

With the school year now underway, drivers in Beltsville are reminded to be extra cautious on the roads. Children are walking to school, crossing streets, and boarding school buses. Safety must come first.

By law, drivers must stop when a school bus's red lights are flashing. The same applies at stop signs, red lights, and flashing red lights. Yet, too often, drivers roll through or ignore these rules. Remember: when making a turn, you do not have the right of way until oncoming traffic has passed.

Speed is another concern. On most roads in Beltsville, the speed limit is 25 to 30 miles per hour, with the exception of parts of Powder Mill Road and Route 1. Slowing down saves lives.

In addition to school traffic, drivers should also be aware of emergency response vehicles. The Temporary Prince George's County Beltsville Fire Station is scheduled to open soon at the corner of Montgomery Road and Sellman Road. Fire trucks and ambulances will be exiting from 43rd Avenue and Montgomery Road.

Romanello Receives National Award

Beltsville resident Connie Romanello received the National Recreation and Park Association's (NRPA) Ralph C. Wilson award for her many years of volunteer service in recreation and parks. The award was presented at NRPA's Mid-Atlantic Regional Council meeting held in the new Sports and Learning Center in Landover, MD. NRPA and Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) in Prince George's County leaders attended as did volunteers and professionals from the seven state mid-Atlantic Regional Council.

Although this seldom-given award is usually presented at the National Recreation and Park Association's annual Congress in October, the award was presented locally so Romanello, who has Lou Gerig's disease, could receive the award in person. Her husband, Victor, son Charles, daughters Rita Fuller and Anna Lembo, son-in-law Tony Lembo and grandchildren Lisa and Victor Lembo also attended the ceremony.

The Ralph C. Wilson Award, named for a beloved NRPA trustee, has been given to only a few individuals who have demonstrated an extraordinary contribution to service, dedication, resources and time as a National Recreation and Park Association volunteer.

Prior to the award presentation, Mary Wells- Harley, Executive Director of the M-NCPPC, Department of Parks and Recreation in Prince George's County, spoke of Romanello's role as a founder, charter member and board member of the Prince George's County Park and Recreation Foundation, now known as the Prince George's Community Foundation. "Connie's continual work and legislative efforts have made a difference in the quality of life of the citizens of this county," Wells Harley said.

Award presenter, Dean Tice, Executive Director of NRPA, said Romanello has been a tireless worker with invaluable contributions to the NRPA. Her dedicated volunteer service includes and precedes his 15-year term as executive director. "There is nobody more deserving of this award than Connie Romanello," Tice said as those in attendance rose in a standing ovation.


the investigation is taking place. Chief Green retired from her position on July 1 and transitioned into the role of county assistant deputy chief administrative officer of public safety. Since transitioning into this role, the hiring practices during her time as fire chief have been called into question.

It was discovered that there were several people recruited into the PG County Fire Department Academy with incomplete background checks. Complete background checks are supposed to be department policy. Deputy chief administrative officer of public safety, Melvin Powell has directed that investigation be done by a separate public safety agency.

County Executive Aisha Braveboy's office released the following statement once this information was reported, "Tiffany Green, who accepted a new role with the County, had been placed on paid administrative leave pending an investigation into pre-employment practices in the Prince George's County Fire/EMS Department."

At the moment, the academy has paused recruiting until the investigation has concluded.





Exploring the Physiology of a Cat

There are many fascinating and quirky facts about cats that you might find interesting. This article focuses on interesting facts about a cat's physiology and how these unique differences impact a cat's

Purring mystery: Cats purr for more than happiness. Purring can be a self-soothing mechanism when stressed, ill or in pain. Cats purr at a frequency between 25-150 Hz, which can promote bone healing and tissue regenera-



Chattering: Cats have been known to "chatter" or "chirp" at birds. The sound is thought to be either a sign of frustration at not being able to reach the prey, or a form of mimicry to lure birds

Unique "righting reflex": Cats can twist their bodies up to 180 degrees in mid-air to land on their feet, thanks to two factors. First, cats have unusually flexible spines because they have more vertebrae than most mammals. A human has 206 bones, and a cat has around 230, depending on tail length and number of toes. Second, cats have a vestibular system in their inner ear that acts like a balance sensor.

Toe variety: Most cats have 18 toes, but some "polydactyl" cats can have 28 or more.

Night vision: Cats can see at light levels six times lower than humans due to a high number of rod cells in their retinas.

Whisker radar: Whiskers (vibrissae) are so sensitive they can detect changes in air currents, helping cats navigate in darkness.

Backward claws: A cat's

claws curve backward, making climbing down trees tricky—they usually back down.

Jacobson's organ: Located in the roof of the mouth, it allows cats to "taste" smells (that funny grimace after sniffing something is referred to as the Flehman

Third eyelid: Cats have a nictitating membrane that helps protect and moisten the eve.

