Brightwood College Service Project Focuses on Child Survivors of Domestic Violence

Recently across the United States, thousands of individuals, agencies, and institutions participated in the annual observance of National Crime Victims' Rights Week. As stated on the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) website, "This year's theme-Serving Victims. **Building Trust. Restoring** Hope.—underscores the importance of early intervention and victim services in establishing trust with victims, which in turn begins to restore their hope for healing and recovery."

The daily news media is filled with harrowing accounts depicting an increase in domes-

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# **Letter to the Editor**

I have thoroughly enjoyed Ted Ladd's Beltsville history columns (Is he related to the mentioned Union Private Luther Crawford Ladd?). However, may I expound on a few points?

1) It is true Maryland did not secede, mostly because Lincoln imprisoned all legislators in Annapolis who would not swear allegiance and then removed what legislative body remained to upper Maryland where there were few slaves. 2) Since the Emancipation Proclamation of January 1, 1863, did not free any slaves in Maryland, life in Prince George's County did not change drastically until later. 3) In 1860, the population of this county was not 50% slave but rather 12,500 slave and 1,200 free Blacks out of a total population of

23,300, while the entire state had 87,000 slaves and 84,000 free out of a total of 687,000. (Few people are aware that in 1860, Maryland had more free Blacks than any other state.)

segment is comprised of children who have either witnessed or survived intimate partner violence.

A story was shared about a young child (let's call him Kyle) who was about 10 years old. Due to repeated incidents of IPV in the home, Kyle was forced to move many times to avoid detection. He finally reached the point where all of his worldly possessions had been condensed to fit in his backpack. In an effort to ensure he did not lose the last of his possessions, Kyle carried the backpack with him literally everywhere—to school, to church, to the movies, to sleepovers...just in case.

No child, particularly one at that age, should be forced to make decisions about leaving the bike but taking the helmet or leaving the bat but taking the glove or the ball. Most adults have grave difficulty making the decision to part with their possessions when they purge in anticipation of a planned and happy move to a new home. How can a child (especially a young child) be expected to make that decision repeatedly under stressful conditions and not be adversely affected?

As a result of Kyle's story and

Still full of love when being slaughtered on the Cross..



Another large, 20' x 5' photographic mural on the opposite wall of the restaurant is of a single sunset image of the well-known acacia tree of Africa, with graceful

giraffes in silhouette.

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# John Abraham Ulle, Blacksmith, Soldier, Farmer

Beltsville resident John Ulle was drafted into the Union Army in July, 1863, close to his 36<sup>th</sup> birthday. His job was associated with keeping the B&O Railroad tracks in good repair, a very responsible job during the Civil War. The U.S. Federal Census of 1860 lists John Ulle as a blacksmith living in Beltsville with his wife and three children. His blacksmith shop was located on Old Baltimore Pike where it crossed the B&O railroad tracks.

The article on Beltsville in the Civil War in last month's issue described some of the action during the Confederate raid on Beltsville that occurred on July 12, 1864. Ulle must have been busy that day when Confederate forces damaged the railroad tracks and set railroad cars afire.

Ulle was born in Gerthausen, Germany in July 1827 and came to America in 1849 on the ship Jason. He married Margaret Magle in Washington D.C. in 1853 and a little later moved to Beltsville, where he would soon open the aforementioned blacksmith shop.

After the war, Ulle continued to operate his blacksmith shop at the same location. He and Margaret raised a family of 11 children. He passed away in November 1912 at age 85 at his home at Ulle Farm, located on Ulle Road in Beltsville. He was buried in the family plot in St. John's Episcopal Church Cemetery.

In the early 1890's Lewis C. Beall established a store next to Ulle's blacksmith shop. This was the commercial center of Beltsville because of the proximity of the B&O Railroad passenger and freight stations.

