It has been a while since we've shared an update regarding the career staffing at the Beltsville Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD) and where we stand on possible temporary housing for both personnel and apparatus while any life safety hazards are addressed at our permanent station.

As of today, the County still has not been able to provide the results of our station assessment that was started on March 4th, we were told it may take up to 6 weeks to be completed, so hopefully we will receive that in the near future. The BVFD requested that an air quality test be performed during the

Beltsville Community Cats Miracles

Beltsville Community Cats (BCC) operates a successful rescue program, having trapped, spayed/ neutered, and vaccinated over 1,500 cats between 2019 and 2023. Of these, almost half were taken into BCC's rescue program. Many of the young kittens and abandoned house cats rescued by BCC initially have minor illnesses that must be promptly treated. However, some are severely ill. Here are two of many stories of cats that BCC saved from near death:

In late 2021, a man brought a



kitten to a BCC volunteer, mentioning that it might be sick before quickly leaving. The volunteer was shocked to find the kitten barely clinging to life and covered in filth. Rushed to the vet, the kitten, appropriately named Lazarus, was diagnosed to be suffering from severe dehydration, malnutrition, a respiratory infection, parasites, and ear mites. It was given medication and follow-up care for three weeks, eventually recovering. Lazarus was then adopted into a loving home where he brings immense joy to the family.

Early in 2023, a unique-looking cat with a serious limp appeared at a BCC volunteer's home. Despite



efforts to locate the owner through social media, no one came forward. The cat, named Ghost, was taken to the vet, where he was diagnosed with Feline Leukemia (FeLV) and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV). Despite the vet's recommendation for euthanasia, BCC chose to advertise Ghost for a special needs' adoption. He was eventually adopted by a woman with experience as a vet tech.

BCC recently received a report that Ghost, now named Yoshi, is thriving in his new home where he receives extra care to manage his health conditions. He is described as mellow and brave. He has become a beloved member of the family and is especially close to their 10-year-old daughter. A DNA test revealed his mixed heritage that includes Bengal, British Shorthair, and Persian ancestry.

BCC does all that it can to save cats and kittens that need more than typical veterinary care such as Lazarus and Yoshi. We appreciate all those who are willing to take on the responsibility of caring for special needs cats. While a special needs kitty may demand a little extra care and time, the love that their owners receive in return makes it all worthwhile.



I'm sitting and waiting for the Eclipse with excitement. Sitting here I thought of some quick ideas for spring house projects and improvements to share:



All Hands On Deck!

The State of Maryland has 3,190 miles of coastline, which provides excellent recreational boating opportunities for local residents. You may have noticed the increase in boats throughout Beltsville. Please be sure to make sure your boat complies with County codes and regulations.

Boats must be tagged and legally parked. (A) The boat and boat trailer shall be located at least eight (8) feet from a street line; (B) The boat and boat trailer shall be parked on a dust-free surface area such as concrete, asphalt, or gravel; (C) The boat and boat trailer shall be properly licensed and operable; (D) The boat and boat trailer shall not be in excess of twenty (20) feet unless located on a lot at least two (2) acres in size: and (E) The boat and boat trailer shall be covered to prevent the accumulation of water.

These and other violations of the County Code may result in a fine or other consequences. You may not store untagged vehicles, old vehicle parts, junk cars or motorcycles, old appliances,

Obituaries

Doris A. Eugene May 17, 1934 ~ April 8, 2024 Lifetime advocate for children & education

Doris Ann Eugene, 89, passed away Monday April 8, 2024, in Easton, MD. Doris was born in New Orleans, Louisiana on May 17, 1934 to Louis P. and Lucille (Rossi) Gaudin. Doris was married for 66 years, to Gerard L. Eugene, also of New Orleans, and a pharmacist with the US Public Health Service.

Doris lived on both coasts of the United States as Gerard was stationed in New York (twice), Connecticut, California and Washington, DC. When Gerard retired from the USPHS, they decided to remain in the DC area. Doris and Gerard raised their four children (2 sons and 2 daughters) in Beltsville, MD where Doris lived in the same house for 51 years before moving to a retirement community in Easton, MD in February 2021.

