Happy New Year! Get ready to bundle up if the weather forecasts are correct. We are supposed to have a colder than normal winter and a higher than normal amount of precipitation. The first ever report on homeless veterans reported that in 2009 there was in excess of 76,000 veterans who found themselves homeless and at least 136,000 spent at least one night a week in a homeless shelter. This study was conducted by The Veterans Administration in conjunction with the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development.

Post Christmas Software Blues

So you got a new computer for Christmas and now you are faced with the prospect of spending hundreds of dollars to purchase new software to use on your new computer. In this column we will look at some free alternatives to the software most people use on their computer.

Antivirus

Antivirus software protects your computer from being infected with a computer virus. Most new Windows computers come with a pre-installed trial copy of one of the popular Anti-Virus software packages. This trial software will normally expire after 30 days after which you are prompted to pay a fee to continue the protection for another year. Windows 8 and 8.1 also includes Microsoft Windows Defender, however this product is ranked very low when compared to other antivirus products.

The Google Drive apps are a collection of programs designed to be used with Google Drive. Google Docs provides a very basic word processor that can be used via the web browser or on your tablet or phone. Google Sheets is a simple spreadsheet program and Google Slides is a presentation builder. These applications are tied to the Google Drive application which allows files to be stored on the web and shared. The Google Drive Applications even allow multiple people to work on a document at the same time. The applications can be used when you are not connected to the web but they are not as powerful as the applications found in LibreOffice. Google Drive allows you to convert Microsoft documents into documents that can be edited on Drive.

Prince George's County Library helps facilitate health insurance enrollment

HYATTSVILLE, Md. -Prince George's County Memorial Library System partnered with the Prince George's County Health Department to provide computer access for self-directed online health insurance enrollment until Sunday, Feb. 15, 2015.

Individuals and families can shop, compare and enroll in health insurance plans at any library branch throughout Prince George's County. Shoppers can receive special assistance at the Spauldings, Oxon Hill, Accokeek, Hyattsville, New Carrollton and South Bowie branches during normal branch hours.

By law, under the Affordable Care Act, most people over age 18 must have health insurance coverage beginning in 2014 or pay a fine.

Applicants should have their

Social Security numbers, birthdates and general information about any family members applying for health coverage, employer and income information, policy numbers for any current health insurance plans and information about any other job-related health insurance available when they visit the library. The Wolf den worked on Collecting Beltloop and their next achievements. The Webelos have almost completed Engineering Activity Pin.


Cub Pack 1031 ended the year with a Holiday party with food, crafts singing and a visit from Santa Claus!

Tiger Cubs from Pack 1031 beginning their ascent on a climbing wall


their nests along the Potomac Riv-

"Imagine Learning Club at Beltsville Academy"

Each year, the student population of Prince George's County Public Schools is getting

more diverse. Students, who came from different countries with different cultural backgrounds and languages, continue their education here. It is inevitable for some of these students to face difficulty in transitioning to their new learning environment if not provided with enough necessary support. Therefore, such programs play a vital role for these students to succeed in their academic endeavors.

At Beltsville Academy, a group of teachers initiated to start a "chapter" of the *Imagine Learning Club*. It focuses on offering after-school

academic support for ESOL students, improving confidence and language skills for students as they learn English, and encouraging newcomers and their parents to feel involved in our school community. The main focus of the club is the Imagine Learning software program, which builds students' oral language, academic vocabulary, and reading skills.

The club is run by ESOL teacher Kristen Benovic, first grade teacher Dana Grimaud, and ESOL paraprofessional Graciela Cedil-

los. It was in Fall 2012 when Ms. Benovic and Ms. Grimaud saw the potential benefits of starting a Beltsville Academy "chapter" of the Imagine Learning Club to the schools' English Language Learners (ELLs). So they took advan-

Students in first grade through fifth grade are invited to be a club member based on their English language proficiency and reading levels. Teachers collaborate to choose students that can benefit from additional language and reading support. They meet every week on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The club starts right after school and begins with time for students to do their homework. Ms. Benovic and Mrs. Cedillos work with second through fifth graders to give them homework support. Ms. Grimaud works with the club members in first grade. The teachers spend additional time teaching mini lessons to support students in areas of academic need. During this recess time, the students are then allowed to play outside for a brief time, where the Imagine Learning teachers support students' use of social language and encourage making new friends. The last session of the club allows the students to spend 45 minutes on the Imagine Learning computer program at the computer lab. The program offers specialized reading instruction for students based on their individual needs and offers first-language support as needed.