In 1898, Beall sold the store to John Ulle's sons, Edward and John, Jr. They operated the store until 1916, when it was destroyed by fire. The fire also destroyed the home of Edward Ulle on an adjoining lot. The business was moved briefly to the blacksmith shop while a new store and home were constructed. The new home still stands on Old Baltimore Pike near the railroad tracks. It now houses the Satellite Electric Company at 11205 Old Baltimore Pike. John Ulle's blacksmith shop was nearby.



# Bee Research Lab and Beekeepers Swap Colonies to Better Bees

Honey bees may get another boost up the survival ladder as the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) Bee Research Laboratory (BRL) and Geezer Ridge Farm apiary begin a remarkable new partnership.


"Usually with science, researchers finish a study and turn the results over to beekeepers to apply; then researchers start on the next experiments and so on," explains Entomologist Jay Evans, research leader of the Beltsville, Maryland, lab, which is one of the pioneers in bee health science.

This time, though, the Bee Research Lab is studying the success Geezer Ridge Farm in Hedgesville, West Virginia, has had improving honey bee health after applying its research results. The Bee Research Lab is part of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS), U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) chief scientific in-house research agency.

Last winter, beekeepers Cheryl and Ed Forney lost only 4 percent of their bee colonies compared to the national average of 30 percent.

"We believe strongly in science-based beekeeping. It's the Bee Research Lab—some of the most talented and published researchers in the country—that helped us get our colonies as healthy as they are now. From their work, we've adapted management strategies and bred bees that are tailored to the Mid-Atlantic's climate," Ed Forney said.

To see if this success is scientifically repeatable, Geezer Ridge Farm and the Bee Research Lab are exchanging colonies. Forty USDA hives have already taken up residence in West Virginia, and another 80 may join them to see if they will survive the 2016-2017 winter in better condition under Geezer Ridge Farm management.

"This is an opportunity to give back. We are going to see if we can stabilize the USDA research colonies and make them as sustainable as the stock here at Geezer Ridge Farm," Forney said. Forney added. "Together, we will test interactions between disease and stress/nutrition to find out how to feed bees out of trouble and/or avoid disease in the first place."

Thirty-five of Forney's 250 colonies have come to Beltsville where ARS researchers will study their basic biology and genetics to see if they differ from the average honey bee. In the process, they'll try to pinpoint whether their increased survival is due to better genetics, better management, or both.

Three Bee Research Lab scientists are involved in the new partnership, each focusing on one of today's three major threats to bee health. Insect Physiologist Miguel Corona, who initiated this collaboration, focuses on bee nutrition research such as devising new ways to deliver more protein in honey bee diets. Entomologist

Steven Cook is studying how to improve honey bees' physiological health as well as their abilities to overcome stress. Lastly, Jay Evans concentrates on researching and combating bee disease.

The Bee Research Laboratory is the oldest federal lab working on honey bees. Located first in what is now part of Chevy Chase, the lab opened in 1891 and, except for a short break in 1896-1897, has been continuous operation ever since. The lab moved to Beltsville in 1939

Research on the identification and control of honey bee diseases has always been the lab's main mission. For beekeepers and industry regulators not only in the United States but around the world, Beltsville has long been the place they send bee samples for diagnoses. The bee disease diagnostic service has been a part of the BRL's program almost since its inception.

Some of the lab's recent notable accomplishments included being a leader in sequencing the honey bee

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# Tech Sense By John Bell

# TV Part 2: Media Streaming Devices

This is the second part of a multi-part series on computers, technology, and television. Last month, we discussed a number of video-streaming services that stream videos directly to your computer. If you want to watch these on your large-screen television, you can, of course, connect your computer to most modern televisions using either the HDMI cable or the traditional VGA connector. Let's start this month with the cables you need to connect the computer to the TV.

