New Beltsville Post Office Opens in September (2000)

The new Beltsville Post Office at 10901 Rhode Island Avenue is tentatively scheduled to open on Tuesday, September 5 (2000). The only things holding up the September 5 opening are the paving of the parking lot for which several days of dry weather is needed and getting the building hooked up to water. Post Master Chuck Malinich said the staff will be

working over the long Labor Day weekend to see that the new facility if ready on Tuesday morning and there is no interruption of service. The move should be transparent to postal patrons in the 20705 area and for 20704 post office boxes. All but three of the current delivery routes will remain the same, Malinich said. "Everyone will still get their mail every day. Some customers may see a change in delivery times due to the slight change in delivery routes."

Planning Ahead: Leaving Your Cat While You Travel

Whether you're traveling for work or heading out on vacation, one big question always comes up for cat owners: Who will care for the cats while I'm gone?

For some, like me, the solution is simple—a trusted house and pet sitter stays in my home and cares for my whole crew (cats, dogs, chickens, fish—you name it). But if you only have one or two pets, the decision might not be so clearcut. Here are some key tips to help you prepare for a stress-free trip—for both you and your cats:



Before You Go: Prep Like a Pro

- **Stock** ood and water bowls for your sitter to use.
- Emergency Info: Leave a list with your vet's number, a trusted backup contact, and a note authorizing your pet sitter to approve care if needed. Confirm in writing that you'll cover any veterinary costs.
- **Detailed Instructions:** Outline your cat's daily routine—feeding times, litter box cleaning, preferred lights or radio settings, favorite hiding spots, etc.

Mr. Stanton holds a master's degree in human services from Lincoln University and has taught sociology at Anne Arundel Community College. He is the immediate past Board President of the Maryland Black Caucus Foundation and currently serves as a Commissioner on the Maryland Economic Development Commission. He resides in Prince George's County with his wife of 29 years and their family.

Back to School 2025

August is coming quickly and school is about to start. Parents are trying to decide how to provide their children with the computers they will need for their schoolwork.

The Parent Dilemma

Many parents consign their older machines to their children. Microsoft has declared that by October 14th, people should discard all Windows 10 computers if they can't be updated to Windows 11. But, for \$35 Microsoft will continue to support Windows 10 for one more year with security updates. However, at this time Microsoft is also saying that Microsoft Office 365 support on Windows 10 will also end. What is a parent to do if Microsoft's



solution is to replace all of the older computers?

Solution One: Do Nothing

The first solution is simple, ignore Microsoft and go ahead

with Windows 10 without them. This of course has an element of risk since Microsoft does push out security fixes on a monthly basis. If you decide to go this route, add a quality Anti-virus and Firewall package to your computer. Ignoring Microsoft patches is still a risk but this will reduce the risk.

There is also a European company (OPatch.com) offering to apply their own fixes to Windows 10 for under \$25 annually per machine for at least the next five years. They will patch zero-day issues for no cost for individuals.

Solution Two: Buy New Computers

Purchasing a new computer is what Microsoft is pushing as their solution. Of course, it primarily benefits them if you buy a new Windows 11 PC. For many students a Chromebook is a good alternate choice and much less expensive than a windows PC. You can find Chromebooks online for under \$100. Used Windows 11 capable PC's are also a potential

choice. You can find these online for under \$300.

Solution Three: Replace Windows with Linux

Over the years, I have replaced Windows with Linux on a number of my computers. I even have an old 11 inch Notebook computer that that I like to bring when I travel to handle email and editing documents running Ubuntu Mate. A number of Linux choices like Mate even mimic the Windows user interface. You may also find that the Linux conversion will run much faster than Windows.

Solution Four: Replace Windows with Chrome OS Flex

Chrome OS Flex, based on Chrome OS but designed to run on older computers instead of running on a new Chromebooks. Google offers a list of many older models of computers tested to work with Flex.

What about Software?

If Microsoft Office is required, Office supplies Office as a web application to run it online. Linux provides LibreOffice, which can read and write Office files. Google has Google Workspace, which provides an entire Office suite as web applications. Email clients, web browsers, calendars, music and video players, and games are all available, and much of it is free.

Other things

If you student bring their computer to school you may want to

make sure it has a battery that can last for the entire school day. Many schools do not have enough outlets to plug in all of the computers in the room. A multiple outlet plug can also be helpful allowing sharing of outlets.

