Strategic Planning

The June 15 Greater Beltsville Business Association breakfast reached a new level of involvement with corporate and community activities. Reflecting the board's interest in strategic planning, Angie Segal, owner of ACTIONCoach, with many years of experience coaching businesses, addressed what happens to a small business without a strategic

"Running a business without a strategic plan, is like trying to find a store without knowing the city or location. A lot of time and energy is spent without getting there," Ms. Segal said.

She said it was vital to define your company's goals, to establish quarterly steps toward those goals, and to have sales, training, and profit measurements in place enabling the owner every week to know what progress is being made that quarter. With about two hours a week, plans for the subsequent quarter can be adjusted to take into account each quarter's experience. After a few months of planning the work and working the plan, the owner will enjoy the luxury of taking a vacation knowing a strategy is in place and it works without constant detailed supervision.

Ms. Segal said the same process can be created for a volunteer board of a non-profit organization but it requires a strategic planning process of at least half a day to align the personal and business interests of the board members. Only then will goals and objectives for the organization emerge with detailed ways to achieve success. Progress toward the goals also can be measured in quarterly increments.

By clicking on your GPS directions to your "home" the thief will have an invitation and directions to come "shopping" at your place. In case his GPS gets swiped Hibbert said he set up GPS directions to "home" to guide the thief to the nearest Walmart instead.

morning, but also is damaging their

leaving it faded, dry and lifeless.

Valerie and Michael invite you to

drop in to discuss draperies, shades

Valerie and Michael have a

several suggestions to keep the sun

out in the mornings. First, add an

additional layer to the windows,

such as draperies, lined with a

thermal suede lining. According

to Valerie, to achieve complete

room darkening, "place a block

out lining on a separate rod behind

the drapery. This will allow you to

operate it separately so that during

the day, you can open up the block

out layer so the room will not be

completely dark all of the time."

Second, consider blinds such as

the Hunter Douglas honeycomb

duette shades or vignettes. These

blinds are made with a solid piece of

fabric, instead of blinds that contain

individual slats. Even if the slats of an

aluminum or wood blind are pulled

tightly, the sun still manages to creep

in between the slats. Third, if you

of the frame instead of the inside of

the frame, covering the entire frame. When mounted on the inside, there

is a light gap that comes in on the

sides, especially with roller shades,

where the fabric is never as wide as



Kathryn L. Kotula, Ph.D. Elected IFT Fellow







Kathryn L. Kotula, Ph.D. was elected to the 2011 Fellows of Institute of Food Technologists. She was awarded a plaque commemorating this honor during the annual IFT meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana on 11 June 2011. Dr. Kotula, Senior Investigative Food Scientist, at Investigative Food Sciences, was honored for her ability to explain complex scientific concepts in a manner easily understood by non-scientists, as a way to assist the food industry with lawsuits, processing issues, and consumer education outreach.

The IFT Fellow designation is an honor bestowed upon an IFT member by previously elected Fellows, recognizing exemplary professionalism, and outstanding and extraordinary contributions in the field of food science and technology. In a given year, no more than 0.3 percent of the professional membership of IFT is eligible, and even fewer actually earn this honor.

Founded in 1939, the Institute of Food Technologists is a nonprofit scientific society with more than 18,000 national and international members working in food science, food technology, and related professions in industry, academia, and government. IFT serves as a conduit for multidisciplinary science through leadership, championing the use of sound science through knowledge sharing, education, and advocacy. Dr. Kotula has been an active member of IFT since 1982, when she joined as a student member.

Kathy was raised in Beltsville, and attended Crescent Kindergarten, St. Joseph's Elementary School, Beltsville Junior High School, and High Point High School. She earned her Bachelor of Science in Animal Science and Master of Science in Food Science from the University of Maryland. She earned her Doctorate in Food Science and Technology from Cornell University, with minors in Human Nutrition and Microbiology. Dr. Kotula then became a professor at the University of

Sciences. Kathy is a recognized authority on the safety and quality of poultry, red meat, dairy, eggs, and seafood, as well as production, processing, regulatory compliance, distribution, warehousing, and consumption issues. She advises companies involved in litigation and arbitration cases centered on food-borne illness outbreaks and product spoilage.

