Started in 1974, Bread for the City has been a front-line agency serving Washington's poor. The agency began as two organizations: Zacchaeus Free Clinic, which started in 1974 as a volunteer-run, free medical clinic; and Bread for the City, which was started in 1976 by a coalition of

downtown churches to feed and clothe the poor. The two entities merged in 1995. Today, two centers operate in the District of Columbia and provide direct services to low-income residents of Washington, DC. All of the services are free with the mission to provide comprehensive services, including food, clothing, medical care, and legal and social services to low-income Washington, DC, residents in an atmosphere of dig-

Four Steps to File

To file your taxes, follow these four steps:

1. Gather important documents. For each year that you failed to file a tax return, make sure you have your W-2 or Form 1099. If you can't find this paperwork, you can request a copy of your income information from your employer. If you plan to claim certain deductions and credits, make sure you have receipts on hand.

2. Locate missing paperwork. Tax documents can also be requested from the IRS by filing Form 4506-T, Request for Transcript of Tax Return. The IRS will send transcripts that contain the most important information, not duplicate copies, from your previous W-2s and Forms 1098 and 1099.

Prince George's Library Introduces Children's Museum-like Discovery Centers

Prince George's County Memorial Library System is rolling out themed children's areas called discovery centers throughout the county. The discovery centerswhich each have different themes, such as castles or space—promote literacy by encouraging learning through creative play.

"As we renovate library branches, we're designing and building colorful discovery centers that appeal to children much like children's museums," said Michael Gannon, chief operating officer of the library system. "They're destinations for families where children can visit with their parents and grandparents."

Prince George's County Memorial Library System offers six discovery centers with two more under construction and three more in development. All are free as part of the library system.

The discovery centers feature colorful carpeting and walls, props and displays, and child-friendly reading spaces. A bridge crosses a carpet moat in Beltsville Branch's Discovery Castle area; a teddybear astronaut sits in a spaceship in Fairmount Heights Branch's Discovery Space; and a childsize circus tent stands in Hillcrest Heights Branch's Discovery Cir-

Other Discovery Centers include Discovery Treehouse at the Glenarden Branch, Discovery Glen at the South Bowie Branch, and Discovery Farm at the Spauldings Branch.

In addition, the library system

is building Discovery Reef at the New Carrollton Branch, scheduled for completion in late 2016 or early 2017, and Discovery Island at the Laurel Branch. Scheduled for completion in the fall of 2016, Discovery Island will include lighted dinosaur footprints, a glass floor exposing a full-size velociraptor skeleton replica, and two children's seating areas, one within a large dinosaur rib cage and the other decorated with volcano lava and light effects.

'We're designing our discovery centers to be bright, fun, and irresistible to children, but they also serve a purpose," Gannon said. "Outfitted with books, technology, and early-literacy tools, they stoke children's curiosity and help them learn to read, a basic ability that's absolutely essential to their success as adults."

Additional discovery centers planned for the future include Discovery Town at the Bowie Branch, Discovery Village at the Hyattsville Branch, and Discovery Bay at the Surratts-Clinton Branch.

Software for Your Media

Windows Media Center

When you upgrade to Windows 10, you may find some of the features you have used in the past missing.

Two of the missing elements are related, the ability to use Windows Media Center and the ability to play DVD's. If you upgrade from Windows 7, you will lose the Windows Media Center (WMC), but Microsoft will include the software allowing DVD's to be played. However, if you upgrade from Windows 8, you will need to acquire software to play DVD's



and Blu-ray disks if you have a DVD or Blu-ray drive. Most computers that include a DVD or Blu-ray player will come with alternative software like Cyber-Power, and some manufacturers will allow you to download a new version after the upgrade. Go to your manufacturer's support web site to see if you may download the extra software provided by the

VLC is a free and open source alternative. VLC is a media player that can play many different types of media including most DVD's, Blue-ray discs, video files, and sound files. VLC is available through the Windows Store or can be downloaded directly from http://www.videolan.org.

manufacturer.

Media and Your Phone

If you have an iPhone, this typically means that you have iTunes installed on your PC. iTunes allows you to play and organize your music, but music purchased from iTunes longer ago than the past couple of years is copy protected, preventing it from being moved easily to a non-Apple device like an Android phone. There are some workarounds, but they all involve removing the copy protection. Typically, music purchased from Amazon or Google Play does not have copy protection and can be played on any device that supports MP3 including Apple devices.

Amazon allows music purchased from it to be installed onto your device or computer, and it provides an application to facilitate the download or play on your computer. It automatically installs the music into Windows Media Player (not the same as Windows Media Center) when downloaded. Amazon also offers a large amount of music that can be played free using its online players.

Editing Music and Sounds

When my eldest daughter got married, we wanted to do a father/ daughter dance to a compilation of music that was meaningful to us over the years. In order to do this, I used a free and open source product called Audacity to cut snippets from several songs and create a medley that covered several dancing styles in 6 minutes. I have also used Audacity to create customer ringtones for my phones. Audacity is a sound editor used to edit and remix sound files. It includes a number of special effects and blends. It can be downloaded from http://audacityteam.org/.

Midi and Player Piano Rolls

When I was a teenager, I had a friend with a real working player piano. I enjoyed spending time with the family around the piano and joining in on the sing-alongs. A number of people wish to preserve these fragile rolls of paper, so they create machines to scan the rolls and convert them to midi files. Midi is a standard for controlling electronic musical instruments. My electronic piano will play midi files and even has the ability to show lyrics as they play. Most computers and devices can also play midi files. If you want to hear the "Maple Leaf Rag" as played by Scott Joplin himself, look for the midi version of the piano roll he recorded over 100 years ago, download it, and play it. 



4 .Submit your forms to the IRS. Once the IRS receives the necessary forms, you are fully responsible for paying what is owed. You should receive a bill with the exact amount of what's due, including any interest charges that have accrued. The IRS takes approximately 6 weeks to process past due tax returns.

If you need to make payments, you can request a 60- to 120-day window to pay your tax bill in full on the IRS website or by calling 800-829-1040 at no additional charge. You can also work out an installment agreement if you need more time to make the payment. As our client found out, facing the fear of back taxes is the worst part of it. Plus, getting a refund is a nice bonus after a couple of hard years.