Super sniffers: Cats have around two hundred million scent receptors (humans have about five million).

Taste blind to sweets: Cats lack taste receptors for sugar; sweet things are invisible to their

Super jumpers: Cats can jump up to six times their own height in

Righties and lefties: Most male cats favor their left paw, while most females favor their

What is that sound? Is your faucet dripping? How about we save some money and the planet?

Saving money on your water bill is not only good for your wallet but also for the environment. Water is a precious resource, and reducing waste can lead to significant long-term savings. Here are practical tips and strategies to help you lower your water bill without sacrificing comfort or cleanliness.



Immediately

One of the most effective ways to reduce your water bill is to fix leaks as soon as you notice them. Email Security 2025

Security on personal computers has gotten worse over the years. Between email, text messages, various social media, AI and mega-companies with sloppy software developers and bad practices the world is becoming less safe.

Email and Spam

It is important to be able to recognize email spam when it arrives. Most email providers have tools that can eliminate many spam emails, but emails still sneak through. Spam email can be annoying and dangerous. The following email is portion of a real, typical, and dangerous email spam. The line numbers are references for discussion.

At a first glance, this may look innocent.

First note the email says it

I can also look at the mail source (an option on most email clients) and see a list of the 451 other recipients. Any professional email service would have used BCC (Blind Carbon Copy) to hide the other recipients, making them invisible to the others. Looking at these addresses it also reveals that the targeted users are all Comcast users. I believe Comcast use to be better than this, detecting the

comes from "Norton Service Update", but when I reveal the source address, it shows dataqy59@gmail.com. It is very unlikely that Norton would use gmail.com to send its business correspondence. Another note is that this same message went to 451 others. Apparently with the same invoice number and other details not shown in the snippet above. It appears that the real purpose of this is to get you to call the number (hidden) to cancel the \$250 charge (not shown). The person on the other end will likely try to collect personal information like name, address, phone and credit card numbers. Other clues are that I do not have a Norton Account, "Done and Dusted", is not a typical phrase for this type of business letter.



Most of us know the storyeven if we've never seen the movie. A group of filmmakers set sail for a mysterious island, where they discover a prehistoric world of dinosaurs and natives who worship a colossal figure known only as Kong. Kong, of course, turns out to be a 40-foot-tall gorilla who takes a shine to Ann, the actress traveling with the crew. 



email was targeted to their customers, and then blocking them.

Attachments

If you do not have a reason to trust and email please never open any attachments. These are files, attached to an email, with the ability to carry all kinds of bad things. If you need to inspect it, download it and do not open it. Scan the downloaded file with a good virus-scanner and then decide if you still want to open it. Since I need to do this sometimes, I download it to a special and isolated machine, where I can use anti-virus software and other tools to examine the files first.

Do not trust photos, documents, or PDF attachments, again only if you know and trust the actual sender. Recently a file compres-

sion utility was distributed, that caused compressed files to include malware. Unsuspecting users then sent these files as email attachments without the sender even knowing about the malware. The recipients received the malwaretainted files. So scan before you UnRar or Unzip and so on.

What Should You Do?

I have been dealing with these types of messages for years. I can recognize these types of messages quickly and only need deep examination of a few each week (remember that I also have a large number of active email accounts).

I send these emails directly to my spam or junk folder. I might have to process hundreds of spam mails a week. If the email is clearly spam, then I immediately mark it as spam. This will flag it and prevent message from repeated receipt by you and others. If you are not sure, delete it. If you need to examine it delete it first and then examine it from within the deleted or trash folder. Files in these folders normally reduce the harm that the message can do, so you can inspect it if needed.

Domain Blocking

Domain blocking is a practice that prevents access to domains if they are blocked. Many tools can do this. I typically use OpenDNS. You can also use firewall settings and tools like Pi-Hole.

Domain blocking can also reduce the receipt of unsafe emails. My email setups typically block all .ru (Russia), .cn China, .in (India), and .jp Japan emails. I do not expect any legitimate emails from any of these countries. I do



Subregion 1 Master Plan Amendment for Konterra & the Surrounding Area **Town Hall**

Councilmember Dernoga, Scott Rowe from the Community Planning Division of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC), Planning Board, Jim Soltesz from the engineering firm SOLTESZ LLC, Jay Mittal, SVP Operations & Strategy from the University of Maryland Capital Regional Medical Center, and Caleb Gould and Chris Hatcher from Konterra Realty, presented and facilitated this meeting.

Details about the Subregion I Master Plan and Minor **Plan Amendment**

After six years of pressure

from Councilmember Dernoga, a "Minor Plan Amendment" for Subregion 1 will be initiated by the Planning Department. It will cover a large portion of Council District 1. The current Master Plan for our area is the Subregion I Master Plan and Sectional Map Amendment approved in 2010.

