use a compass to find their way around hill and forest, swamp and field, and river and valleys

to locate orienteering markers. In the morning, individual pairs competition, the scouts are guided along a blazed path and along the path they have to locate 6 orienteering markers and place a dot on their maps as to the exact location of the marker. Points are awarded based upon how close they are to the correct location of each marker. In the afternoon troop competition, all of the troops are given the same topographical map with 50 locations marked on the map.

The senior patrol leader (Al) divided up the troop into pairs to devise a plan to locate as many of the 50 orienteering markers as they could in 90 minutes. Each marker has a unique paper punch which must be punched onto the corresponding box number and returned to the starting point within 90 minutes. The fall weather was cool and crisp and the scouts had a great time running around in the outdoors. They can't wait to compete again next year.

Jesus represents the partridge in the pear tree. The two turtledoves represent the Old and New Testament. The three French hens represent virtues, faith, hope and love. The four calling birds are the four Gospels. Finally, the five gold rings are the first five books from the Old Testament, from when God made Adam and Eve to man's fall into sin. Since you know what the first five mean, the song may now sound different.

Silent Night is the most played, recorded, and performed carol in history. It is over two hundred years old and was composed in the early 1800s. The story behind this song is that Joseph Mohr was the person who wrote silent night and it was to be performed at his church, but the organ at his church

was actually broken and they had to perform the song with vocals and a guitar.

There is actually another wonderful story behind this that goes all the way back to World War I. A mother, Ernestine Schumann Heink, sang Stille Nacht (Silent Night) on the radio. She was an international celebrity, but also had both of her sons battling in the war, both on opposite sides. Her singing the song brought peace for a few moments in the middle of the war. That's how powerful and beautiful the song really is.

Every carol that you sung in your lives has a special meaning to it. All you have to do is look into them and find the history behind them. You never know what you secrets you might uncover.



Marilyn Doherty, 84, has volunteered at Reptile Discovery Center for 18 years

SILVER SPRING, MD— When she was a young girl visiting her grandparents' house in the Catskill Mountains of New York, Marilyn Doherty was warned about rattlesnakes.

Decades later, she would help to hold a 19-foot, 20-year old anaconda as part of her duties at the National Zoo.

Ms. Doherty, 84, is a resident of Riderwood, the Erickson Living retirement community in Silver Spring. Her days are filled with volunteer activities, but her bi-weekly visits to the Reptile Discovery Center expose her sense of adventure.

She made a career as a middle school teacher in Long Island, New York, and raised a family with her beloved husband, John.

To be closer to their children later in life, the couple moved to northern Virginia in 1995. "I was a total stranger," described Ms. Doherty. "I was relatively unfamiliar with the area and had no acquaintances outside of my

family."

Yearning to be involved in the community, she scrolled through a newspaper and discovered a "volunteers wanted" ad for the National Zoo. After responding, she was accepted, and then received a surprising assignment: the Reptile Discovery Center.

"I was definitely shocked, but intrigued at the same time," stated Ms. Doherty. "I had no idea about turtles and snakes. After a crash course, and through experience and a sharp memory, I have learned a great deal."

For eighteen years, Ms. Doherty has held those snakes, turtles and lizards while providing an overview of the Reptile Discovery Center to field trip groups and tourists.

"The response is terrific. Many of the children who take the tour can't believe it," laughed Ms. Doherty. "But I really enjoy teaching, and volunteering at the National Zoo has added so much

to my life."

And it's not the only place where she shares her time and talents. She volunteers in Montgomery County with students at both Fairland Elementary School and Westover Elementary School and serves as a Eucharistic Minister at Resurrection Church in Burtonsville.

But it's her adventures at the National Zoo that earned Ms. Doherty the nickname "Snake Lady" by her friends at Riderwood retirement community. "It makes me laugh when I hear someone call me the 'Snake Lady' so I fondly answer to it," she said.

"I watched the movie 'Snakes on a Plane' and enjoyed it," noted Ms. Doherty. "The public has a true fascination with reptiles and that makes my role at the National Zoo interesting. I hope I can keep doing it for a long time."

Women Veterans Share Their Stories at TESST College Military Tribute

Approximately 40 day and evening students, staff and faculty were recognized at a formal ceremony and reception. currently serves as the Director of Quality Management for the Northern Regional Medical Command. During the reception, Fleming shared her experiences as part of a medical team in Saudi Arabia and Iraq. "I very quickly came to realize that women were considered less than second class citizens", Fleming said. "I found they were treated as if they were almost invisible". Conversely, Fleming, a nurse by trade, spoke about her time treating the wounded. "Beginning in 1992, and for most of the nine months I was deployed to Iraq and Saudi Arabia, I gained significant battlefield experience treating wounded American, Iraqi and Iranian soldiers". Fleming related several incidents where the medical team, working without interpreters, managed to devise a "language" or system which allowed the Iraqi/Iranian soldiers to communicate with the practitioners and receive the appropriate treatment. "It was very frustrating for a while, because we weren't able to understand one another at all" Fleming said. It was even more difficult, because most of the soldiers had traumatic injuries and were experiencing a great deal


gender", she continued, "the soldiers were openly grateful for the treatment they received from us". "If I had it [military service] to do over again", Fleming concluded, "I would do it without a moment's hesitation. Those were some of the best years of my life".