Headsets with microphones are important for working and participating in meetings and conferences without disturbing others. Teaching now frequently happens over the computer screen.

USB memory sticks or thumb drives can be used to backup work (in case the dog eats it). Show your child how to back up the computer to the thumb drive and have them do it each day. You can do this for them if they are too young. A computer lock is good to keep the computer from "walking away".

A mouse if needed. Many kids use the mouse pad below the keyboard. I still find these to be awkward. I prefer a Bluetooth mouse because it doesn't waste a USB port, it has no dongle to lose, and no cord in the way. However, younger kids may have difficulty reconnecting the mouse if the Bluetooth signal is lost.

Last Thoughts

You may want to review that last couple of years of these columns for more tips about sending the kids to school well prepared. In the mean-time enjoy your vacations and have a great new school year.

Borrowing too much: Borrow only what you need to pay for schooling and basic living expens-

WSSC Get Current Temporary Water Bill Assistance Program

The Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) has a new program to assist eligible customers who are delinquent in their Water Bills to pay off their remaining balance. The *Get Cur*-

rent temporary water bill assistance program allows customers who pay half of their full account balance to see the remainder of their balance forgiven. Additionally, 100 percent of a customer's late payment charges and turn-on fees will be waived.

There is also an option to pay 25 percent of the full account balance, and 25 percent of the balance will then be forgiven. All late payment charges and turn-on fees will be waived upon completion of the payment plan. Both options are great opportunities to pay off your delinquent water bill. The program will run until October 31, 2025. You can get more infor-

Addressing Flooding and Downed Trees after Storms

Throughout July, most of Maryland was under a flood watch due to the heavy rains and extreme winds. As extreme weather events become more frequent, more intense precipitation and high-wind events can be expected over time. To receive notifications from the Maryland Department of Emergency Management, you can sign up for alerts going to https://tinyurl.com/ MDD1Alerts. It would be good to know how to identify ways to fortify your home and report hazardous situations.

For homes that face challenges to drainage, or may lie within a watershed, please see this link at https://tinyurl.com/D1PGDrainage to view the Department of Permitting, Inspections, and Enforcement's (DPIE's) Drainage and Flooding website. This website lists critical information about the Drainage Defects Complaint Program, the 100-Year Stormwater Management Control Map of Prince George's County, the Drainage and Flooding in Prince George's County report to outline challenges and resolutions to flooding, A Homeowner's Guide

to Drainage Problems and Solutions, and a guide to how improperly installed fences can cause drainage issues.

Some temporary measures that can protect your home against flooding include keeping extra materials for emergency waterproofing, clearing brush and debris away from storm drains and ditches, and improving drainage away from structures. Homeowners who are planning substantial improvements to their structure should contact the Prince George's County Department of Permitting, Inspections, and Enforcement (DPIE) for a residential building permit. "Residential Drainage: A Homeowner's Guide to Drainage Problems and Solutions" is available from Prince George's County. This free guide can be obtained by calling Moses Fadiran at 301-883-5768.

After a storm, downed trees can also cause major concerns when they block a road. After a storm, if a downed tree is in the roadway, blocks lanes of traffic, or causes motorists to cross over the direction lane markers, please report it to PGC311 as a Roadway Emergency, as "Roadway Impassable or Unsafe". Trees that have not yet fallen and block the roadway, but require tree trimming to reduce the risk of them falling, should be reported as Down Trees on PGC311. Please also report any downed road signs or dark traffic signals as Roadway Emergencies to PGC311

Generally, in Maryland, the cost of removing the tree and repairing any property damage falls to the property owner who sustained the damage. A homeowner can be held liable if a tree on the homeowner's property presents a danger to abutting properties and the homeowner knew or should have known about the deteriorating condition of the tree. Often, this type of damage is covered by homeowners' insurance. Homeowners should review their insurance contracts to find out what is specifically covered under their policy. Prince George's County is not responsible for trees that belong to one neighbor's property that fall or overhang onto another neighbor's property.

Loans must be repaid within 180 days, with a one-time 90-day extension available upon request.





To recognize their dedication and propel their promising futures, community residents generously donated over \$358,000 to the Student ScholScholarship.





es. This will help eliminate the temptation to use the money on items that are not an investment in your future. You should also avoid borrowing more than you can comfortably repay based on your expected future income.