Wherever they lived, Doris was always involved with the PTAs of her children's schools. She was twice elected as President of the Prince George's County Council of PTAs. In 1978, Doris was appointed by then Maryland Governor Winfield M. Kelly, Jr. to fill a vacancy on the Board of Education of Prince George's County. Doris won election to the PGC

School Board three times, serving a total of 14 years, including multiple terms as the Board's vicechairman and chairman. Upon her retirement in1992, Doris received many letters of commendation and appreciation from across local, state and national educational groups, and from Maryland's US Representative Steny Hoyer and US Senator Barbara Mikluski.

In 1994, Doris was honored to be nominated and included among the "Women of Achievement in PGC History."

After retiring from the School Board in 1992, Doris and Gerard enjoyed many years of traveling both the United States and the world with their friends. Among their favorite trips, besides visiting family in New Orleans for Oyster Po'boys, were trips to Alaska and the Artic Circle; to the majestic beauty of the Grand Tetons, Mt Rushmore, Sedona, and the Grand Canyon; to Holland during tulip season; to South America and traveling through the Panama Canal; and a river boat cruise through Russia.

The Prince George's Community Federal Credit Union awards \$10,000 in scholarships to four Prince George's County scholars.



World Password Day 2024

World Password Day occurs on the first Thursday each May. This year it is May 2nd. The day makes a good reminder to update passwords and verify or reset your security settings. To follow the best security practices, modify your passwords at least annually and use a different password for everything that needs protection. In general, a secure password consists of at least 15 characters, including a mix of upper- and lower-case alphabetic characters, digits, and special characters.

Keeping your passwords secure is one of the most important things you need to do to keep your accounts safe and secure. Because it is so very important, I tend to create a column for each May to remind people about various ways of creating secure and hopefully memorable passwords.

A Word on Password Managers

Many people recognize a password manager as a good way to create and store secure passwords. Both the Firefox browser and the Google Chrome browsers have password managers built into them. The passwords stored synchronize between your phone and your computers if you install the browsers on both devices. Be aware that Chrome Password Manager currently has some vulnerabilities apparently due to the use of Microsoft Security.

Practically Perfect Passwords

Practically Perfect Passwords is a way that I share to create memorable passwords that tend to be secure. The system builds on rules to follow that lead to strong passwords. Rules are included to generate letters, numbers, special characters, capitalization rules, and sequence rules. You can also add letter change and other special rules. An example of a simple set of rules might be:

• Use a memorable phrase from a song lyric, poem, famous quote or phrase or another source. Use the first letter of each word in the phrase and make sure you have at least 7-9 letters. Select-

ing a separate phrase for Highly, Moderately, or Lightly sensitive access.

- Select two to four or more memorable numbers.
- Pick the symbols above the first two numbers from the previous rule and insert the number between them.
- Pick the first two and the last two letters of the domain name of the website.
- Concatenate the result of each of the first four rules in rule order.
- Capitalize the first and last letters and each letter that is adjacent to a symbol.
- So applying the rules to Amazon.com, I might get:
- "The Beatles say 'We, all live in a yellow submarine" → tbswaliays
- The year Columbus sailed the ocean blue. \rightarrow (1492)
 - $!$ \rightarrow !1492$$ Amazon.com \rightarrow amon
 - tbswaliays!1492\$amon
 - TbswaliayS!1492\$AmoN

Applying the same rules to Facebook would lead to the password TbswaliayS!1492\$FabK

A Password Codebook

A couple of years ago I wrote about a method to create a password codebook. The codebook is based on an idea to create passwords by randomly selecting words from a word list. My problem with the original idea is that I have over 800 passwords and I have trouble remembering a single list of five words. These short word lists still work well if you need to remember a single password for a primary password for example. I had another idea, create a code list where each letter in the alphabet corresponds to a randomly selected word.