Kathy's science-based investigations and advice have provided an extremely valuable service to food producers and processors, and have allowed them to successfully defend lawsuits against them, and protect their reputations. She has saved food producers and processors funds (more than \$79 million), and, more importantly, their reputations. Kathy also serves as a processing authority in matters of regulatory compliance and processing innovations.

Dr. Kotula has also presented science-based food safety and handling concepts to consumers nationwide, and in Canada, through numerous TV and radio appearances, and in popular print. Elementary and middle school students, adults and senior citizens have benefited from Kathy's knowledge through her community outreach program, in which she gives presentations on basic food safety, microbiology, and food science.





ert Gold, Dean, School of Public Health at University of Maryland. A brief update of BAPS health fair efforts along with statistics obtained from blood work (i.e. lipids, glucose level) were presented to participating doctors.

In addressing the audience, Dr. Sharfstein commended the tremendous efforts of all the volunteers and noted the importance of follow-up activities to address patient health care needs. Dr. Shell noted the commitment of BAPS Charities in improving the lives of local residents in Prince George's County as well as people around the world through its service to mankind. He emphasized the need for a Comparative Effectiveness Study to be conducted for BAPS Charities Health Fairs in order to determine healthcare cost savings through avoidance of major health issues. Ms. Phillips was impressed with the level of organization following her tour of the medical facilities provided at BAPS Charities Health Fair in Beltsville.

This health fair offered a range of services and information for children and adults. A number of volunteer healthcare specialists were involved including physicians, pharmacists, dentists and nurses. All participants received preliminary physical examinations and had their blood pressure, blood sugar level and body mass index measured. Dr. Natu Shah, pediatrician, who has been participating for the past ten years, spoke about encountering many patients with poor nutrition, spe-

cifically lack of protein in Indian children, a specific case finding of sickle cell anemia in one child, and being able to assist in improving individual lives through the most minor of adjustments (eye glass positioning).

Participating dentists Dr. Paulomi Desai and Dr. Lisa Patel emphasized the impact of poor dental health on other health issues. They both stressed the importance of routine checkups to detect and prevent dental issues that have greater consequences if not detected early. In speaking about her four-year involvement with the BAPS Charities Health Fair, Dr. Desai stated, "I am glad I can make a difference by educating patients and stressing the value of prevention."

"I learned that I need to eat low fat food and exercise regularly to help my cholesterol," said nine-year-old Anand. 



Beltsville Rotary Club's Finest Shares Some Personal History

Karl Norris, our oldest member (90 and still active) and the only surviving Charter Member of our club, recently shared some interesting facts regarding his early years at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC). Karl reported on how a simple development in a project at BARC became a multi-million dollar a year industry. His presentation included some science, but his main emphasis was on stories about events that had a profound effect on their research. Karl was hired as a research engineer to develop machines for automatic grading of eggs, and spent four years of research developing the instruments to measure egg quality without breaking the eggs. They made good progress in their research, but had not attempted to build a machine to sort eggs, and the external review committee was critical of a lack of a machine, and it appeared the project would lose funding. The Chief of the Poultry Research Branch asked Karl if he could build any sort of machine that would make an optical measurement on the eggs and sort them so that the viewer could see that such sorting could be done. Karl knew that the Poultry Branch had a machine to sort eggs by weight, and he suggested he could modify the machine to sort eggs for shell color instead of by weight. This was approved and in a short time,

Karl demonstrated his shell colorsorting machine, which was very impressive.

In 1957 National Geographic Magazine began to use color photos and sent a photographer to Beltsville. He was so impressed with the color-sorting machine that several photos were taken and included in the magazine. That same year, the U.S. President made a visit to BARC, and Karl demonstrated his Shell Color Machine to President Eisenhower. Between these two events, much favorable publicity was generated and the concern about the funding vanished. The research effort was closed after they built machines to sort the eggs to remove those containing blood spots, and another machine to sort out the eggs containing what was called green rot.

