot created the successful autonomous Roomba, devices to sweep, mop, and vacuum your floors (actions depend on the models). It even learned how to avoid animal feces to prevent them from spreading them all over the room. The Roomba would learn how to map the floor and would find its power

station automatically connecting to recharge.

Sadly, iRobot has fallen into bankruptcy and its assets transferred to a Chinese firm. In 2022, Amazon attempted to purchase the company, but anti-trust concerns thwarted the plan.

Air Tags for Android Phones

The Apple Air Tag is a great device for Apple Phones. You can attach the Air Tag to things like car keys and the Apple will communicate with the Tag and help you find the missing item. People have used this to find luggage, missing bikes, pets, and a large number of missing devices. The Air Tags work so well because the tags will talk to any nearby Apple Phone and relay the information about the tag to the phone that is looking for it.

Air Tags are the Apple name for these tags. Today we know alternate or Android Tags as Bluetooth Tags, Bluetooth Trackers, or

Smart Tags. A couple of years ago Google decided to give Android phones a similar capability to find Smart Tags. Google does not make the tags themselves, but they created a standard so that all of the conforming tags will work with the Android devices. Some of these newer tags work with both Apple and Android (look for Chipolo Brand).

Sadly, based on reports I have read, these tags seem to work well if the lost device is nearby but not if they are at a distance. I have an older device, and it is great finding things in my house when I am home. However, it doesn't work well when I'm home, but the tag is somewhere else. These issues seem to be issues with Android networking issues. I have heard that recent updates have improved some of the Android issues. I hope to get some newer tags to test on various Android devices in the future.

Media Tools: VLC Media Player

I am not sure if I have ever mentioned the VLC media in a previous column. VLC is a Media Player that works with Linux, Windows, macOS, Android, and iOS. It supports audio and video; it plays many different formats for both audio and video, and supports streaming across networks, and playing CD and DVD discs. VLC is free and open source (FOSS). You can download the phone versions from the Apple Store and Google Play. If you don't already have it, you should try it.

Media Tools: Handbrake Video Converter

Handbrake is a video format converter. It is free and open source and is very useful when you need to convert between different video formats. I typically use it to convert movies made on old video cameras into MP4 video files to play on my computer. It is also useful for converting DVDs into other formats allowing watching on portable devices.

Media Tools: Audacity

Audacity is a free and open-source sound editor. I have used it to create ringtones for telephones and remove noises from old vinyl albums. Once I started with a silent 8mm film converted to a VHS tape. I converted the tape to an MP4 video file on my computer. I then watched the film with my 100-year-old grandfather asking him questions about what we were seeing and recording the conversation. I then used audacity to remove any extraneous noises. Finally, I used a video editor to add the soundtrack to the video so viewers and listen to the narration provided by my grandfather and me.

- Follow a healthy diet: Drink water instead of sugar-sweetened beverages and eat nutritious, whole foods, including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, nuts and seeds, low-fat dairy products and lean proteins. Avoid unhealthy ultra-processed foods, especially those with high levels of added sodium, saturated fats and sugar. Drinking sugary beverages, even 100% fruit juice, is

associated with a higher mortality risk, according to a study published in JAMA Network Open.

- Stay hydrated: Drink plenty of water or other beverages composed mostly of water, such as milk or herbal tea, to avoid dehydration and to keep your body functioning properly. Even mild dehydration can drain your energy and make you tired. Adult men should get about 15.5 cups of fluids a day and women should get 11.5 cups, according to the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine.

- Get plenty of good sleep: To maintain your health and emotional well-being, most adults need 7 to 9 hours of quality sleep. Rest helps boost immunity and improve mental clarity.

- Update vaccinations: Vaccinations remain the best defense

Reporting Missed Waste Collection to PGC311

To report any concerns to an agency within Prince George's County, start with PGC311. You can access this by calling 3-1-1, visiting PGC311.com, or using the PGC311 App, which you can download from your phone's App Store.

If your waste collection (trash, recycling, or compost) is not completed, there is a new standard for the window to report this concern to the Department of Environment (DoE) through PGC311. Residents can report missed collections starting at 12:00 PM on the day of collections, and as late as the close of business the following business day.





This would close the Bird Banding Lab, the Breeding Bird Survey, and the Bee Lab among other very important programs to not just Maryland, but to our nation. Please ensure that funding is included in FY 26 Appropriations to keep these vital programs and staff funded.
- I am writing to ask you to please do all you can to save the Ecosystems Mission Area of the USGS FY 26 budget. This program contains the Bird Banding Lab, the Breeding Bird Survey, the Bee Lab, and all the scientists and biologists at Patuxent Research Refuge who are in danger of being eliminated. Please ensure that this program is funded in the FY 26 budget.

against flu and other serious respiratory viruses. Since significant flu activity can stretch into May, it's not too late to get a flu shot. The AMA recommends vaccination as long as the threat of flu remains. Talk with your physician or other health care professional to determine which vaccines are right for you. To cut through vaccine confusion and have open, honest conversations with your physician, first go to the AMA website for evidence-based information. For help finding a flu vaccine in your

area, visit GetMyFluShot.org.

- Drink in moderation: If consuming alcohol, do so in moderation as defined by the U.S. Dietary Guidelines: up to one drink per day for women and two drinks for men, and only for adults of legal drinking age.


- Quit tobacco, nicotine and e-cigarettes: Ask your doctor or health care professional for resources and guidance to help quit smoking, vaping or using other nicotine products. Make your home and car smoke-free to eliminate secondhand smoke exposure.

- Follow medication directions: When taking prescriptions, store

them safely to prevent diversion or misuse, and properly dispose of any leftover medication. If you're prescribed antibiotics, complete the full course to prevent antibiotic resistance.