Make the code list by selecting a random word for each letter of the alphabet. The randomness is enforced rolling dice randomly selecting words from a word list. The electronic Freedom Foundation (EFF) maintains these word lists for this purpose list at https:// www.eff.org/files/2016/07/18/eff_ large_wordlist.txt. The lists have numbers reflecting the roll of dice. The numbers pair with words on the list. A die rolled five times creates a five-digit number. The number matches one word of 7776 unique words on the word list. To

select a random word from the list, roll the die 5 times and lookup the word on the list that matches.

Create the code list by adding a line for each letter of the alphabet and rolling die to get a word to match with that letter. To finish the codebook, we create rules again. One rule selects letters from the domain name. Another rule will tell us how to separate the words from each other. This is where I use the numbers and symbols, but you can choose your own rules.

To provide the Amazon example let's assume the words in the codebook are A=Gravel, M = Laundry, and N=Junkie, O=Upper. For the number rule, we will use the digits 1492 and use the last 3 digits to separate the words. We will use the symbols to begin and end the password. The capitalization rule will be capitalizing any letter to the right of a symbol or digit.

This should give us: !Gravel-4Laundry9Junkie2Upper\$ A very strong password indeed. While it is not easy to remember, it is easy to recreate by using your codebook. Store the codebook in a secure file and look it up when you need



- Bay Restoration Fee
- Transportation Network Fee

Late payment interest and penalties will automatically be waived if payment is received on or prior





On March 4, 2024, Brian "Bizzle" Chase, took off from Miami on flight AA 2580, headed for St. John's, Antigua. He was not a passenger or First Officer. He was Captain of this American Airlines flight. Captain Chase agreed to share with Jason's Jive, a look back at that day.

Permit me to acknowledge his sister, Timmi Samuel, whom I have known since 1995. She posted the story on a social media page and that is how I was able to reach out to her brother.

March 4, you flew and landed in Antigua, your country of birth. What was that experience like? When you saw the schedule, what was the first thing you did or thought of? Who was the first person you mentioned it to?

March 4th, 2024, I landed an American Airlines Boeing 737 as a Captain from The Island of Antigua a first to be done by on that particular aircraft and Airline. The experience was bittersweet I was excited, overjoyed felt a sense of pride happiness but was sad at the same time because I wish my late mother would have been there to witness it, she always spoke it into existence God Bless her soul. However, I was extremely thankful my father (Winston Chase) was able to witness it. 





it. Create a new codebook annually and replace your passwords on World Password Day.

Lighter Weight Passwords

Yes, I do have more than 800 passwords, at least according to my password manager. However not all of my passwords are as robust as the ones I suggest here. Many websites I do not trust to store my password properly and I do not give them any true data about me, but I want to access the data they offer. These websites get a still secure but lighter weight credential and often do not get a real name or email address. Instead, I use a disposable email address. And I select two random words using the dice method and I reuse these two words instead of the poem or song lyric. I also change the rule for selecting letters from the domain name and the number and symbol selection rules.

Monitoring the Passwords

Both Google, Firefox, and now Windows 11 monitor your passwords to see if they are compromised. Other password managers and some antivirus programs will also check. You can check a password yourself by using https:// haveibeenpwned.com/Passwords.

benefits of these updates. As we continue to develop new vehicle safety systems, or simply improve the ones we already have, consumer education may help build trust, acceptance and use," says John Lenneman, Ph.D., senior principal research scientist, Toyota North America, CSRC.

This seminal research included two driving simulator studies at the University of Iowa, assessing the understanding of over-the-air updates without consumer education, and measuring the benefit of including consumer education. The project also developed a tool for designers to measure the change in a system following an update.

One of CSRC's primary aims is to share its research, with the hope that the automotive industry can benefit from the findings of its safety advances. That's why the

research team is excited that the study is already having an impact on system design and educational materials, helping designers identify when and how consumer education should be incorporated into updates. For example, the research found that for updates that don't require interactions from the driver, such as automatic emergency braking, education is not necessarily needed, whereas for other updates, the driver may need a description of what the system does, or even an understanding of what their responsibility is when using the technology.




