UpStage Artists Invites You To The Perfect Murder This February!

Imagine committing a crimenot out of necessity, but simply for the thrill of danger and the act itself. That chilling premise sets the stage for Rope, the first play of 2025 by UpStage Artists. This gripping drama and tense mystery follows two young men, Wyndam Brandon and Charles Granillo. who believe their gruesome act proves their intellectual superiority. After committing the unthinkable, they host a dinner party with the victim's body hidden in a chest-used as the evening's dining table. To heighten the audacity, they invite the victim's father and aunt to the gathering.

Rope draws inspiration from the infamous 1924 Leopold and Loeb case. Nathan Freudenthal Leopold, Jr. and Richard Albert Loeb, two wealthy University of Chicago students, kidnapped and murdered 14-year-old Bobby

Franks in what they believed was a demonstration of their genius. Their crime, which they considered the "perfect murder," was dubbed the "crime of the century."

Patrick Hamilton's Rope was his first major theatrical success,

debuting in London before moving to Broadway. It was later adapted for a 1938 BBC broadcast, but perhaps its best-known version is Alfred Hitchcock's 1948 film starring Jimmy Stewart. Hitchcock's adaptation is lauded for its groundbreaking technical style, with long takes and minimal editing, making the story unfold almost in real time.


Cub Pack 1031 Begins The New Year With A Day of Service

Useful Softwarefor Free

The holidays are over. You got that new computer you were waiting for but no software. On the other hand, maybe you didn't get the new computer, and you just discovered that Microsoft will stop supporting Office 365 on older computers running Windows 10 or older when they retire it in October this year. This month we will share software that you can get and use freely. We have shared some of these programs in the past and some may be new to you, but everything this month will be free to download and use. So, let's get started.

Office Suite

An office suite is a collection of software that typically includes a word processor, a spreadsheet, and a presentation package. Office 365 is the current version of Office Suite software from Microsoft. Microsoft recently announced that when they retire Windows 10 the updates to Office 365 will no longer work on versions of Windows 10 and older. Microsoft has also announced that it will remove the simple WordPad word processor, which has been a part of Windows for many years. They will include a trial version of Office 365, but to use after the trial you will need to pay an annual subscription.

While several alternatives to Office 365 exist, the one generally considered the best is LibreOffice. LibreOffice is both free and Open Source and can be easily downloaded and installed directly onto your Windows or Linux computer. It even installs on Chromebooks, Android and Apple devices. It includes Writer, a work processor, the Calc spreadsheet, and Impress,

Hard copies may be picked up at more than 50 locations in greater Beltsville, including the Beltsville Library, Wawa, Beltsville Community Center, schools, churches, restaurants and more. Many receive a monthly pdf of the paper via e-mail at no charge. To receive copies by email, go to www.beltsvillenewstoday. com, and enter your e-mail address.

Please join our Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/groups/300944563420364/) and follow us at beltsville news on Instagram. Check out our website: www.beltsvillenewstoday.com a presentation package. In addition, it includes a basic drawing package, a Math Equation editor, and Base, a database management program. While LibreOffice is not the only free office suite available, many consider it the best alternative product out there. It is included with most Linux installations and my family, and I have over 15 years of experience using it.

Email, Contacts, and Calendar

Microsoft provides a version of Outlook with Office 365. Outlook includes an email client, a calendar program with the ability to schedule meetings, and an address book to store, names, addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses for all of your contacts. Different versions of Outlook may be provided with Windows 11. My copy of Windows 11 appears to include an "Outlook Classic" as well as the current version Outlook for Office 2021 (not 365). If you have Windows 10 you may also have a program called Mail and Calendar which includes simple contacts and calendar applications. These programs are often simpler than those provided with Outlook. Currently, it is not clear on the status of these simple email related programs when Windows 10 retires.

Thunderbird is the most popular Outlook alternative email client and includes the address book and calendar features. The Mozilla organization originally developed Thunderbird, but it separated into its own organization. The software is also free and open source, and runs on Windows, Linux, and macOS. This makes it a good choice if you plan to stick with Windows 10 or move to Linux.

Drawing Software

Microsoft provides Paint, a very basic package to draw some simple bitmaps images. There is better software freely available. First is Inkscape. Inkscape is a vector drawing program. It creates vector drawings that are stored in the standard SVG (Scalable Vector Graphics) format. A vector drawing is scalable, with the ability to increase and decrease in size while still maintaining its appearance. Adobe Illustrator and Corel Draw are two commercial packages that also support vector drawing. These tools are great for creating illustrations and diagrams.

Photo and Painting Software

Use Paint software to create or edit pixel art. Pixel art includes the ability to touch up photos or use painting skills to create images as if they were painted. This is like tools like Adobe Photoshop or Corel Painter. The free and open-source tool to do this is Gimp. Gimp has been around for

many years and is available for Linux, Windows, and macOS.

Securely Storing Passwords

The three most popular browsers Chrome, Firefox, and Edge all offer secure password facilities within the browser. This of course limits the passwords to those browsers storing the password you need. KeePass is a free and open-source utility for securely storing passwords and recovering them when needed. Plug-ins are available to integrate KeePass with your favorite browsers making it convenient to work with multiple browsers. I have over 1000 passwords to manage. The ability to store the passwords and restore them when needed is very helpful.

Shrinking and Encrypting Files

WinZip is a commercial tool for compressing files and making them smaller. It also provides the ability to encrypt the data in the files to protect them. Years ago, Microsoft added the compression capability to Windows. From the file explorer right click and select send to compressed folder to compress a file or a folder in Windows. However, Windows can't encrypt.