Karl then shared how he developed an instrument to measure near infrared light, NIR, to measure the moisture content in wheat flour. This was the first use of NIR spectroscopy to measure the composition of agricultural products, and as a result, Karl became known as The Father of NIR Technology. Karl used this same technology to measure the moisture, protein, starch, and oil content of grains and oil seeds. Two firms were granted contracts to manufacture these functioning instruments - Dickey-John in Illinois and Neotec in Maryland. Both companies began to build and market instruments in the US and Canada. This launched NIR Technology and soon other companies were developing instruments to measure the composition of food products as well as grains. The NIR Technology spread around the world and is now used in measurements of products in the chemical and pharmaceutical industries. With more than 100 companies from across the globe marketing NIR instruments, the technology is now generating several hundred million dollars a year in business. Is there any wonder we stand in awe of this man we are honored to call Friend? Karl is still active today, lecturing and presenting papers throughout the civilized world.

On Flag Day, June 14th, our members met at Glen Dale Golf Course and enjoyed a day of fun in the sun with many friends and supporters at our annual Golf Tournament. The weather was perfect and the course was in great shape. We thank everyone who joined us in this fund raising effort. The only addition we could have used was more golfers. Perhaps that will happen next year. Last year's winner, John M. who is looking forward to getting it back next year, placed the coveted Winner's Hat on Rick's head.

Baker Bill stuff 'n things

I have received questions about a Website my daughter started for those with eating problems caused by seafood, glucose, nuts, and gluten products. She charges nothing and will not ask for credit card information. The site address is eatingfreedom.org. Check it out. Bookmark it.

July is a great month, "HOT" and dry; I love it.

A weatherman recently corrected me. The air in the upper hemisphere swirls counterclockwise, as do tornadoes. As I wrote in an earlier column, I experienced one in Texas many years ago that tore up parts of the city of Waco. It bounced here and there taking out every other house and leaving the others fine. When it got downtown it took out an intersection, two tall buildings, and killed 100 people who went there for shelter. My base was James Connelly AFB and Fort Hood. We worked around the clock doing cleanup. I recall another storm in that area that took out the only bridge over the Brazos River that is a mile wide and a foot deep. While in that area I met Hank Williams in a honkytonk just south of Waco. This was a tough town. The sheriff wore a six-gun on his hip and every Sunday morning the lead headline was who was shot the night before. Twice it was the sheriff.

Back to old Hank. The cover charge was \$5.00 and that was a lot in 1952. The bar was full but not overly crowded. I walked right up to him standing at the bar, shook his hand and told him I was a fan. He went to the small stage and sang every song he ever wrote. I believe it was a Friday night so no one got shot. The cowboys came to town on Saturday night and I stayed on base. I was only

20 years old and the law was very strict if you were caught drinking a beer under age. It was a \$100.00 fine and the sheriff came by often to check. The bar we drank in was owned by the Mess sergeant on base and he signaled when the law showed up. You would slide your drink to someone who was over 21 and slide a coke in front of you. Those were fun times many years ago. These stories were in a book I was writing called Burtonwood, after an air base in England. I recorded the stories on tape, but the case I had them in was stolen from my car parked in front of my house. I never got around to doing it again. I was going to use a ghostwriter.

Well enough of that. I promised you Candy. Most of you do not know what Fondant is. Fondant is the base of most candies. Some call it nugget. It is the white candy the coconut is wrapped around in a Mounds bar, for example. Fondant is good and fun to make. Once made, it will keep forever in a tightly closed container. It can be used a number of ways. All you need is your talent for creation. You may need to get gelatin at the store. The funny thing is that many bakers think it only comes in a 50-pound tub from the suppliers. Here is the formula; write it down.

Fondant. Put 1 tbsp gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water and let it gel. Now add to it 2 tablespoons butter and microwave it until the butter melts, only a few seconds, add vanilla to taste.

Stir in 1 & 1/2 boxes of powdered sugar in three stages and mix very well. Use kitchen aid if you have one. it will be stiff. Mix it until it turns dull from shiny.

Special note: It may look too stiff, but after a few seconds in

the microwave it will be pliable enough to add chocolate chips, coconut, or anything else. Roll in spoon size ball and let it harden in the air. The candy you have made is great just like that, or you can robe in chocolate like carob chips called apells. The last time I made Fondant I rolled out some flat and thin and placed a cherry from a jar, juice and all, closed them up and enrobed them making chocolate covered cherries just like you buy in the store.
