The Beltsville Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD) was incorporated in January of 1947 by 43 men who had a vision of providing fire and emergency medical services to the Beltsville and Vansville Communities in Maryland. In June of 1947, a lot was deeded to the BVFD and construction, made possible by the efforts of the volunteer firemen and community donations, on the firehouse began shortly thereafter. Although additions and modifications have been made over the years, we are still occupying the building that was originally erected today. Currently we have approxi-

G o o dadvice for the winter for your car from the District VI police station:

1) Do not leave your car on to warm up unattended. It is against the law to leave a car unattended while it is running and someone will steal your car.

2) Keep your headlights clear with car wax. Just wipe ordinary car wax on your headlights. It contains special water repellents that will prevent that messy mixture from accumulating on your lights up to six weeks. 3) Squeak-proof your wipers with rubbing alcohol. Wipe the wipers with a cloth saturated in rubbing alcohol or ammonia. This trick can make badly streaking and squeaking wipers change to near-perfect silence and clarity. 4) Ice-proof your windows with vinegar. Is frost on its way? Just fill a spray bottle with threeparts vinegar to one-part water and spritz it on all your windows at night. In the morning, they'll be clear of icy mess. Vinegar contains acetic acid which raises the melting point of water, preventing water from freezing.

Memories of Laurel Mall

Laurel Mall is going to be demolished. Someone once said that everything has an expiration date. How sad; how true.

Laurel Mall provided a reason for a weekly outing when my sons were much younger. On the weekend days when they weren't occupied by soccer, baseball, basketball or football, Laurel Mall guaranteed an inexpensive way to amuse two energetic children for this Beltsville mother.

Naturally, the food court was the main event. Four or five small rides were available for a mere 25 cents for five minutes of jerking and jumping about in a space ship or antique car. The helicopter ride was too large for my oldest, Denny, but he delighted in allowing his younger brother Corey to board the 'copter and Denny took on the role as air traffic controller. I sat close by and appreciated how simple it was to entertain two little boys. Boredom set in after 10 or 15

minutes and the lunch debate began. Fried chicken or pizza? A hot dog from Orange Julius or just a sleeve of Boardwalk Fries? Ice cream cones or sundaes? Corey inevitably took one lick of a single scoop cone and the entire scoop landed on the mall floor. He quickly learned a sundae in a cup made for a happier Mom. Kay-Bee Toy Store proved to be a lifesaver time and time again. Usually a last minute birthday party invitation would arrive and Kay-Bee was small enough to make split-second decisions possible. Much to a mom's delight they sold wrapping paper and, provided I remembered to throw scotch tape and a pair of scissors in my purse, made it possible to wrap the hastily-chosen gift in the front seat of my car while parked

Greater Beltsville Business Association Holds First Annual Membership Meeting

GBBA had a full house for its first Annual Membership meeting. Formally launched in February of this year, GBBA has reached 47 members and is ending 2011 growing. Directors and Committee chairs reported on first-year efforts of the group.

- Diane Brown, Prince George's Community Federal Credit Union, provided the Treasurer's report for our first year of operations; discussed the invoice process for upcoming dues and told the group they will now have the option to pay dues online via Paypal.
- Two members of GBBA's Communications Committee were called on for reports by Jay Williams, Jay Williams Design Co., and Committee chair. Howard Axelrod, Outreach Director of High Road Upper School in Beltsville, Md., invited all present to participate in its regular first-Wednesdayof-the-month meetings. He spoke

of the committee's development and its follow-through with print materials, the group's website: www.beltsvillebusiness.com, and other innovations, such as setting up a GBBA phone number and a new video on the website of the GBBA's breakfast meeting in November, taped by Femi Dada of Smarthost Design Technologies, Inc. Kay Lane, a Herbalife independent distributor, explained the Ambassador program. This team of members calls on Beltsville businesses to explain GBBA and what it offers businesses that join. To date, 100 information packets have been provided businesses.

* Tom Aylward, Jackson-Shaw, and Development Committee chair, said the committee's work is vital to help inform members, especially for Beltsville businesses who lease space as only landowners receive pending project notifications from MNCPPC about development activities. GBBA work included the presentation on the Sub-Region 1 Master plan by Park and Planning staff; monitoring of the CSX/MTA Rail Intermodal Facility site selection process (a possible Beltsville site) and the formation of a Camden Line Coalition to seek increased MARC

- Peg Duchesne, Duchesne Enterprise, chair of the Activities Committee, spoke about GBBA involvement in a series of public meetings, Police Night Out, Laurel Day and Beltsville Day; and GBBA happy hour open houses at various businesses over the past 6 or 7 months, many of which produced new members.
- Bob Mignon, Beltsville Minuteman Press and Membership Committee chair, alerted the members to a dues increase, from the 2011 introductory rates starting at \$45 per year. He announced that the newest GBBA member is Konterra with Caleb Gould as its voting member. He described membership drive efforts. He assured the group the budget target of 50 first year members would be reached in 2011.
- Buddy Clark, McCartin Insurance, GBBA Vice President and Program committee chair said the monthly speakers have provided the membership information that helps their business with government regulation such as Health Insurance and allows informed participation on many issues facing the Beltsville community. Buddy announced that Sandy Jimenez, Principal of High Point High School, will be the January 18 Breakfast meeting at Cross Creek Club. He invited members to sug-

gest future topics and speakers.