The Imagine Learning club highly values the involvement of the parents to their children's learning and progress. In the past, the club took a tour at the Beltsville Branch Public Library and the librarians assisted the parents in registering for free library cards. However, the greatest highlight activity of the Imagine Learning Club is the *End of Program Fiesta*. It allowed all the families of the students to celebrate together the successes of the club members. In addition, families were able to bring traditional foods from their culture.

The club benefited the students in many ways. The Imagine Learning software improves oral language, reading comprehension, and academic vocabulary. Vocabulary is a key component of language acquisition for English Language Learners. This explicit instruction of academic and content-specific vocabulary words helps students participate more in their daily classroom instruction. The students' social skills were enhanced as well. All these components are vital support in order for the English Language Learners (ELLs) to succeed in their regular classrooms and obtain a quality education.

On Saturday, December 13, HP's drama students, under the direction of Ms. Betty Smalls, English and drama teacher, participated in the



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should never find themselves living on the streets of this country without care or without hope.

Low income veterans are twice as likely to become homeless compared to non-veteran low income adults.

This is where facilities such as the Maryland Center for Veterans Education and Training (MCVET) become a haven for our homeless veterans.

MCVET was founded by 4 veterans of great vision on Nov. 11, 1993 in Baltimore, MD. These veterans, Art Lego of The American Legion, Blair Cross of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Chester Silverman, of the Jewish War Veterans of The Veterans of Foreign Wars, (the only one still living and still involved with MCVET) and F. Douglas Johnson of The American Legion saw a tremendous need and spent their lives in filling this need, thus enhancing the lives of thousands of veterans. The founders believed that a military structured program is the best method to recognize and honor the veterans while challenging and supporting them in their efforts to regain stability in their lives. Their vision included creating a safe and clean facility where America's veterans could be rehabilitated. Since its inception, MCVET has grown from serving 20 veterans in its first

year to more than 240 veterans daily through seven district programs, Outreach; Day Drop-in facility, Short Term Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, Permanent Housing, Single Room Housing, and Follow-Up Program. As the participants travel through the continuum, they receive an array of services that support the primary goal of empowering them to return to their families and communities. The support services include Case Management, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Counseling, Health Care, Education and Employment Services.

As MCVET prepares for the future, they anticipate an increase in the number of veterans who will need their help. According to a Veterans Affairs study approximately 12,700 veterans of Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF) were homeless in 2010 These numbers swell greatly when the Traumatic Brain Injury cases are added.

In order to maintain MCVET as a premier facility \$975,000 is needed to replace antiquated equipment and supplies. Another \$100,000 for technology improvements and media environment to include infrastructure, hardware and software. These improvements will maximize the impact on learning and rehabilitation. Yet another \$75,000 is needed for marketing and development while still \$100,000 will be raised for new programmatic initiatives. These funds will be used for research and development to address the needs of the growing demographic of veterans who include returning, incarcerated, female veterans and veterans with families.

In the words of the President of the Board of Directors, Sandi Dutton, "The community within MCVET works tirelessly and successfully to assist our veterans from all walks of life, from all states within the USA and from all wars and conflicts. The staff is stellar in providing the services needed. Our students are anxious to learn, to heal and return to society."

The Executive Director of MCVET, Jeffrey L. Kendrick USAF (Ret) says "Although our mission has remained consistent over the years, the services we have provided our students have evolved as the needs of homeless veterans have changed. We've gone from being a place strictly for shelter to being a top tier non-profit organization that provides employment and educational services to our homeless residents."