7-Zip is free software that compresses, decompresses, and optionally securely encrypts or decrypts the contents as well. It is a good way to send secure files across the Internet or via email attachments.

Media Player

Under Windows Accessories, you should find the old original Windows Media Player (WMP) or, maybe even the "Windows Media Player Legacy". These old tools for some reason seem to be better than the new ones created for Windows 11. I have used WMP for years to convert my CDs to collections of MP3 files that I can listen to as I work or copy them to my phone or table and listen to when I travel.

The VLC media player makes a good alternative that is both free and open source and play music, MP4 video, CDs, DVDs, and other media formats. It also works on Windows, Linux, Android, iOS, and macOS.

About FOSS

I want to add just a few words about Free and Open-Source Software or FOSS. This is software created by hardworking developers and organizations that choose to give the software they build away. You don't normally see any advertisements or nagging to donate. They may ask for optional donations to help them cover their costs, but their contributions are typically worth more than they ask. If you find one of these products that you get value from, consider contributing. Or, even better, volunteer. Believe it, or not, you do not have to be a "techie" to help.

This has been a short introduction to some of my favorite free software. I hope you try some out and enjoy.

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


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Statepoint Crossword: The Super Bowl

New Elderly Tax Credit Enacted

A new county law revises the county's existing Elderly Property Tax Credit and allows any resident over the age of 65 who has been living in the same home, valued at \$500,000 or less, for at least 25 years to be eligible for a 20% property tax credit. Eligible homeowners will receive the tax credit for up to five years beginning in 2025.

Challenges for Snow Removal in District One

The Prince George's County Council held a snow removal briefing with the Prince George's County Department of Public Works & Transportation (DPW&T) to brief residents about the snow removal operations on Tuesday, January 21. Director Michael Johnson and his team briefed the County Council on the challenges and the proposed long-term solutions to addressing future snow events. Our office worked to ensure that people received timely communications and to report roads for clearing to DPW&T. There were 845 PGC311 snow-related requests in District One, with 785 requests closed as of January 19, 2025. A summary of the DPW&T plowing standards, service priorities, and a proposed timeline for future operational improvements was provided by DPW&T at the briefing. Staying Warm at the District One Warming Center

When extreme winter weather events bring extreme cold, it is critical to stay out of the cold and warm up. The designated warming center for District One is the Laurel-Beltsville Senior Activity Center, located at 7120 Contee Road, Laurel, 20707. Winter storms include blizzards, freezing rain, snow, ice, and high winds, and they can increase the risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frostbite, carbon monoxide poisoning, and heart attacks from overexertion.

The Prince George's County Department of Social Services (DSS) staff and communitybased providers will continue to reach out to homeless community members and urge them to seek shelter during extreme cold temperatures. Individuals needing an emergency shelter should call the 24-hour Homeless Resource Line at 1-888-731-0999 for location information. Residents concerned about the well-being of a homeless individual can complete the online Prince George's County Community Services Street Out-

reach Referral form: https://bit. ly/PGStreetOutreachForm, with whatever information is known, and the Street Outreach Team will attempt to locate the person and offer resources and support.

Tips to Remember to Stay Warm

It's crucial to know the three levels of winter weather. The three levels of ascending danger are winter weather advisory, winter storm watch, and winter storm warning. An advisory is issued for the accumulation of snow, freezing rain, drizzle, and sleet. A watch identifies that a potential blizzard, heavy snow, heavy freezing rain, or heavy sleet is possible and is issued 12 to 48 hours before expected precipitation. A warning implies that heavy snow, heavy freezing rain, or heavy sleet is imminent or ongoing.

To sign up for severe weather and other emergency notifications, go to https://tinyurl.com/4yf5a6nf and sign up for Alert Prince George's to get text messages sent to your cell phone, landline phone, and/or email address.

Please try to stay out of cold weather, minimize recreational activities, and wear appropriate warm clothing. To remain safe indoors, be mindful of carbon monoxide levels from different combustion heaters and avoid the risk of fires and carbon monoxide poisoning. To keep your vehicles safe, keep the gas tank near full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines, have adequate anti-freeze, keep your phone charged, keep extra blankets, and never leave a person alone in the cold. Animals cannot be left outside unattended, which may be considered animal cruelty.

Extreme cold is a dangerous situation that can cause health emergencies to susceptible people. This includes children, seniors, those without shelter, stranded individuals, or those living in poorly insulated homes or lacking heat.

Please pay attention to any signs of hypothermia or frostbite. Hypothermia can result from prolonged exposure to the cold, while frostbite is an injury caused by the body freezing. Seek medical care after you warm up for both situations.


Two years ago, Shifali, now a college graduate, was encouraged to apply for the staff development manager position.


During the Fair, I spent time with the team learning what my next steps should be. I was shown a variety of paths and discovered what makes the most sense for me."

There was pressure inside the house. Our ears felt like they wanted to pop. The noise from the wind sounded like a Boeing 747 was at rooftop level trying to land. One could see all sorts of objects flying in

the wind – galvanized roof sheets, plants and more. By God's grace we survived a very scary ordeal. This happened during the middle of the hurricane season that year. (Traditionally, hurricane season would run from June 1 to November and would peak in August).

So yes, the weather pattern has changed. We got to be prepared. Know your neighbors by name, check on them, make sure they are okay. If possible, have them move in with you temporarily for the duration of the storm (if you have advanced notice). We got to go back to the way things used to be where neighbors looked out for one another. One fun thing I did not mention was that after the hurricane had passed, there was always a community effort to cut up fallen trees and clear debris so life could go back to normal as soon as possible.