# **Cables to Connect your** Computer

Most computers and televisions for the past 20 years have a builtin VGA connector. This connector provides a path for a high-quality video signal from the computer to the monitor or TV. The VGA cable is fine for the typical TV with 1080p resolution (it can support

up to 2048×1536 pixels). As computer monitors started to achieve higher resolutions and bandwidths, the need for new cables drove the industry to create DVI standard. DVI connectors are still common on many computers and monitors but are less common on televisions because a VGA connector was sufficient for HDTV signals. VGA and DVI cables only carry the video signal and do not carry sound or control signals. If you need sound, you will need to add at least a pair of RCA sound cables for stereo sound.

The problem faced by the industry was that consumers found connecting multiple cables between the TV, DVD/Blu-ray player, VCR (remember those?), stereo, and computer a daunting

task. Each device typically required multiple cables to be connected between devices, and each device had its own unique remote control. The industry's solution was

HDMI cable. The HDMI cable is the standard connector for modern televisions. HDMI carries both video and sound, although it is common for higher quality sound to be sent through separate cables. HDMI also provides a channel for controlling connected devices like a Blu-ray player and a Digital Rights Management (DRM) feature called High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection, or HDCP. HDCP support is required on the TV or monitor and your computer's video card to stream protected content from the computer to the TV or monitor. Many if not most computers built in the past 5 years include an HDMI connector and HDCP support. Simply plug the HDMI cable into the computer and TV and configure the computer to use the HDMI output, and you should be good to go.

# We Don't Need No Stinkin' Computers

It may not be convenient to lug the computer next to the TV to watch your favorite video. Now there is a device that I like to call the video streaming box. Four devices control most of the marketplace: Apple TV, Amazon Fire, Chromecast, and Roku. These

devices typically connect wirelessly to your network and use an HDMI cable to connect to your TV. In addition to streaming content directly, these devices also support "mirroring": that is displaying the screen of a computer or other device to the TV through the video streaming box. Unfortunately, each device has its own way of mirroring.

#### **Amazon Fire**

Amazon Fire is a streaming box released by Amazon. It is, of course, designed to support streaming primarily from the Amazon service but also supports

> Hulu, Netflix, and You-Tube (of the services discussed last month). The Fire supports "mirroring" from Amazon Tables and Android devices, and an app is available that supports Apple devices. The

Fire TV Stick sells Amazon for \$40, and other Fire TV models sell for \$85 to \$140 depending on the features.

## **Apple TV**

Apple TV is the TV device from Apple. If you are committed to the iTunes ecosystem, it may be a choice for you. In addition to streaming directly from a number of video services, you can use the Apple AirPlay technology to stream wirelessly from your computer or iOS device to the TV through Apple TV. AirPlay is an Apple proprietary streaming protocol but is available through the iTunes application on Windows and is built into most Apple devices. Apple TV will typically cost about \$70 to \$175 depending on the memory and other features.

## Chromecast

Chromecast is Google's streaming device. It works with any Android device and with a plug-in for the Chrome browser. There is an App in the iTunes store that also allows Chromecast to work with Apple devices. Chromecast uses a technique called "casting"

where the Chromecast device is sent the URL and other information for the stream and streams directly to the device. Chromecast will mirror any tab on the Chrome browser screen or in Chromecast-supported applications but has limited ability to mirror the entire computer screen. Chromecast can be purchased for \$35. Chromecast comes in the form of a stick that connects directly to the HDMI input of your TV.

## Roku

Roku has been providing

streaming boxes since 2008. Roku works with all of the streaming services we have discussed except iTunes. Only Apple works with iTunes due to Apple's propriety DRM. Many Roku devices also support mirroring through Miracast, which is the industry standard for mirroring devices. Roku devices sell for as low as \$39 for the Roku Stick and up to \$129 for the Ultra HD version. Roku organizes content through channels, and each channel then organizes content based on the application used to access the channel. Roku provides an open interface, and many users have created custom channels for their own use.