• Femi Dada and GBBA President Paul Zurkowski, Ready Real Estate, LLC, wound up the meeting. Femi Dada provided a PowerPoint presentation on how the proposed Beltsville First program would work and invited people to sign up for a Beta test of the concept. Paul Zurkowski provided a sign-up form for businesses interested in supporting detailed classified directory of Greater Beltsville businesses that would help residents "Shop Beltsville First." He also mentioned the Board is considering whether GBBA should hold a Beltsville Business and Industry Trade Show and invited a show of support by returning the sign-up form.

Sharon DeGrouchy, a Long and Foster agent, offered to chair a committee to manage a GBBA charity golf tournament at Cross Creek Golf Club. Sharon asked for suggested charities to benefit from the tournament. Karen M. Coakley, Beltsville Civic Association President and a RE/MAX agent covering the mid-Atlantic corridor, suggested the 6th District Police Explorers unit as an existing 501(c)3 in need of support. Cooperation with the Rotary club as a co-sponsor was raised by Dr. John Moynihan, an active member of the Beltsville Rotary for 23 years as well as Charter GBBA member. A promising beginning to a new year of service brought the meeting to a close. The assembled members networked before and after the meeting.

5) Prevent car doors from freezing shut with cooking spray. Spritz cooking oil on the rubber seals around car doors and rub it in with a paper towel. The cooking spray prevents water from melting into the rubber.
6) Fog-proof your windshield with shaving cream. Spray some shaving cream on the inside of

your windshield and wipe it off with paper towels. Shaving cream has many of the same ingredients found in commercial defoggers.

7) De-ice your lock in seconds with hand sanitizer. Just put some hand sanitizer gel on the key and the lock and the problem's solved!







Baker Bill STUFF 'N THINGS

Winter is here, the trees are bare, there's talk of snow, but I don't care. Some like the fireside slumber; as for me, I like the warm long summer!

I had a good compliment the other day. Someone heard me called Baker Bill and he said, "Oh, you're the writer."

Who, me? I may be called a writer but never a poet. I had two letters from people who made the fruitcake and liked it. I told you so.

It's your last chance to sign up for the baking class that starts Jan. 9. Many of the ladies that take the class more than once say it's a fun night out without drinking.

You know it's wintertime! You also know it's time for baking: cookies, cakes and breads. Moms, if the kids are stuck in the house on a cold snowy day after you have had fun with them shoveling the walk, here is a simple muffin recipe. When anyone talks about blueberry muffins, we all think, "Yum!" Maybe you are not sure how to make them. Well here's

how.

In a medium size bowl, place 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup all-purpose flour. Now stir in 2 eggs, a pinch of salt, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Mix together with 1/4 cup milk. Add a shot of vanilla for flavor. Mix until smooth. Now add 1/2 cup of salad oil* and stir in until smooth. This is a basic muffin mix and will turn out great the first time. If you use fresh blueberries, wash them well and add to batter. If canned, wash all the sugar off them. Fill muffin pans to the top and bake at 390 degrees for approximately 25 minutes. Special note: Only mix fruit in by hand and not too much or everything will be blue, but still tasty. Here is a real treat. Stir in 1/2 cup cream corn and 3 tbsp. corn meal. You see why I call it a basic mix? You can add chopped apples to the mix. Baker's secret! Steep the fruit in flour before adding to batter and they will stay up in finished muffins not sink to bottom while baking. *NOTE: salad oil is any oil you want to use, Soya, canola,

even olive oil. All will work fine.

Those were simpler times when a \$1.25 slice of pizza sufficed instead of a large home-delivered version for 10-times the cost. Laurel Mall served the community for many years. The anchor stores were J.C. Penney, Montgomery Ward and Hecht's; Bloomingdale's and Lord and Taylor weren't necessary or able to meet the needs of our community. The mall and its businesses met our needs. Online shopping, outlet malls, the demand for high-end electronics and sushi for lunch proved to be the death knell for Laurel Mall. It's okay. We, in Beltsville and the surrounding communities, still have our memories.






