Headstone of Civil War Veteran Unveiled as American Legion Post #235 Celebrates Veterans Day 2011

African-Americans have participated in every American war since this nation was founded. On Friday, Nov. 11, the members of the William Francis Smith American Legion Post #235 gathered in the sanctuary of Queen's Chapel United Methodist Church for their annual Veterans Day Celebration. In this year's celebration, Post #235 paid tribute to the Vansville community's earliest known veteran, Israel Crump, Sr., a Civil War veteran and member of the U.S. Colored Troops.

Born a slave in Prince William County, Va., Crump escaped from a farm about four miles east of Bull Run in July 1862, at the time of the second battle of Bull Run. He escaped bringing with him his mother Adaline Crump and came with the Union Army to Alexandria, Va. Prior to their escape, his father, John Crump had been sold south. The story of his participation in the Civil War had been passed by word of mouth through his family for generations, but was only documented in recent years. Search of pension records at the National Archives discovered the sworn deposition he gave Dec. 20, 1900, to obtain a pension for his Civil War service. In his deposition, he provides a detailed

account of his life from his slavery beginning to his enlistment and assignment to Company E 1st U.S. Colored Infantry.

The document also includes the names and locations of all the battles in which he participated. Interestingly, he was, at first, denied enlistment because of an injury to his left leg. Because he expressed a strong desire to fight, the doctors allowed him to enlist. Also, in detailing his experiences, he indicates that his father enlisted in the USCT in New Orleans,



- **Femi Dada**, owner, Smarthost Design Technologies, LLC, Beltsville (1 year term)


The board will elect its 2012 officers in January.

Konterra Plans Opening as Early as June 2015

The long-term vision of the Gould family, accompanied by resources equal to the grand design of the Konterra project, exploded in the minds of GBBA's Nov. 16 meeting attendees, as a timetable provided a grand opening of the commercial portion of the project as early as June 2015.

Konterra is the most prominently figured project anywhere in the I-95 corridor's Mid-Atlantic region. Konterra Town Center East is an almost-500 acre development that will add 4,500 residential units and 5.9 million square feet of commercial, retail and office space, both on the I-95 corridor and at the eastern end of the Inter-County Connector (ICC),

right at Beltsville's door step.

Pastor Kermit Netteberg, newly elected member of the board of the Greater Beltsville Business Association and Pastor at the Beltsville Seventh-Day Adventist Church, shared his thinking that the Konterra Project will create a mega community comprised of Beltsville, Konterra and Laurel, drawing business and customers from up and down the I-95 corridor within the next few years, as well as many more being fed into this mega-community at the eastern terminus of the ICC.

The recognition of the real physical and business growth in this huge enterprise is bound to dominate business and community planning in these three communities for the foreseeable future.

Memories of a Special Friendship

Seventy years ago, Charlotte Eccard lived in Baltimore. She had left her small hometown of Clear Spring, Md., to become the first student to graduate from the University of Maryland School of X-ray in the late 1930s.

In 1941, Eccard was working as an X-ray technician at Mercy Hospital in Baltimore, but kept in touch with her hometown friends and family through letters. One

of the friends with whom Eccard communicated was Joseph C. Herbert, a schoolmate and friend of her brother's. Herbert grew up about a mile outside of Clear Spring, Md., and used to visit Eccard regularly when they both lived there. In 1941, Herbert was in the U.S. Army, stationed at Pearl Harbor. He was killed in the Japenese attack on December 7,







1941. Unknown to Eccard, he had already mailed his Christmas gifts to get to Maryland by Christmas. Eccard received the gifts from Herbert a couple weeks after he

Eccard is gone now, too, but in December 2010, although her memory was fading, she remem-

bered her friend, Herbert. She treasured the Christmas gifts: two pieces of carved Hawaiian wood vanity accessories, which were sent to her years ago.

"She repeated the story of how they arrived after Joe's death many times," said Kathy Mellott, Eccard's daughter. "I heard the story all my life," she reported.

It was not until Eccard's 90th birthday party, March 2010, that the letter she wrote to her parents upon hearing of Herbert's death resurfaced. The paper was faded, not only from the many years that had passed, but from tears that filled her eyes while writing the letter on Tuesday, Dec. 9, 1941. The letter expressed her sadness at losing her dear friend, and expressed anger at Japan, which was the pervading sentiment after Pearl Harbor. At that time, Eccard did not know that she would be receiving gifts from her friend a few weeks later.

In the letter she wrote, "They aren't sending his body home are they?... Don't blame me if you can't read this because my eyes are all blinded with tears."

