The Prince George's Summer Teen Theatre Needs Your Help

For the past 45 years, The Prince George's Summer Teen Theatre has been a staple in the Beltsville Community. It is one of the longest running teen theater programs in the United States and residents of Beltsville started it here in Beltsville. For the first time since 1967 it is in danger of not being able to fund a production.

PGSTT has been hit very hard by the recent economic downturn, as have so many arts organizations. Costs for royalties, materials, performance space, and production staff have risen sharply, while

ticket sales, program ads, and individual donations have dropped drastically. The Board of Directors is working on ways to cut expenses, but that, alone, will not be enough. It still costs sev-

eral thousand dollars just to license the rights to perform most musicals and those rights don't include the cost of costumes, performance space, sets, props and many other materials. If they are unable to raise \$8,000 by March there will be no show this year.

Growing up in Beltsville, when he was as young as 5 years old Tony could often be found "hanging out" at the fire station. It seemed that even at such an early age he knew that he wanted to be a fireman. Many years later in Aug. 1983, it was no surprise to anybody when he was finally 16 and eligible to become a Junior Firefighter, that Tony applied for membership at the Beltsville Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD). Since he had already befriended most of the BVFD membership, when his application was presented, there was no question that he was wanted as part of our organization. Because he was a student at







Continuing Care For Seniors And The Way It Benefits Your Loved One

Looking for the Silver Lining

In Apr. 2011 my grand-daughter's car was parked next to my home and was ticketed for parking on my grass. The parking citation was issued by the Prince George's County Revenue Authority and carried a fine of \$50 if paid within 30 days. It would increase to \$100 if paid after 30 days, and \$200 if paid after 60 days. So I paid it, and we moved the car to my driveway to avoid more tickets for parking on my grass.

Meanwhile, my granddaughter and family moved to South Carolina and left the car in my care, parked in my driveway.

Over time, air seeped from one of the tires, and on Nov. 3 the car was ticketed again, this time for "inoperable on private property," with the footnote "flat tires." The fine schedule was the same as before, so I paid the \$50 within the first 30-day period.

My granddaughter and family visited us over Thanksgiving, and there was a discussion

about selling the car to a person who stopped by a few times and showed interest in buying the car. Thinking that was a good idea, the registration plates were removed so the car would be ready to be picked up and my granddaughter and family went back to South Carolina. On Dec. 16 the car was ticketed again – twice – once for "inoperable on private property" (flat tire) and the other for "no current registration on private property." It was ticketed again on Dec. 27 (happy holidays) for the same two violations.

We had the car picked up shortly thereafter as a donation to the Make a Wish Foundation, resulting in a \$500 charitable donation for the owner (not me)

There are several silver linings here. One for the Prince George's County Revenue Authority (\$300), another for the Make a Wish Foundation (revenue from sale of the car), and one for the recipient of the tax deduction (\$500).

I paid the last \$200 of tickets

on January 13, and wondered where my silver lining in all of this must be. It was delivered by mail that very day, a refund of \$16.58, representing an overpayment of real estate taxes on my home.

The tickets for parking offenses are not issued by the Prince George's County Police. I checked with an officer at District VI Headquarters who indicated a member of his family received one. Instead, they are issued by personnel working for the County's Revenue Authority, headquartered in Largo. I understand that tickets are also issued for parking with the driver's side wheels to the curb, blocking or partially blocking a driveway, and perhaps other offenses. And it's happening here, right in Beltsville. So if you get such a ticket, look for the silver lining, or take it to court.



Baker Bill STUFF 'N THINGS

I just had a call from a lady with a very pleasant voice and we talked a long while about a lot of stuff; fruitcake, bread, different types of flour and how to make hard crust bread like they make in the bread bakeries. The answer to that last one is you can't. The bakeries use a lot of steam in baking to make the crust crispy and they also use special high protein or clear flour we can't purchase in the supermarket. But I have seen King Arthur flours in the stores and they sell that type of flour called high protein flour on line and maybe it will show up on the shelf as well. The other reason we can't make the hard crust breads is the steam. Our home ovens cannot hold steam; if we try it goes out the vent. I suggested to try using the white of an egg; add water to make it thin, and brush the top. This may take the place of steam and give a nice brown color. I tried it and it worked well. I also used high protein flour.

I just read last year's Feb. arti-

cle where I gave a recipe for bread, so this year here is a recipe for hard crust bread. Now I am not going through all the writing about the yeast. If you have taken my class you know all about that, or drop me a line at bakerbill2010@ hotmail.com or call 301.572.4180 after 2 p.m.


In a medium sized bowl, place 2 1/2 cups bread flour, add 2 tablespoons yeast (no shortening or oil), 1 teaspoon salt (very important), measure carefully 8 oz. hot water. Knead well and long or put into the kitchen aid in low speed mix 5 minutes. It should be stiff. If not, add more flour; it should clean the bowl. You'll see what I mean. Shape; let it rise in plastic and bake in medium oven @375 degrees at least 30 minutes using the egg wash I wrote about. Let me know.

As I wrote earlier, we talked about different types of flour. Bread flour is hard wheat planted in the fall. The seedlings lie under the snow all winter, grow in the spring, are harvested in warm weather, and milled etc. It has good protein, around 13 to 14 %, for good gluten. Cake flour or soft wheat, planted and harvested the same year, will not make good bread, but will make great cakes with fine grain at 8% protein. All-purpose flour is a combination of hard wheat and soft wheat. It will make both fairly well and has medium protein at 11%. If you plan to make any type of dough I suggest you buy bread flour from the store. It will make gravy and most everything you need but cake. Frankly, I do not fully understand how this happens in nature. But bread flour is very dry and cake flour has more moisture in it. Being a baker, not a chemist, I only know the up side of each.
