





# Back to School: Local Youth Climate Program Expands Nationwide

## PG County Schools to Begin as NEW Chapter

Program quadruples in size to include 18 chapters across the country, including Maryland, Alabama and Metropolitan Washington, DC

Woodstock MD, August 9, 2023- The Youth Climate Institute (YCI), a program of the Howard County Conservancy, announced their innovative youth certification program has expanded to include 18 chapters in areas ranging from Maryland to metropolitan DC and Alabama. This growth reflects the incredible engagement and inter-

est of young people on the climate crisis and the effectiveness of YCI's chapter-based model. In Prince George's County, several schools will be participating including PG County online, Frederick Douglas HS, Eleanor Roosevelt HS and Fairmont Heights HS as they become "official" new chapters this fall when students will begin the certification program. For more information, visit Youth Climate Institute I (youth-climateleader.org).

The Youth Climate Institute is a pioneering program for

10th and 11th graders that provides foundational climate education and engages students in meaningful community action projects. Upon completion of the program, students become *YCI Certified Ambassadors*©. Students can opt to continue with a capstone project to earn *YCI Certified Ambassador with Honors*©.

At a pivotal time for their college and career goals, YCI supports students and provides important recognition of their achievements, including certification, digital badges and compostable graduation cords to wear with their cap and gown. "Many people are familiar with recognitions that come with honor societies, scouting and varsity sports, but environmental achievements are largely unrecognized. The Youth Climate Institute is changing this," said Jessica Kohout, YCI Man-

"Climate change is the biggest threat affecting all of our futures, and YCI students are the advocates and stewards our planet so desperately needs," said Meg Boyd, Executive Director. She continued, "Our chapter model provides students, teachers and

community leaders with all the tools they need to be a force for change in their own communities."

To become a certified ambassador, students learn the fundamentals of climate science and positive solutions. Students also join action teams led by professionals in climate science fields focusing on topics such as legislation, food waste, energy, tree planning and communication. #### Virtual Community Conversation: roposed Vansville Development

Residents' opinions play a big part in how our landscape changes. Being involved in this process is crucial as new developments will alter your neighborhood's environment. I rely on input from the community to guide me on what residents prefer to see in their neighborhoods.

A developer is seeking to develop 7.75 acres of land at the southeast intersection of Old Baltimore Pike and Ammendale Way (11701 Old Baltimore Pike, Vansville) into a townhouse community with a maximum of 67 units.

In February of this year, a neighborhood meeting was held with the developer to discuss this project in greater detail, per Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) guidelines.

M-NCPPC has accepted the developer's Preliminary Plan of Subdivision and is moving toward having a hearing before the Planning Board. 

# Stop For School Buses: What Are The Laws In Maryland?

Maryland State Police and the Maryland Center for School Safety (MCSS) remind motorists to stop for school buses as students return to class next week.

Drivers must stop at least 20 feet from a school bus with the stop arm extended and the red lights flashing. Do not pass the bus from any direction until the stop signals are off and the bus is moving again. Motorists in Maryland are not required to stop if the road is separated by

a physical median – such as dirt,



transportation-related crashes from 2011 to 2020, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The MCSS encourages Marylanders and visitors to:

 Pay attention when driving, especially in school zones and during times of day when school buses are typically on routes

- Stop when a bus stops. It is illegal to pass a school bus with its red lights flashing.
- Prepare to stop when the school bus is flashing its yellow lights and be cautious of students beginning to move toward the bus during these times.
- Students of all ages are unpredictable. Therefore, prepare for the unexpected and maintain a safe distance from school buses at all times.

Violators who are stopped by a police officer face a fine of up to \$570 and three points on their driver's licenses. Infractions carry a monetary penalty for each violation. For additional school bus safety tips, visit the Maryland Highway Safety Office.

who prepares food for a local food pantry and distributes homecooked meals to tent cities around Chicago. Buescher began fighting food insecurity at age 7 with the Honeycomb Project. Today, he mentors younger volunteers while maintaining his own service projects.

#### Voice

The youth voice is vital, pointing us to which concerns are most important to future world leaders and helping broaden perspectives. Use your voice to advocate for causes you care about by posting on social media, attending a rally or contacting a government leader. Adults can amplify youth voices by sharing with their networks, or organizing forums for youth to be seen and heard.

Seventeen-year-old Daily Point of Light Award honoree Maanit Goel used his voice when orga-

nizing a rally of fellow activists on the Washington State Capitol steps to support legislation protecting the Chinook salmon and orca populations. He also regularly addresses state legislators, and travels statewide to speak to K-12 students about environmen-

#### **Listen and Learn**

Social justice and environmental issues are nuanced, involving many people with different perspectives shaped by their own experiences. Listening and learning is one way to honor others' lived experiences and get a fuller scope of an issue.

Young people can commit to thoroughly researching causes they care about, talking to those working toward solutions and holding space for those impacted. Adults can connect with the young people in their lives, inviting dialogue that allows for sharing different perspectives and finding common ground.

These are the driving ideas behind the work of high schooler Kristie To, who became a leading force in Asian American racial justice when she founded Hearts Against Hate. Among the initiatives of her nonprofit is distributing Asian history and Asian American Pacific Islander civil rights curriculum to children.

"Cultural sensitivity starts with exposure, and that's what we're trying to do with these elementary schoolers," says To.

"There are many formal channels for civic engagement, but simple actions make a difference too," says Quest. "Whether it's carrying groceries in for a neighbor or donating books to the library, the important thing is to get started when you see a need in your community."


# Genealogical Society Hosts Talk on Relocating Cemeteries



I applaud and respect Alex for seeing a problem in the community and creating a platform with a workable solution. A lot of people see things everyday that can be areas of opportunity to start a business that can be nurtured into growth.

Last weekend, while I was ubering in Dallas, I was on a backroad near Uptown Dallas. Many millennials live in this area, and many are from the generation of i-don't-havetime-to-cook. As I approached an intersection, I noticed a small sign saying "open" on the side of a business. I peered over, thinking maybe an employee had forgotten to switch off the sign. Apparently, I was wrong. It was a pizza location that stayed open overnight. Most food places close for the night, between 10 pm to midnight and re-open the next day. He stays open and sells pizza to people who have a need to order food that late. Being the only one, he has a ready-made market. The two vehicles outside were presumably for delivery.