# Maryland State Firemen's Association Awarded Bringing Safety Home Award from NFPA and HFSC

The National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) Fire Sprinkler Initiative and the Home Fire Sprinkler Coalition (HFSC) awarded the Maryland State Firemen's Association the 2016 Bringing Safety Home Award. The award was given at the Fire Sprinkler Coalition Chair Summit and HFSC May board meeting at NFPA Headquarters in Quincy, Massachusetts.

The award recognizes fire service members and other safety advocates who use HFSC's home fire sprinkler educational materials and Fire Sprinkler Initiative resources to ensure that decision makers have accurate information when they consider

new or updated home fire sprinkler codes.

Accepting the award on behalf of the association was Stephan Cox, chair of the association's legislative committee, and Richard Smith, vice chair. Both were influential in helping defeat a legislative bill that would have weakened the state's sprinkler requirement. Under Cox's leadership, Smith brought the Maryland fire service and interested parties together to defeat this legislation. Additional efforts were made to convene numerous panels at the bill's hearing. Their willingness to work both sides of the legislative aisle while educating legislators on the importance of home fire sprinklers is a lesson in effective sprinkler advocacy.

This is the second time in five years that Maryland fire officials have received the Bringing Safety Home Award. In 2012, the first annual Bringing Safety Home Award was given to Bill Barnard, then the Maryland state fire marshal, who advocated for adopting Maryland's statewide fire sprinkler requirement for all new one- and two-family homes

genome. How some of the bees' genes work and may be altered through breeding to help improve reproduction, disease resistance, and ability to tolerate pesticides are now being researched. Scientists at the lab also sequenced the genome of the bee-killing parasite *Nosema ceranae*.

Lab researchers also discovered that Varroa mites transmit and activate deformed wing virus, a virus that had only been a minor problem of bees until the mites arrived in the United States in late 1980s. This virus-mite association is thought to be part of why Varroa

mites are the number one problem of honey bees today.

In 2000, the Bee Research Lab developed a screened-bottom-board insert for bee hives that helps reduce the number of Varroa mites, and in 2005, the lab received U.S. Food and Drug Administration approval for an antibiotic to control American foulbrood, a very destructive and widespread bee disease.

Sublethal exposure to pesticides is also part of what is causing increased losses among managed honey bee colonies today. Bee Research lab scientists found that imidacloprid, a neonicotinoid insecticide, and coumaphos, an organophosphate used by bee-

keepers to treat Varroa mites, decreased the viability of sperm stored in honey bee queens 50 and 33 percent, respectively. This may also be contributing to overall problems in bee health.

While honey bees are under pressure from a dozen or more new pathogens and pests that have spread to the United States in the past 50 years and are facing additional pressure from poor nutrition and sublethal exposure to pesticides, according to Evans, honey bees are not about to go extinct. But beekeepers are at an economic tipping point where annual colony losses are either going to push the costs of beekeeping up or push beekeepers out of business.





thousands like it, the criminal justice students of Brightwood College's (formerly TESST College of Technology) Beltsville campus chose to collect new books and give them to child IPV survivors as a service project. The students sponsored a month-long From Scars to Scholars campaign. Books as donations were chosen for two reasons. First, it's well known that one can open a book and be transported to anyplace in the world: more importantly, to a place of safety. Second, it was determined the books were small enough that the question of whether to leave them behind would hopefully not be an issue—they fit neatly into a suitcase, knapsack, or backpack with plenty of room for other essentials.

Additionally, bookplate inserts were ordered, and each new book will have a label placed inside that says "This book belongs to ...." As a result, the children will always have something that belongs to them exclusively. With that premise in mind, the Brightwood students saw this project as their way of making a small contribution toward lessening the scars, both visible and invisible, of intimate partner violence.


At the end of the donation drive, 100 books were collected. Approximately one dozen games and crayon sets were also donated. The students' efforts were aided by generous donations from the National Coalition of Resources and Protection Security Associates, Inc. The books will be equally distributed to the House of Ruth and The Family Crisis Center, both of which have facilities in Prince George's County.

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