A "Minor Plan Amendment" will be implemented since a complete revision of the Subregion I Master Plan would take approximately three years and may fail to address many key issues. This process will primarily focus on the undeveloped properties in and around Konterra. The Minor Plan Amendment should take approximately 15 months to complete, taking into account preliminary research, analysis, and public par-

Additional preliminary steps include M-NCPPC staff and consultants identifying priority implementation actions in the current plan, and engaging in an analysis of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats in Subregion I. Then, M-NCPPC staff and the consultants will identify proposed

changes that should be made to the existing Subregion I Master Plan.

The official "Initiation" of the Minor Plan Amendment will occur early next year, and M-NCPPC will issue its proposal for the Amendment. A "Joint Public Hearing" must be held within 60 days. Reminder: Stop for School

Please remember to stop for all school buses as we begin the 2025 School Year. If you see a school bus parked with flashing lights and the stop sign out, you could be fined \$250 if you do not stop and are recorded by the school bus's camera. If a police officer stops you, the fine will be \$570 with an additional three-point penalty on the driver's license. All drivers must stop at least 20 feet away from the bus until the stop

sign closes and the bus resumes motion.

Children are most vulnerable to being hit when they are waiting for, boarding, or exiting a school bus. This "danger zone" extends 10 feet from each side of the bus. When a bus is preparing to stop, it will begin by flashing its yellow lights. When the bus stops, the stop-arm signals and flashing red lights are visible to drivers.

Drivers must come to a complete stop if they are traveling in the same direction as the school bus, regardless of whether the road has one lane, multiple lanes, or a center turn lane. They must also stop if they are traveling in the opposite direction, and the road does not have dirt, grass, or a physical barrier median separating the lanes.

Jason's Jive By Jason Inanga

It feels so good to be back. First of all, I must apologize for my absence last month. I mixed up deadline dates and by the time I remembered, it was too late to submit my article. So, my dear reader, I am sorry.

I had a brief visit to Beltsville on the July 4 weekend. I arrived from Dallas in the morning, and had to cover an event, the US Premiere of a Nigerian film, Aso Ebi Diaries, which was held at the Greenbelt Cinema. The sold-out event was a lot of fun and had the Greenbelt Mayor in attendance.

Labor Day is September 1, and we will be taking the film to Houston, Texas, for a showing there

After a hiatus for many years, I am back in the media, doing what I love the best --- writing and marketing. I thank Beltsville News for the opportunity to do this column, which has kept the fire in me going. So, as I said earlier, it feels good to be back. I now publish a monthly newsmagazine, THE NAIJA BRIDGE --- aimed at promoting arts and culture and bridging the gap between Nigeria and the diaspora. In addition to this, I am re-establishing contact with media colleagues in the Caribbean, growing my media contacts here in the US as well as Nigeria. I also do media and marketing for some artistes, and trust me, it keeps me busy but is very fulfilling.

There is something about journalism that has always kept me intrigued. I still find myself picking up copies of newspapers and magazines. Recently, I was buying a copy of the local paper here in Dallas, and the gas station attendant looked at me with a puzzled look. He did not have to ask questions --- the look on his face displayed the questions on his mind. I responded to his stare and said, yes, people still read newspapers. There is a lot of information in them and not all of us are built for staring at our phones all day.

Looking back, I remember my love for newspapers. My late father would bring home newspapers from work and leave them in the living room. I would read them to get familiar with what was going on in the community --- politics, sports and business. in no specific order. On Sundays, I would walk 35 minutes to the vendor to buy the newspapers and then read through them as I walked home. I wasn't allowed to read the papers in the house, until after Dad had finished reading them. I think it was like five or six newspapers every Sunday.

Growing up in Nigeria as a teenager, there was a tradition

where the newspaper vendor stands were unofficial citadels of learning. Young and old would gather there to argue and discuss current affairs. The vendors would let you read the newspaper, but you had to pay for reading them. So, if a newspaper costs \$1. If five or more people read the newspaper, the cost to read might be 25 cents each. He would make more than the sale value of the paper, especially on a weekend. Trust Nigerians to find an ingenuous way of making money.

The other thing the vendors would do is "marry" the newspapers that they sold. I'll explain. The Guardian was and still is a very popular daily. A newspaper like The Observer or The Herald would be slow on sales on any given day. Rather than be stuck with a lot of copies of a paper that is not selling off, the vendors would tell you, "Today, if you want The Guardian, you have to buy The Observer or The Herald with it." So, in other words, you buy a newspaper that you do not want to get the one you want. That's just the way it is.

So, to those of you who read newspapers and magazines that some of us still take or time to write for, thank you for your patronage. Well, time to wrap up. Have a great month.