Herbert's body was returned to his hometown in 1943. A proclamation by the Governor was proposed to honor the first boy from Maryland killed in World War II.

The American Legion Post in Clear Spring, Md., was named in Herbert's memory.

The ARC Honors Robert Ziepolt of Beltsville

On Oct. 20, The ARC honored Robert Ziepolt of Beltsville, Md., with a Lifetime Achievement Award as part of its Countywide Awards Program. The first president of the ARC Prince George's County, Ziepolt has been a stalwart advocate for the rights of people with developmental disabilities for almost 60 years, which he began doing when his own daughter Elsie was about to enter public school.

Speaking at the awards luncheon, Ziepolt reminisced about The ARC's 1952 beginnings in the basement of St. Luke's Church in Bladensburg, Md., where concerned parents gathered. The county did not provide educational resources for children with intellectual or developmental disabilities.

Ziepolt noted, "Our primary goal was to get special education started in the schools."

The members' efforts paid off two years later with the opening of the first special education program at the Calvert School in Riverdale, Md.

Other early advocacy efforts included helping establish both a teacher training program at the University of Maryland, as well as Vocational Services Industries (VSI), now known as New Horizons

So much has changed over the past 60 years. Ziepolt hopes his life-long efforts will inspire the next generation of parents and people with intellectual and developmental disabilities to fight for expanded rights and opportunities.

Eight additional people and organizations were honored for promoting positive change. Family advocate, Michael McLaughlin received the Award of Excellence, Advocacy. After his citation was read, McLaughlin's daughter, Erin, who has Down's Syndrome and has been his inspiration, handed her father the award. Johnny's Auto Service, and its owner John Harrison, were recognized with the Award of Excellence, Corporate Involvement. Executive Director Joyce Sims accepted the

Award of Excellence, Employment, for Resource Connections, Inc. Prince George's County Public School teacher, Angela Calado, was presented the Award of Excellence, Education. The Award of Excellence, Government Service, went to Janice Stallworth, Acting Director, DDA, Southern Maryland Regional Office. For the Archdiocese of Washington, Executive Director Mary O'Meara accepted the Award of Excellence, Worship. Dottie Sheldon was honored with the Award of Excellence, Recreation, for her nurturing work with the Family, Friends and Fun Bowling League; and Donald Gallimore, an ardent public speaker and advocate for people with developmental disabilities, was presented the Outstanding Citizen Award.

The ARC congratulates Ziepolt and our other eight winners for their hard work and success. They are truly champions for change.



Baker Bill STUFF 'N THINGS

Ah, the happy time is here - Christmas! I hope all had a good Thanksgiving. It is great to have a day with family.

I have asked for comments about my drivel; and I received some. The guys say they like my view point on consumer stuff; the ladies suggest I write more about Baking.

So let's talk about fruit cake. Most people will put up with it but do not like it so much. They eat it because it came from family. I admit, me, too. But the

recipe to follow will change all that. This fruitcake is great. You'll need to go and buy a one-pound tub of diced candied fruit sold in the produce aisle, and pecans, at least an ounce or two. Here yound the diced fruit in

ounce or two. Here we go. Dump the diced fruit into a bowl and soak in hot water until you make the cake side of recipe. In a fairly large size bowl, place ½ cup sugar, one cup all purpose flour, one teaspoon baking powder and a pinch of salt. Now add an egg and ¼ cup milk. With a hand mixer, beat well at high speed about two minutes. Now stir in ¼ cup of oil. Now write this recipe down on a pad.

Let's get back to the soaked fruit. Drain well and add to it the pecans and ½ cup raisins; mix well. Side note: we soak the

diced fruit to remove what looks like sugar, but it's sulfur coating, which makes the cake taste badly. Along the same lines, do not add real rum; it just bakes out, leaving a nasty flavor. You can add imitation rum, about ½ ounce to taste. If you have gone this far, you are thinking that doesn't look like enough cake compared to the amount of fruit and nut I have ready. But it is good. Now, by hand, mix the fruit mixture in the cake batter until it is all coated.

This recipe will be just enough for a bread size pan. Spray

the pan and add mixture. Smooth out. You can decorate the top with pecan pieces or other fruit if you like. Bake three hours at 320 degrees making the there are no wet spots

sure there are no wet spots on the loaf. By all means, let it cool all day. Do not try to cut hot. Side note again—now you can add real rum (if you must)! and let it soak in.

What makes this fruitcake different from all the others is the bakers secret - soaking off the coating from the diced fruit. You look at it thinking the coating will improve the cake, but no. Be sure to wash it well before adding it to the cake




