Beltsville Seventh-Day Adventist Church

Beltsville Seventh-Day Adventist Church hosted 50 homeless ladies from the Bethany House Homeless Shelter in Washington, D.C., for a Christmas banquet on Friday night, Dec. 7.

"This has become as much a Christmas ritual at our church as singing Christmas carols during worship services," said Senior Pastor Kermit Netteburg. The church has been hosting a dinner like this every year for 20 years.

The church buses women from the shelter to the church's fellowship hall. The hall is decorated with trees and lights. The fireplace glows. The women are welcomed and ushered in to tables decorated with poinsettias and candles.

The meal features turkey and vegetarian options, along with candied yams, mashed potatoes and an assortment of vegetables and salads. Dessert includes pumpkin pie and other delicacies

Children from the church do a large part of the program. The children's puppet team presents several Christmas songs, and other children help the ladies sing songs from *Silent Night* to *Feliz Navidad*.

Every year each homeless woman takes a rolling suitcase away from the dinner. Members of the church take a suitcase and fill it with warm clothing and other necessities for the winter in the weeks before the dinner. The highlight of the evening is the distribution of the suitcases.

For the first time, a choir from Bethany House sang at this year's dinner.

Brea Mitchell has organized the event for most of its 20 years. "I couldn't do this without the help of a lot of church members. At least 125 volunteers put this year's event together, from people helping in the kitchen to members taking home empty suitcases and filling them up."

Youth Pastor Sonia Perez takes a special interest in making sure every woman gets a suitcase. "We were up until 1 a.m. Thursday morning, making

sure that every suitcase had the important necessities."

Some women have come for years, but most of the women are new each year. Homelessness isn't a permanent condition, according to Evelyn Green, the director of Bethany House. Most of the women just need a tempo-

rary place to get them through a rough period.

The church also provided space for homeless women in another program, New Day, during the week of December 16-22. New Day provides shelter for men and women in Laurel and Beltsville, Md., during the winter

months

Associate Pastor Glenn Holland said Beltsville Adventist Church is one of about 12 churches that operate this winteronly shelter. New Day also runs a job training and job placement service to help the homeless find employment.

Every year we make New Year's resolutions that last for a week and then we don't talk about them for the rest of the year. Are you tired of making these same ol' resolutions? I'm going to lose weight, I'm going to quit speeding, I'm going to quit swearing and the list goes on and on. This year I challenge you to change that resolution, resolve to help someone in need.

The population of Beltsville, Md., is approximately 16,772 currently. Out of that number, approximately, 20 percent struggle with the English language. Roughly 10 percent fall below the poverty line. That is almost 5,100 people in the Beltsville area alone, not to mention the thousands in areas surrounding Beltsville, such as College Park, Laurel, and Greenbelt, Md., and others. It is a safe bet that someone in your neighborhood could probably use some help.

So make a pledge this New Year to make a difference in someone's life. Emmanuel United Methodist Church offers a variety

of programs for which you can volunteer. Each of these programs could always use an extra hand.

Do you feel the call to teach others? Then maybe you want to join the ESOL program at Emmanuel. They are always looking for volunteers and you do not need to have a teaching degree to help out. ESOL will continue its sixth year of English classes for speakers of other languages (ESOL) with instruction for beginning, intermediate and advanced level students. The Spring semester starts with registration on Tuesday evening, Jan. 15, from 7 to 9 p.m. Subsequently, all classes will be held on Tuesday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. through April 23.

Also on Tuesdays, along with the ESOL program is the Youth Learning Fellowship. This is a program that provides homework help and structured activities to the children of students in our ESOL program. They are always looking for adults to help out with homework and activities.

Emmanuel hosts a monthly food distribution that feeds anywhere from 150 to 200 families a month. This happens on the fourth

Emmanuel also partners with Behnke's Nursery on a community garden. You can come and help with the planting and harvesting of fresh vegetables. The vegetables are used during the monthly food distributions and those who help may take some of the vegetables home for their families.

If one of these opportunities doesn't fit into your schedule, look around, there are many others in the area. Find one that works for you, give an hour a week, four hours a month. Pledge to help someone less fortunate this year.