Marisol Gonzales, a Medical Assistant student (former Specialist, US Army), echoed Fleming's sentiments. Gonzales spoke about her experiences in Afghanistan. "For a while, it was very difficult for me as some of the locals looked past the fact I was a US Solider in uniform and only viewed [and treated] me as woman", Gonza-

Rosapepe's Report to Beltsville

Big win for our community — and our environment

As you may know, several months ago a good developer proposed a regional shopping center in the wrong place -- the University of Maryland golf course! The project would have flooded our area with traffic, destroyed precious green space, and undermined the plans to redevelop the UM east campus, the College Park Metro stop, and Route One.

The good news is the whole community -- residents, businesses, UM alums and students -- came together to convince the developer to drop his plan to destroy the golf course and build a bypass road.

All our elected officials representing this area -- from the College Park City Council to Governor O'Malley, Lt. Governor Brown, Attorney General Gansler, and US Representatives Steny Hoyer and Donna Edwards -- and all our local senators, delegates, and county council members -worked with the 21st District Delegation and played important roles in convincing the developer to drop the misconceived plan. We

are proceeding aggressively with improvements to Route One and neighboring areas. And we need to remain vigilant about harebrained schemes to destroy open space and increase traffic.

Trucks on Powder Mill Road

In recent years, Councilwoman Mary Lehman, Delegates Barbara Frush, Joseline Peña-Melnyk, Ben Barnes, and I worked with the community and the State Highway Administration (SHA) to stop the out-of-control 18-wheel trucks which cut through Beltsville neighborhoods to avoid the weigh stations along I-95. They had created significant noise, vibration, and safety problems.

A solution was proposed to ban all trucks weighing more than 5 tons from using Rt. 212. However, one of the unintended consequences was that it created a problem for Beltsville-based businesses that then couldn't use the road exiting Beltsville.

Last month, SHA met with citizens, representatives from the Beltsville Civic Association, business leaders, and elected officials to discuss the issue. After exploring several options, SHA proposed helping local businesses while protecting residents by changing the truck weight restriction to 13

tons. This change allows trucks that are smaller in size and have significantly less noise or vibration impacts. The new restriction will continue to ban the large, problematic trucks. Thanks to the community and business leaders who worked together to craft a solution to protect Beltsville.

New signs are being installed, and we hope this solution will work for everyone. If it doesn't, please let us know and we'll work with the community for an alternative.

Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of happiness or in my case good food. The pursuit of the American dream consumes most young people in my generation. You go to college, graduate, intern somewhere, and start working toward obtaining pieces of the American dream - a home with the white picket fence, the perfect spouse, and 2.5 children. I wish someone would explain how one gives birth to .5 of a child. I was in full pursuit of my happiness with a successful career as a sales account managert for a Fortune 500 IT Company. My seven year career took me to three states and was the catalyst to me fulfilling the second part of my dream; meeting my beautiful wife.

Rewind to February (2012), and the economic downturn quickly turned my dream upside down. Life has a funny way of changing your trajectory and priorities. When my career ended I quickly found myself faced with the choice of looking for another sales job or embarking into the unknown and follow my wife's advice to pursue my love of food.

Where do I begin with explaining my fascination with food and all things epicurean? My earliest childhood memories revolve around the sweet aroma of my mom baking. 

To start with I want to wish all a Merry Christmas and happy holiday season. Now, how about a great recipe: it's very easy to do with ingredients you have in your home now.

Scones

1 stick of butter at room temperature, 1 ½ cups of flour and 1/4 cup sugar mixed together. Then add 1 tablespoon sour cream (if you have any), 1 tablespoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon soda, a pinch of salt (optional) and 4 oz. milk. Mix well evenly turn out and knead by hand. The dough should be firm but not stiff. SPECIAL NOTE: you cannot over mix. It will not make it tough. Cut with a cutter about 3/4 inch thick, save scraps and pat down with your hand. Whip up an egg and paint the top. Sprinkle a little sugar on top and bake at 400 degrees for approximately 15-18 minutes until golden brown. NOTE: you can add almost anything to it, such as pecans or raisins. Along with my corn muffin this is my most requested recipe.

recipes. My daughter designed my web site and did a great job.

Here are 2 baking tips. (1) If you purchase ready made pie shells from your supermarket. Set them aside until they come to room temperature if cracked just press the dough back together. (2) When baking your pie set the oven to 410 degrees for 15 minutes then the turn temperature back to 390 degrees. DO NOT open the door. Why? The bottom of the pie bakes better on the down heat. When you buy the pie shell, buy a small can of pumpkin and go to the spice aisle and get a small pumpkin pie spice. You will like it for a lot of other stuff. It is a combination of cinnamon, nutmeg, and ginger. It tastes great on buttered toast. Now in a medium size bowl mix the can of pumpkin, 1/3 cup of sugar,

2 beaten eggs and 1 tablespoon of the spice. Mix well then add 1 cup of milk. Note canned milk is good or any you have will work too. Stir until smooth. Carefully fill your pie shell to the top. You may have some left over, bake it in small custard dishes. It will bake at 400 degrees an hour. Let it cool, do not cut it while it is hot because it needs to settle. SPECIAL NOTE: Make this in advance, do not wait till that day to try it. Also write down the recipe by hand do not try to do it from the paper.

If the above recipes are hard to understand drop me a line and I'll send you a properly listed recipe. And sending from a phone? I can't E mail you a long recipe to a phone.