Local Youth Theater Group Still Active Despite Financial Cutbacks

One year ago, the Prince George's Summer Teen Theatre (PGSTT), a nonprofit theater education organization founded in 1967 in Beltsville, Md., almost closed its doors for the first time because of funding shortfalls. But thanks to many generous friends who see value in introducing our young people to theater, they sur-

2012 began as a rebuilding year for the organization. The board of directors met and began to restructure the program so that it would continue on. With donations from past supporters, they held an alumni contest in February for an original script. The prize? The organization produced the play and gave the winner the opportunity to direct it. In April, PGSTT presented You Never Know, by alum Daryn Robinson, a play about bullying, Asperger's Syndrome, and friendship. It was a wonderful show and included an actor who has Autism. A whole character was written just for her.

As many readers of The Beltsville News know, PGSTT's summer shows have always been musicals. Unfortunately, that wasn't to be the case last summer. Musicals are very expensive to produce and financially they weren't ready to do so. They opted for fiscal responsibility and produced a comedy, 30 Reasons NOT to be in a Play, by Alan Haehnel. It was a quirky sketch comedy poking fun at themselves as performers, which all involved

Not only did they produce two shows this year and attract new actors, they also built a relationship with a new venue. The Charis Center for the Arts in Bowie has become their home for now. It's much smaller than High Point High School, their venue of past years, but meets the current needs of the program very well.

PGSTT weathered a tough 45th season. Now, although the immediate crisis has passed, they will continue to keep working just as hard to rebuild the program to its former strength and long-term sustainability. Currently, they are planning to produce two shows in the coming year. The first, Our Town, by Thornton Wilder, is scheduled for April 12 - 14, with auditions in January. (See our updated website, www.pgstt.org, for more information.) Will the second show be a summer musical? They hope so, but the decision will be based on the success of fundraising.

The support of friends and alumni has been critical to PGSTT's survival. If it hadn't been for the generous family of supporters, this column wouldn't have been written. But survival is not enough. PGSTT exists to bring the art of theater to young people in our area. They deserve a strong, vibrant and creative experience. PGSTT can't do that without help.

Tax Credits for Low Income Families

With so many folks underemployed or looking for jobs, the Delegates and I wanted to remind residents of the federal and state Earned Income Tax Credits, which are available to certain low-income individuals and families. These credits can reduce the amount of income tax owed or increase an income tax refund, and some credits may be received even if income is less than required to file a tax return. Taxpayers may be eligible if both federal adjusted gross income and earned income is less than the following:

\$43,998 (\$49,078 for married filing jointly) with 3 or more qualifying children

\$40,964 (\$46,044 for married filing jointly) with 2 qualifying children

\$36, 052 (\$41,132 for married filing jointly) with 1 qualifying child

\$13,660 (\$18,740 for married filing jointly) without a qualifying child

Pepco Launches New Streetlight Reporting System

Pepco has launched a new, upgraded streetlight reporting system for customers. The new streamlined reporting system improves the ability of customers to use pole numbers and addresses to submit streetlight outages via the Internet. With the click of a mouse, customers can access maps depicting streetlight locations using the "Bing" mapping engine that is easy to read and use.

Once a streetlight problem is reported, the new reporting system sends the customer an email with a tracking number, location and pole number. When a streetlight is submitted for repair, the respective icon on the map will appear red; once the light has been repaired, its respective icon will turn green. In most cases the streetlight will be repaired within 15 days. An email confirmation will be sent to the customer when the service request has been completed. Access to the new reporting system is displayed on the home page of pepco.com under Alerts and Outage Information.



The 63rd Infantry Division made a path of blood and fire from Sarreguemines through the Siegfried Line to Worms, Mannheim, Heidelberg, Gunzburg and ending in Landsberg, Germany, at the end of April 1945, when the division was pulled from the line for much-needed rest, according to the history of the 63rd Infantry Division.

In a medium size bowl, place a stick of margarine (any), add 1 cup plus 3 heaping tablespoons any flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, a heaping tablespoon sugar, a level tablespoon baking powder.

Now mash all together to a crumbly mass. Slowly add 1/2 cup cold milk a bit at a time making dough.

Work with a spoon or knead to firm dough that can be rolled out but not wet. Pat out or roll out 1& 1/2 inch thick, cut with cutter.

This will only make 4 biscuits and bake scraps. You are thinking "too thick," but know that if you make them thin, they will round off instead of rising straight up.

Place close together and bake 18 minutes until bottom lightly browns. It's time to close.






